PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Who would have thought that we would be here, a year after the last annual report and still have COVID-19 hanging around, let alone have been through the Avalon cluster? To have once again locked the Clubhouse down around the Christmas period and for our Board of Management to have to isolate for 14 days after being exposed at the RSL was definitely a first. I once again thank all our members for accepting the circumstances thrust upon us and supporting the Club through this period. We continue to comply with all the health protocols and hopefully we have seen the last of our direct exposure.

A sad note this year has of course been the passing of two of our Life members. Don Imison and Reg Wood have both passed away this season and it must be an incredibly sad time for the families of both men. They were both a huge part of the fabric of our Club, and they will be remembered with fondness. Vale Reg Wood and Don Imison.

Our main focus throughout this season as usual was patrolling the beach and life saving and once again I can proudly say that no lives were lost at Avalon Beach this season. Our patrols were on duty for more than 5000 hours and the dedication of our patrolling members cannot be understated. A big part of this success is the job done by our Club Captains Nick Sampson and Jason Dale and supported by Deputy Club Captain, Sophie Valentine. Co-ordinating the patrol roster and ensuring all the gear and equipment is up to standard and maintained throughout the year is no small feat. Supporting and assisting our Patrol Captains and senior patrol members share their knowledge, skills and experience and keeping up to date in an ever-changing patrol environment is a big advantage for our Club.

Michael King and Louise Purnell have led our group of outstanding trainers once again throughout this season. It has been a stellar year with 59 new SRC members and 64 new Bronze holders coming through the training team. It is outstanding to think that we have that number of new Bronze members joining our Club. This bolsters our patrol numbers and allows the Club to regenerate with new faces and energy. Additionally, the IRB trainers have done a great job on driver and crew training, adding to the ranks with those specialist skills. It is great to see our Gold Medallion holders retaining their proficiency; congratulations to Andrew Clark, Ben Johns and Jasper Giddy for gaining their Gold this year.

It was great for a large part of our surf sports team to be able to compete at Aussies this year after the disappointment of last year's cancellation. A team of almost 50 competitors, as well as family and friends, made the journey to the Sunshine Coast for the event. The Boat team was our



biggest contingent and several crews made it to the final day with the Hueys getting a valiant 4th place with no help from the surf gods. The Masters Women's crew, the DBs, came away with a Bronze medal in their division. The other standout for me was the boat relay teams competing in both the NSW State and National finals. The Masters' team has continued to also represent the Club with several medals across numerous divisions. It was great to see the usual names there but also some new Masters' competitors getting involved and doing well: shout out to Amanda "Gem" Lehmann and Julia Jones-Hughes with medals. The IRB team has begun racing with the carnival season also well underway with some outstanding results - well done all. Thanks to Terry Barber for overseeing the surf sports team.

The junior section of the Club has been led ably once again by Tom Waters and his fantastic team of Age Managers. Allowing several of the groups to hold Nippers at Palm Beach has been a good chance for those groups to develop and enhance their skills and spend quality time in the water. Tom has decided to step aside from the Nippers President role, and I thank him for his dedication and efforts over the past three years.

The Bangalley Bar has had to endure the period of COVID-19 with shutdowns and restrictions being enforced. This has led to a number of functions being postponed or cancelled and the public bar unable to operate. However, since the resumption of trade we have been able to rebuild quite considerably and are now almost back to full strength. Collaborations with Sunny Eddy and Alfonso's pizza nights and now paella have been crucial in getting people out and about and visiting us once again. Thanks to Nick and Jason once again who have co-ordinated the lion's share of the bar work along with Johnny and Lija Wilson who have been able to bring together some of these partnerships.

Our new Director of Finance this year, Ashley Brown has done a great job to navigate some still significant headwinds following the lockdown and restrictions. He and Bernadette McKay have been able to claim all levels of assistance to help us get through this period and have us sitting in a relatively strong financial position. The BoM must also be congratulated for taking a frugal approach to expenditure throughout this time.

Our sponsors have been fantastic once again sticking with

us throughout this tough commercial period. We would be struggling to operate without their support and generosity and I cannot understate how grateful we are to have these relationships - McGrath Pittwater, Avalon Beach RSL, Active Tree Services, Brown Bros Skip Bins, CrossFit and Edcon Steel to name a few.

The BoM will remain relatively stable once again with minimal changes taking place. It is one of the strengths of this Club that we have smooth transitions of management and changes take place with little or no disruption to business. Thankfully we have an amazing team of dedicated Patrol Captains who responded to every request we threw their way. They excelled in every description of the word and provided the normal vigilant patrolling that we know and love at Avalon Beach. Alongside this, they dealt with counting heads on beaches for COVID-19 stats, providing satellite patrols, countless emails and updates throughout the season from medical directives to surf life saving updates and procedures.

It gives us great pleasure in reporting again that we had no lives lost at Avalon Beach this summer. It is something of which we are extremely proud, considering the challenging circumstances. To every patrolling member in the Club thank you! Thanks for turning up, volunteering your time and developing your skills with new Awards. To every member who was involved in or completed a rescue, you helped save a life so they can go home to their families. Always remember your vigilance is what keeps us one of the most respected emergency services in NSW.

Skills maintenance - well we all know this is a challenge to get completed at the best of times. Throw in the unknowns of COVID-19 and a new online theory section and you have yourself a headache. A huge shout out to all our members who completed it this year - we are very aware some of you struggled to complete this and we are grateful you persisted and remained involved in our great service.

To the Education team led by Michael King – an amazing job as always with the practical sessions and all the regulations in place. As a Club, we need to recognise the efforts of Michael and Rick Mitchell to enter all of these proficiencies into Surfguard each year. They were still doing proficiencies for people all the way up till the 6pm Dec 31 deadline! Thanks to Andy Crow for entering all the IRB proficiencies and working with Alan Moran and Terry Barber to keep all our Drivers and Crew up to date.

Now that Surf Life Saving is recognised as an emergency service, our Club is providing help well beyond the traditional beach area. This is especially true of our Emergency Call-Out Team who provided after hours assistance on six separate occasions. These members go above and beyond the call of duty constantly. These calls never come through on bright sunny days. Nearly every time it's raining, freezing cold and when there is a pumping surf running. A team of four even went out into the flood areas at Wisemans Ferry to assist the SES with welfare checks and resupplying homes stranded by rising water. The response from our team was exceptional with people

giving up work to be on standby to help others in need.

This all goes to show the hard work and dedication of our members in a range of areas on and off the beach despite such a challenging year of surf life saving. Their efforts are appreciated enormously. RESCUE CASE STUDY

Probationary Club Member, Dan Morley, was only a couple of weeks into his Bronze Medallion training when he stepped up to undertake life saving CPR reviving a man who had collapsed during a soccer match at Pennant Hills.

Dan performed CPR and applied the AED (defib) before continuing CPR until the patient was revived. The patient was taken to hospital and, after heart surgery, has made a full recovery.

Squad Trainers Rosemary Morgan-Smith, Stephen Early, Steve Broderick and Charlotte Broderick, along with all of our Club trainers, share their skills and expertise to educate our members and community in life saving skills which can be applied on and off the beach.



RESCUE OF THE MONTH

The Rescue of the Month Award recognises excellence in lifesaving and services, where invaluable skills of our members are showcased in gratitude for their role in assisting members of the community both on and off the beach. Many exceptional rescues and first aid treatments by members excel normal duties and often go unrecognised. Our two nominations were warmly welcomed by Branch featuring our members Max Arnold (November 2020) and Daryl Johnson (April 2021 Nomination and Winner of Northern Beaches Branch). Both Max's and Daryl's intervention changed an outcome which would have more than likely been fatal.

SLSSNB RESCUE OF THE MONTH NOMINATION

Max and his dad were at Boomerang Beach on a busy unpatrolled beach when a member of the public approached desperately seeking help for someone to rescue his partner 150m offshore. Other people had been unable to assist but Max sprinted 200m back to their house and grabbed a surf board whilst his father swam out to assist. Max quotes "she was probably 30 seconds from going under...she was in the worst condition I'd ever seen anyone out in the water". The pair had caught a wave into shore where she was completely exhausted and could barely talk. These symptoms, including the likelihood of swallowing water, had the pair refer NSW Ambulance, where they waited to monitor her symptoms until she was passed onto paramedics.





SLSSNB RESCUE OF THE MONTH WINNER

Daryl was surfing with a friend at North Haven beach, both are experienced surfers and familiar with the area. A tourist (a man in his 30's) and his son (approx 8 year old) were caught in a rip south of where Daryl and his friend were, being dragged out to sea and calling for help. Daryl paddled to the son first, got him onto his board and turned to paddle towards the father who was at this point underwater. He reached down and pulled the man onto his board. Daryl waited for his mate to come over to pass the father onto his board who was exhausted by this point to take the son into shore. Once the son was safely on shore, he paddled back out to assist his mate, placing the father back onto Daryl's board and caught a wave into shore. Once on shore, Daryl made sure both were okay. He also educated the pair on surf awareness as both thought they were wading with no waves, but were unaware of rips and wrongly thought it would be safe to swim alongside the break wall. Beach visitors are typically local surfers, which is partially patrolled until about 2:30pm on a Saturday.

IRB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

Things have been much easier with the increased number of trainers in recent years. I know I've mentioned Richard Cole and Giles Stoddard in previous annual reports, but these two have really driven the IRB training regimen at the Club. Steve Broderick has done a huge amount of training as well. We just need someone to do their Driver's with him and we can get him signed off. So if you're thinking about it.... Sophie Valentine has also started her Trainer's Award so we should have a healthy amount of expertise shortly.

As I referred, we have had a large number of crew do their awards: Alec Finkeldey, Angela Carter, Brooke Edwards, Harrison Schaut, Indy Rose, Jack Riches, Jack Roberts, Jessica Stewart, Joe Boaler, Mary Bradhurst, Oscar Lane, Pia Robinson, Remo Adoncello, Samuel Stoddard, Sophie Johns, Taylor Dickinson, Stuart Minnock, Claude Nolan, Henrique Vasconcelos Martins, Luke Riley, Mia Clendinning, Natasha Dekker, Pia Dorer and Pepita Martins.

This is an awesome number of new people and I know a large number of them intend to go on and do their Driver's Award. Ange and Sam are racing with us already, Mia, Henri and Pepita are planning on it and hopefully Mia is going to do some Official work for us this season. In all a great injection of fresh blood.

Even more so than last year, the number of events for which we had to supply water safety was reduced. Newport didn't do their Swim and we did neither the Lion Island Challenge

EDUCATION REPORT



A new Bronze/SRC Curriculum, COVID-19, lockdown, poor water quality, severe surf conditions - these were just some of the obstacles that hampered training this season. Congratulations, however, go to the efforts of the highly dedicated Education team with a record number of awards, including 123 SRC and Bronze Medallion Awards being achieved amongst almost 200 awards overall. The Education team also welcomed three new trainers into its ranks during the season: Rosemary Morgan-Smith and Charlotte Broderick (Bronze) and Giles Stoddard (IRB).

The 2020-2021 season began with Mark Head, Rick Mitchell and Steve Broderick training their Bronze group through the off-season. They'd been training since February and were only a week away from their assessment when the initial lockdown occurred. Thanks to the patience and hard work of the trainers, six candidates managed to finally complete their assessment in November.

Meanwhile Dave Roberts – the 2020 recipient of the Club's Training and Education Award - returned to training in September with a group of six SRC candidates who had begun their training almost 12 months earlier. Those six members were just about to complete their assessments in March when the Club went into COVID-19 lockdown. Thanks are due to Dave, Melanie Thomas, Darren Warrener and many helpful parents who contributed to the six candidates finally passing their assessments in mid-November 2020 at Avalon Beach.

Anyone who has met Dave knows that he never stops, so almost immediately he began training more than 50 new SRC candidates. Most of this group completed their assessments in December 2020 with others being deemed competent by mid-February 2021. Being Dave, he continued to train Bronze

and SRC groups almost non-stop from September 2019 until March 2021: a Herculean effort. For good measure, Dave has also volunteered to train the SRC and Cadet Bronze groups next season.

Simultaneously, COVID-19 disturbed the patrol season and the annual Bronze proficiencies. The dry components were completed online by members, but it was back into the water for the wet proficiency. With help from Rick Mitchell and Club Captains Jason Dale and Nick Sampson, we were able to have the Bronze proficiencies completed by the New Year. Thanks also go to all the Bronze delegates who were instrumental in helping complete the proficiencies for patrolling members.

By mid-October 2020, another Bronze Medallion squad was beginning with an initial intake of 25 candidates for trainers Steve Broderick and Steve Early, aided by new probationary trainers, Rosemary Morgan-Smith and Charlotte Broderick. This group encountered some extreme conditions during training and were only a week away from assessment in December when "the Avalon cluster lockdown" occurred. Thanks to the patience of the trainers, this Bronze group managed to all pass their assessments in late January 2021.

Just a week later, Steve Broderick and Steve Early began training another Bronze Medallion group with Rosemary and Charlotte and the assistance of another probationary trainer: Sophie Valentine. Again, training was made difficult with some dangerous surf conditions and lockdown. It took as many as four postponements to successfully complete the Bronze assessments, stretching from March to mid-May. Congratulations: a very worthy and patient group of new Bronzies and another huge effort by the trainers.

The IRB team, led by Terry Barber and Alan Moran, go from strength to strength with 24 new IRB Crew joining the squad, another record broken. As mentioned, the IRB training ranks also expanded with Giles Stoddard becoming a Training Officer during the season. The IRB team is always looking for new drivers and crew, so if you're keen let Terry or Alan know.

A highlight of the season showed the importance of our Club training and the need for not only Surf Club members but the wider community to learn basic CPR and the use of a defibrillator. Only a few weeks into his Bronze Medallion course in February, Dan Morley stepped in to perform CPR after a player had collapsed at a soccer match. Dan took charge, performing CPR and applying the defib and reviving the man.

The community is indebted to Louise Lindop for organising community CPR and defib sessions at the Clubhouse in April. These sessions help to keep our community safe and reinforce the importance of helping one another. We will look to run more during next season.

Other season highlights included Tom Colley and Nick Sampson gaining their Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue (SMAR) Awards, plus Gold Medallion Awards for Ben Johns, Jasper Giddy and Andrew Clark. On top of this, almost 30 members completed the First Aid Certificate. Well done to all.

Due to COVID-19, no Club members could travel to our sister Club in Singapore to train candidates for the Bronze Medallion. We will, however, in what is believed to be a first for SLSA, be training a Singapore based Bronze Medallion squad via Zoom through the off-season for around 15 candidates, as well as running wet proficiencies.

Candidates often enquire how much the trainers are paid at the Surf Club. When told we are all volunteers they're astounded by the professionalism and dedication shown to candidates. To be part of this volunteer organisation, you don't expect recognition or limelight. Seeing faces light up at achieving their goals is payment enough. Thanks go to all the Club trainers and assessors for the effort you collectively put into SLSA Education.

A special thanks to our former Chief Training Officer, Rick Mitchell, for his help with entering all proficient members into Surfguard for the Senior Club as well as all the Nipper Awards for the season – that's around 600 entries in Surfguard!

And thanks too, to Club President Ashley Cardiff, Administrator Leanne Austin and the Board of Management. The Education team's success throughout the season would not be possible without their continued support.

ADMINISTRATION AND VENUE HIRE REPORT

It's official. The 2020/21 season is our biggest ever for membership numbers with a total of 1258 members across the Club (statistics available on page 8 and 9. Almost every membership category saw a rise in numbers and this season we celebrate our highest ever number of Active and Youth members.

Over the past three years our Nipper numbers continued to grow steadily and have now reached our third highest (just one family short of equalling second) since our junior membership peak in the 2014/15 season. Confidence in the water and having fun with your mates at the beach has underpinned an invigorated "at home" Nipper program under Tom Waters' leadership over the past three seasons. Tom's goal has been to attract, retain and develop the skills of our youngest members (and often their parents too), foster a respect for and love of the beach and be part of an active and healthy volunteer community. Our life saving future depends on the connection our youngest members have with their beach and community and a fun diverse and educational Nipper program is central to fostering that lifelong enjoyment. Thanks Tom for your energy and leadership over three impactful years as Director of Junior Activities.

Our membership figures are also a testimony to the strength and breadth of the Club and the efforts of everyone within it. No wonder our volunteer Membership Registrars Mark Head (Seniors) and Amanda Wolthers (Nippers), this season supported by Helen Tan and me, responsible for processing all of these renewal and new membership applications were exhausted come the start of the season! We are all looking forward to the promised SLSA upgrade to the online membership renewal system proposed for the season ahead.

Sadly, the one exception to this growth was our Life Member category due to the passing of two of our greats, Don Imison and Reg Wood. In the Club's 96-year history, the honour of Life Membership has been bestowed on only 39 members and it is a sad day indeed when these stalwarts who have contributed so greatly to the Club pass away.

The 2020/21 season was significantly impacted by the Coronavirus pandemic which continued to play out on the world stage, within Australia and more locally on the northern beaches. On 16 December 2020, NSW was in its 13th day of no local transmission of the virus but by the day's end two cases on the northern beaches had been confirmed. Despite popular local community venues such as the Bowling Club, RSL Club and our Surf Club following all NSW Health and government guidelines, our village quickly became the centre of Sydney's worst COVID-19 cluster to date (over 150 confirmed cases). Everyone living north of the Narrabeen bridge was ordered into a three

week stay at home lockdown from 19 December. A pop-up COVID-19 clinic was erected in the village Council carpark (where it still remains) and our community turned out in their thousands to be tested.

When I reported on the COVID-19 pandemic in last year's annual report, I continued to update the figures right up until the print deadline in July. Almost a year later I am back on the Johns Hopkins University Coronavirus Resource Centre website and the comparison is shocking. In 12 months the number of global cases is now 173,204,650, (up from 10,500,000) and global deaths are now 3,726,369 (up from 511,000). Pleasingly a new statistic has been added after the hasty development of a vaccine and 2,108,171,232 global doses of the vaccine have been administered. Of course, all of these figures are only the reported cases and, as horrific as they are, one can only imagine how many cases and deaths, particularly in third and developing world countries, have gone unreported.

By comparison, Australia has reported 30,158 confirmed cases, 910 deaths (mostly in the 70+ age bracket) and 3,089,183 vaccine doses administered – World Health Organisation.

Our international borders closed early in the pandemic which directly contributed to minimising the impact of this disease. Throughout the season we have also seen the closure of State borders and, at times, local council borders delaying and impacting SLS carnivals and events.

The economic impact of this pandemic is immeasurable with disruption to productivity, trade and financial markets across the globe and the decimation of the travel and tourism industry for the foreseeable future.

However, the world keeps spinning, the waves keep rolling onto our beautiful beach, the word 'pivot' has never been more widely used and the avalanche of paperwork, emails and Club admin continued to flow through the office. A special thank you to Rob Hopton who assumed the role of COVID-19 Officer with the diligence and commitment this role required, and to Felicity Peters who took over the role of Member Protection Information Officer this season, reviewing and following up all of our members who hold a position that requires a Working with Children clearance and providing guidance to members on pathways for dispute resolution.

As the parent of a SRC graduate this season I saw first-hand the commitment and dedication of our youth training team, in particular Dave Roberts, Christian Trinder and Darren Warrener. Their care, encouragement and humour built their squad's confidence and preparedness to work as a team and helped them achieve their first Lifesaving Award after Nippers.

Our Board of Management met monthly throughout the year, at times via Zoom teleconferencing, and thankfully now back to our usual face-to-face meetings. We are fortunate to have a harmonious and respectful management team. Thanks go to Ashley Cardiff who steps down as President after a three- year term during some of the most externally challenging times in our Club's history. Thank you also to every Officeholder that volunteers their time and energy to make this a fantastic Club to be a part of.

Some treasured Club events were cancelled this season (in some instances for the second consecutive year): Lion Island Challenge, Around the Bends Ocean Swim and the Anzac Day community march. Our largest community and fundraising event, Carols at the Beach, was also cancelled and Lija Wilson, the Club's new Sponsorship/Marketing officeholder quickly assembled a fund raising committee of volunteers to organise a Silent Auction. The generosity of our community surpassed all expectations and 110 donations were received, 807 bids made and over \$30,000 raised (after expenses) in just under a month. It was great to be part of a small, focussed team of volunteers and to work with a fabulous group of women to get a job done.



With the closure of the Clubhouse through various lockdowns and severe, but necessary, restrictions placed on all venues around the country including reduced venue capacity (first one person per 4sqm and now one person per 2sqm), no dancing, no consuming alcohol whilst standing, no live music, no buffet service of food, unsurprisingly saw another year of venue hire falls.

Bangalley Bar private and Club function hire totalled 22 bookings, a further 53% decline on the 2019/20 season and a 70% drop from our 2018/19 peak of 75 hires. The Ocean Room bookings were considerably worse with only five events taking place, down from 40 bookings in the 2019/20 season and a 90% drop from its peak in 2017/18.



An unexpected benefit was the increase in community hire classes that commenced this year. Due to the per person square metre restrictions and the generous sized event spaces offered by the Clubhouse, six new hirers have joined our existing community hirers offering a range of yoga, pilates, barre and fitness classes to the general public. Long overdue Clubhouse cleaning schedules were reshuffled to meet the demand and the Bangalley Bar was quickly booked by two Monday morning classes.

A successful Australian Government Volunteer Grant application enabled us to upgrade our tired Meeting Room furnishings resulting in an increase in community and Club use.

Whilst COVID-19 is still ever-present, by the end of the season we returned to some sense of normality. Venue capacity restrictions remain in place, but we can drink vertically again and most of the party pooping protocols have been disbanded. Our Bar team, led by Nick Sampson and Jason Dale, has done a fantastic job together with Lija and Johnny Wilson (this season's Sponsorship/Marketing officeholders) invigorating our public bar opening sessions and driving revenue back into the Club.

Venue hire enquiry and forward bookings remain positive and it is wonderful to see our Clubhouse so well patronised by our members and members of our community once again.

As this report goes to print, all of Greater Sydney including the Central Coast, Blue Mountains and Shellharbour regions are in an ongoing lock down as new cases of a more contagious virus strain, "Delta", circulate, so far hospitalising 54 people (19 in ICU). Exercising outdoors is limited to two people and no more than 10kms from your home. Those over the age of 18 must carry proof of address in case they are approached by police officers. On the spot fines of \$200 apply for not wearing a mask or \$1000 for not following public health orders. Locals in regional areas are being encouraged to report any visitors to the authorities.

Car pooling and browsing in (mostly closed) shops is not allowed and one person per household each day may leave home for essential shopping. Here we go again!

LIFE MEMBERS FUND COMMITTEE REPORT

A Life Members Fund is a new initiative by the Club, aimed at retaining and encouraging younger members of the Club.

Background to the Fund: Life Member, Ken Davidson, bequeathed a considerable sum of money to Avalon Beach SLSC after his passing in June 2019. Active Life Members were asked to consider ways in which these funds could be best utilised.

Life Member, Roger Sayers, proposed that a Life Member Fund be established in Ken's honour, keeping the funds apart from normal Club operating and capital expenditure on an ongoing basis. And that his generous donation form the basis of a legacy fund to support youth development, to support our younger members particularly in the period between Nippers and the Senior Club, over the longer term.

The Fund would support youth development and encourage participation and inclusion, by providing financial support for, but not limited, to:

- SLSA Leadership Camp
- Juniors' team building events, tours, and social activities coordinated by ABSLSC or SLS bodies, by encouraging young members to have fun as part of a worthwhile community service, including out of season activities.

The Board of Management unanimously supported the establishment of a "Life Member Fund".

The Junior Captain is to submit ideas, candidates and an expenditure request to the Life Member Fund Committee for proposals to encourage members aged 13 – 17 who have attained their Surf Rescue Certificate and / or Bronze Medallion.

Annual funding for appropriate projects should not exceed \$1000, to provide some measure of longevity of the initial donated funds. In the event that no expenditure request is made, the Fund may gradually build, and if it is seen to be operating successfully, might encourage donations from other Life Members.

The Life Members Fund Committee will be responsible for assessing all funding requests received. It comprises four Life Members including an elected Chair.

Recommendations for expenditure by the Life Member Fund Committee will be referred to the BoM for adoption, funds management, and reported in the Club's Annual Report.

The Life Member Fund is a fitting legacy of Ken "Davo" Davidson's 70 years of service to the Club.

PUBLIC OFFICER AND GOVERNANCE REPORT

In 2018-19 we had stars in our eyes when the Club was recognised by our peers as the best surf life saving Club in Australia. That required excellence in many areas, including being one of the few Clubs to have a dedicated Public Officer and an independent Governance Panel.

In 2019-20 things were going well until the world started to hear of a deadly disease emerging from China. Few had heard of Coronavirus, but soon a new term entered the language. COVID-19 spread fear and death in a one in one hundred year global pandemic. Governments entered into unheard of levels of deficit to try to keep their economies from crashing, and many of us learned to work full time from home.

2020-2021 saw more of the same, with matters peaking in late December 2020 when one of our members became one of the first to become positive to the virus in what was to become the northern Northern Beaches lockdown area. Those who attended our Club's December Board of Management monthly meeting, held at the Avalon RSL Club, were forced into 14 day isolation as close contacts of an infected person there at the time. Christmas in our hotspot area was limited to five people in a household, with no travel into or out of the area. At its peak, sixty thousand of us were tested for the virus each day, most in our area. Clubs on the Northern Beaches ceased beach patrols for some time, and when they eventually resumed, numbers of people on the beaches were restricted based upon the area of each beach above the high tide marks. We reported numbers to Surfcom each hour, and beaches were closed as maximum calculated numbers were approached.

The role of the Public Officer is to be ultimately responsible for the Club's dealings with government. In the past year this was somewhat curtailed, but primarily involved COVID-19 related matters. These involved research and advice including into employment matters such as JobKeeper eligibility for our staff, alcohol licensing and restrictions on numbers in attendance at functions on the occasions when the Club was allowed to be open, government hardship assistance grants, Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission and NSW Government requirements for holding electronic AGMs and annual reporting requirements. Legal requirements, Australian Accounting and Auditing Standards and recent commentary were and are being addressed in relation to solvency and going concern matters in a period of closed doors and rent relief for tenants.

The Governance Panel acts independently of, but reports to, the Board of Management and ultimately to members. It is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Club's activities and operations. The Panel seeks to ensure good corporate governance, and to ascertain and to implement best practice including advice and education to members as required.

The Club's wealth of talent across all areas of operations meant that the Panel was not required to be very active in this extraordinary year, with occasional time given to assistance with administrative matters.

ROGER SAYERS OAM

Australian Honours and Awards recognise the outstanding service and contributions of Australians. We were extremely proud when Life Member, Roger Sayers, was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for service to surf lifesaving, announced by the Governor General of Australia, David Hurley AC DSC (Retd) on Australia Day.

Roger joined Avalon Beach SLSC in 1986 as a Nipper parent, was an Age Manager and gained his Bronze Medallion in 1987. This was followed by an IRB Driver's Award (Silver Medallion) in 1989, and SLSA's Gold Medallion in 1996. Roger was Club Captain, the longest serving in Club history, during a challenging and successful period. He introduced a number of surf lifesaving innovations and innovative patrol practices which continue today. He's held a variety of Officeholder and Board of Management positions, has competed at National, State (Gold Medal) and Branch levels, and is still an active patrolling member.

Roger was awarded Life Membership in 2007 and is still actively involved in the Club in the following positions: Publicity Officer, Heritage Committee (Chair), Life Members and Service Honours Awards Committee Member, Life Member Fund for Special Projects Committee Member and Active Bronze patrolling member.

Awards and recognition include: 30 Year Long Service Award Surf Lifesaving NSW 2015, Patrolman of the Year, 1991 and 1992, Norman Cook Memorial Award – Most Outstanding Club Member of the Year, 1993-1994 and 1996-1997 season, President's Award for Outstanding Service 1999.

The Order of Australia Medal was presented to Roger by State Governor Margaret Beazley AC QC at Government House on 6 May 2021.

Year 7 AR (After Renovations) has been a difficult year, with our Clubhouse being locked down for some 19 weeks because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The following dates show the timeline and how this impacted the use of the building:

All of the above events required COVID-19 Safety Plans and needed to operate under the defined guidelines. These events do not talk about all of the training squads for the Nippers, Bronze and refresher courses which were an enormous effort by our trainers. To get the Club through these difficult times and to come out of it in such a strong position has only been possible due to the many members involved in trying to ensure that normal operations occurred. However, acknowledgement and thanks must be made to the following:

- COVID Committee Robert Hopton (Chair), Leanne Austin, Ashley Cardiff, Richard Cole, Bernadette McKay, Nick Sampson, Tom Waters, Johnny Harper and Xanthe Friend.
- Bar Staff Nick Sampson, Jason Dale plus many others.
- Our amazing early morning swimmers Geoff Marles, Warren Burgess, Ross Cornwell and Jim O'Connor who volunteered to clean and disinfect the Club's change rooms on a daily basis for some six months.
- Leanne Austin who has shown great focus and aptitude in getting the community hire and function hire back to pre-COVID-19 levels.

All usage of the Club is guided by the restrictions placed on us by NSW Health. Without the acceptance of these by our members and the public we would not have been able to operate, so a big thank you to all for your understanding and commitment to ensure that we could operate in a safe environment.

The major activities held at the Club commenced in December with the Silent Auction, followed by social activities in late January. The Bangalley Bar opened on Sundays where we had the outstandingly successful promotion for Sunny Eddy Seltzer, a gin-based drink over a period of three weeks, followed by three weeks of DJ pumped music and then followed by four Sundays of Alfonso's pizzas. In those 10 weeks, the Bangalley Bar was packed, with one Sunday having over 170 people in attendance (this was of course after the restrictions were lifted). A huge thank you to Johnny and Lija Wilson, the Club's new Sponsorship and Marketing team. It would be fair to say that we raised a record amount of revenue during this period for the ongoing operation of the Club.

It is interesting that the majority of people who attended these events did not know that the Club had facilities like the Bangalley Bar with such a wonderful outlook and all stated that they will continue to frequent the Bar which is a great result for the future.

I would be remiss to not mention Nathan and Mel Wellings who organised the 24 Hour Row some four weeks after the Club was reopened. With the whole event organised around the COVID-19 restrictions, live streamed from 16 Clubs in three States, the outcome was extraordinary, raising a record amount of money through the contribution of a record number of Clubs involved – WOW.

We saw the addition of 70 solar panels paid for by the Silent Auction held in November. These have been installed and will be a welcome addition in making the Club carbon neutral - a great initiative led by Leena Wood, Sophie Scamps and Richard Cole. Unfortunately, the Club's big three events, Carols at the Beach, The Lion Island Challenge and the Surf Swim were cancelled. We hope that the Club will be able to host these events in 2021-2022.

As for the past years, the response from members in keeping the Club rooms and sheds clean and organised has been fantastic – our Caretakers Johnny and Xanthe as well as Alan Moran and Terry Barber ensure that the interiors and the sheds have been kept cleaned and ready to go and Col Campbell for his maintenance work around the building - to all, thank you for continuing to make our Clubhouse such a resounding success.



Comments about the building from both Club members and the public remain overwhelmingly positive, demonstrating that our Club continues to fit our needs and public expectations.

The following are my comments on the main areas in the Club and how they are functioning:

- The Bangalley Bar has accommodated all the events outlined in this report and in other sections of the Annual Report. There will be some additional work in the future, including outdoor heaters (portable gas heaters) if required, outdoor speakers and a light over the bbq. The boaties have continued to outperform, especially on days where our patronage has broken all records, fantastic results.
- Ocean Room floor to be sanded and matched finish to the Bangalley Bar. Ceiling to be fixed
- The office has provided our highly capable Director of Administration, Leanne Austin, a great environment to ensure that the Club's business is managed and that the necessary reports for Branch and NSW are all completed in a timely manner. Leanne is also responsible for the hiring of the Bangalley Bar and she continually receives very positive feedback from all hirers regarding the quality of the space.
- The Meeting Room has had a small number of hires this year and has been used for Bronze squads and Board of Management meetings.
- The Hall of Champions honour boards and photos will be updated once the IRB competition results come in the later part of 2021.
- The Members change rooms are working well with the door frames being sanded and painted.
- The Nippers Shed continues to work well.
- The IRB/Board Shed, the Boat Shed and the Patrol Shed have all stood the test of time. There is a proposal to extend the board racks in the Patrol Shed which will be completed in time for the opening of the season.
- The Garbage Shed is now under the Club's control as the restaurant has closed for winter. New locks have been attached, hopefully preventing random drop offs into the bins.

- The Gym has had issues with COVID-19, with Brent working very hard to keep his business thriving. All Club members should remember that it is open and that it's there to be used.
- The Caretakers, Johnny and Xanthe continue to manage, clean and look after the Clubhouse in an exemplary manner ensuring that the maintenance issues that continue to be raised are brought to Council's attention.

As with last year, we endeavoured to minimise capital expenditure on the building and directed any surplus funds towards rescue equipment.

Last year, we mentioned that we had been talking to Council regarding the works to the northern end of the Club House. These works commenced in May of this year and are due to be completed by the time this report is published. Thank you to the Northern Beaches Council. The building is accommodating all of the functions that were briefed and built for, and it is fantastic to see it being used, enjoyed and treated with respect.


CARETAKERS

Our regular cleaning schedule has changed slightly from last year due to changes in the yoga schedule. Our regular cleaning schedule is as follows:

- Monday the entire Club undergoes a regular weekly clean both externally and internally, upstairs and downstairs.

Use of the showers has increased dramatically over the last six months, as has non-member use. Sand loads are becoming harder to manage. We're hoping that all members will do the right thing and question/introduce themselves to those they are not familiar with around the Clubhouse. The use of Club facilities is a (mostly) hard earned privilege for members only. If they are not members, they should be asked to leave.

Apart from Xanthe's car, vandalism has been minimal over the last 12 months and graffiti has been almost non-existent this year. It would appear that our policy of removing graffiti as soon as possible has been a very successful deterrent. If you do notice any, please inform us quickly so we can act in a prompt manner.

Ken "Davo" Davidson Memorial Garden

The BoM endorsed a proposal to name the small garden near the Club's front door, the Ken "Davo" Davidson Memorial Garden, in recognition of Life Member Ken's 70 years of service to the Club and the considerable time he devoted to caring for the garden and grass at the front of the Club over many years. A small plaque is being produced that will complement the existing plaque.

The Heritage Committee's background

The Club has a wealth of historic items such as photos of the first IRB, Warren Mitchell's OAM and Innovation Awards, Australian SLS Titles Gold Medals, vintage toothpick surfboard and surf ski, surf reels, trophies, awards and so on. The Club adds to these items all the time as for example new awards like the State and National Club of the Year Awards are achieved, and as a result of members' innovative ideas and the Club's involvement in the community.

Such items of memorabilia play an important role. Club memorabilia is not just for the benefit of present members, but for former members, their families, and for future members and the general public. The 24 Hour Row event was a huge success in 2020. COVID-19 didn't deter an extra 13 Clubs joining the existing three Surf Life Saving Clubs from 2019, resulting in over 600

participants and a total of \$130,000 raised for Gotcha4Life and One Eighty. In the three years that the event has been held, the 24 Hour Row has raised \$218,000 in total. A phenomenal result.

Although the event co-ordinators had a huge job maintaining Covid safety, which seemed like a mammoth task to uphold for the whole 24 hours, each Club abided by the rules and all participants were kept safe. This year we hope to invite the community back to the Club, as a participant or as a spectator, and the Covid Marshalls can stand down.

In 2020, the entire 24 hours was streamed on Zoom, meaning we had viewers watching, and donating, from all over the

world. Being able to watch our fellow rowers around Australia through the 24 hours was entertaining and heart-warming, highlighting the collaboration between SLS Clubs for the mutual goal of raising as many funds as possible to be used in their own communities that they row for.

Gotcha4Life followed up the fund raiser with online seminars for both men and women which had great participation and, with hope, we will be able to raise more funds again this year, and more seminars will become available to those individuals with a focus on helping friends and family who are facing challenges in life.


As a result of the Avalon COVID-19 cluster linked to the Avalon Beach RSL and Avalon Bowlo growing to 38 cases, a three-week Coronavirus lockdown was enforced on the Northern Beaches from 19 December to Sunday 10 January 2021.

The well-planned Ocean Swim Series, now in its ninth year, was cancelled at Newport, Bilgola Beach and Mona Vale, however, The Big Swim (from Palm Beach to Whale Beach) presented by Whale Beach SLSC went ahead on 31 January with a COVID-19 plan and restricted numbers. 577 swimmers took to the water. Bilgola had a second shot and rescheduled their January event to 18 April and had a total of 159 entrants.

Our own Around the Bends and Avalon Beach Surf Swims were unfortunately cancelled for the second year due to the Coronavirus pandemic and conditions.

DOUG CRANE CLASSIC

The Doug Crane Classic is an annual swimming race to decide who the best surf swimmers in the Club are. Last season's Doug Crane Classic was postponed due to the Avalon Beach COVID-19 cluster so this event, held in February this year, was our 2019/20 version. We will have the 2021 race at the usual time on the last Sunday before Christmas.

After a week of easterlies, the Sunday morning was calm with a strong and building NE swell so we decided to hug the rocks at the North end, use the rip and set a 'U' shaped course finishing at the flags just North of the Max Watt Lookout, some 728 metres.

Twenty swimmers lined up in challenging conditions, enough to discourage all but older Nippers from competing. Once Life Member Warren Young blew the starting whistle, there wasn't time to worry. The rip did its thing and whisked everyone out way past the group of board riders and around the first buoy watched over by the excellent IRB crew of Alan Mahn and Nina Mills. Swimmers then headed South past two more buoys guarded by our gun beach lifeguard Greg

"Red Dog" Moss and Sunday Swim champ Bob Richardson. Further water safety was added by additional Patrol 4 members Michael Kurtz, Richard Stutchbury and Sally Mayman who kept an eye on things, swimming at the back of the pack.

Gem Lehman proved too strong again in the Women's and won in 10min 16sec with Julia Jones-Hughes a good second and Nipper, Krystal Elliott, third. Virginia Head's effort was amazing to be able to participate and finish in those conditions. Virginia is 78 years young. The Men's race was won convincingly in 9min 01sec by Ashley Brown; his 4th Doug Crane Classic win. Mike Stanley-Jones was an excellent second and, big improver, Daniel Elliott third.

To win one Sunday Swim can be an exercise in deduction and mathematics ie: how far, any rips, chance of catching a wave etc. requiring an excellent knowledge of your swimming and surfing ability plus a slice of good fortune. With the 'guess your time' system, buttering up the handicapper is a thing of the past.

To win or place on the end of season scoreboard you need additional qualities like motivation, will to win, fitness, determination, a dash of courage and more good luck. You don't have to be the best swimmer but it helps.

Ashley Brown had all of the above qualities winning or coming second six times. He finished with a very high 45 points. Second, again, was the ever-consistent Catherine Buddin with 33 points, third was Mike Stanley-Jones on 30 points, followed by Bob Richardson, Andrew Clark, Anton van der Vegt and Charlie Brown (tie for 6th) Stephen Riley, Julia Jones-Hughes and Gem Lehman rounded out the top ten.

All in all a great season with lots of new swimmers, Bronzies and parents with their Nippers joining in the fun and enjoying time with the mythical 'Huey'.

Swell Café again provided our sought-after weekly prize.

AVALON BEACH SURF LIFE SAVING CLUB: CARBON NEUTRAL CLUB 2023

One Club, One Vision

Avalon Beach SLSC was awarded Australian Club of the Year in 2018, measured on a range of metrics such as patrol attendance and hours and the number of Bronze Certifications.

Richard Cole, then President said: "Our great achievement this year was working together as one Club. As a movement, we're doing incredible things as lifesavers and we really can be the heart and soul of our community."

In the subsequent years following this accolade, the ethos and drive to work together could be seen in new initiatives to create educational opportunities for members of all ages and addressing the growing issue around youth mental health. Avalon Beach SLSC hosted and ran events with Lifeline and local support group OneEighty and created learning opportunities within the Nippers canteen to help young members become familiar with the retail environment.

Extending on the Club's ability to execute as a cohesive team, Avalon Beach SLSC started to examine sustainability within the Club and how some areas could be addressed and improved.

Creating a Sustainable Future

In recent years, the Nippers team has undertaken several initiatives to minimise the impact of over 400 Nippers and their parents on the beach environment.

These initiatives include:

REUSE

- In conjunction with Clean Oceans Australia to provide every single Nipper with their own metal reusable water bottle, and providing access to refill their bottles with clean drinking water.
- Coffee and other hot beverages were only sold if Nipper families brought a reusable coffee cup.*
- Rainwater collection and usage for several years rainwater has been used to wash down all surf equipment after Nippers and for use after all Club activities.

RECYCLE

- Envirobank Recycling collections, in association with the NSW Government's Container Deposit Scheme (CDS) to provide Surf Clubs with a sustainable fundraising channel.
- All items that could be recycled were collected and recycled, such as eggshells, paper packaging, milk cartons and any other soft plastics.

REDUCE

- Zero Food Waste from Canteen Selling out of food every week so there is no waste to landfill.
- Planning using technology to ask families to register their

food choices for special events, avoiding the guesswork of supply and subsequent waste.

- Shop locally supporting local businesses that supply food at cost, increasing fundraising capabilities as well as reducing the carbon footprint of transportation. Additionally, collections were 'waste free' where food safety compliant containers were filled with supplies rather than wrapped in plastic.
- Soft drinks were removed from the canteen and the fridge disconnected, saving energy as well as encouraging the best options for rehydration after exercise.

*Requirement removed during COVID-19 Safety Plan implementation

Solar Power for the Future

Momentum was building and benefits were being seen immediately. A group of Nipper parents drove the solar initiative, from ideation to landing on the vision:

"Carbon Neutral by 2023"

The plan has key objectives with a planned approach across three years.

GOALS

- Energy efficiency, carbon reduction
- Reduce the power bills for Avalon Beach SLSC
- Climate Change education and activities for all Club members
- Knowledge sharing across other Clubs in NSW and Australia

Through the installation of high-quality solar panels and battery storage, Avalon Beach SLSC aims to be the first Club in NSW to eliminate its carbon footprint, creating a Carbon Neutral Surf Club by 2023


The Club is currently underway with Year 2 of the plan to becoming Carbon Neutral by 2023. In the coming months, applications will be made for the next round of environmental grants made available by **Northern Beaches Council** and by the Federal Government. Community fundraising will also continue later in the year when Nippers commences.

Thanks to McGrath Pittwater, Northern Beaches Council Environmental Grant, and all who donated and purchased items at the Silent Auction.

Thanks also to Silent Auction Committee for fundraising, to **Our Blue Dot** (local Sustainability and Climate Action Community Group) for connecting the Club to experts, and to **Arc Aerial** for the drone footage and images of the project.

Special thanks to Richard Cole for advocating the project from inception.

CELEBRATING 40 YEARS OF WOMEN IN SURF LIFE SAVING

"So it was that on 1 July 1980, the SLSA finally admitted women as full members. The entrenched attitudes of many male members and their Clubs had through force of reason, expediency, simple political will and clout, been persuaded that women could save lives, participate in competitions and administration, and carry out all the responsibilities and enjoyments of surf lifesaving just as well as men."

Excerpt from Evolution of an Icon.

July 1 2020 marked the 40 year anniversary of one of the most significant changes in surf lifesaving history; the acceptance of women being able to gain their Bronze Medallions and participate as active surf life savers around Australia.

Whilst this anniversary celebrates the formal introduction of women in Surf Life Saving at a national level, it should be noted that women have been actively involved in the movement, mostly working behind the scenes, without formal recognition, since the movement began. Our earliest surviving Annual Report 1947-48 called for the reestablishment of a Ladies Committee to support the Club's fundraising efforts through social functions (this committee predated the war era). The Ladies Committee (though unfortunately not its members) was formally acknowledged for maintaining the Club's high reputation as carnival hosts in the 1952-53 Annual Report.

In the Club's 1979/80 Annual Report, the then Secretary recorded the amendment to the Club's constitution "to permit female members. For next season we are now able to accept female members on an equal basis to the men".

It is only fitting that in this 40th year, we take a moment to reflect on our own female trailblazers.

Today, 39% of our Club's Active 18+ membership is female and women contribute in all areas of surf life saving from active patrolling, training, surf sports, administration, fund raising and everything in between. Whilst 47% of our membership is female, there is still an under representation of women in leadership roles within the movement (just over 20%) and the Club with 25% of positions on the Board of Management currently occupied by women, and four female patrol captains.

We still have a way to go to support our female members to assume greater leadership roles in our Club and encourage all of our members to apply for the many excellent leadership programs offered by Surf Life Saving Australia.

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WOMEN'S MENTORING PROGRAM

As an organisation, Surf Life Saving Australia embraces the importance of diversity, inclusion and gender equality and, with this in mind, this season saw the launch of the national body's first Women's Mentoring Program. Sadly whilst we have just celebrated 40 years of women in lifesaving the number of female leaders holding senior positions nationally is still very low, being only 20.6%.

In an effort to identify and develop emerging female leaders within SLS, the program paired 20 mentors with 20 mentees across the country with the aim of supporting women and developing their leadership skills and furthering their contribution to surf lifesaving.

The program ensures there is visibility and support of women ready for leadership positions, so they can fully utilise their potential to make a difference to our organisation.

Avalon Beach SLSC was represented by Deputy President Bernadette McKay and Life Member Christine Hopton who were honoured to be selected from 160 applicants.

Christine was mentor to SLS member Kate Burke, who teaches in remote areas in Western Australia and is a member of both the Broome and Fremantle Clubs, and Bernadette was mentored by Rae Lawson, President of Henley Surf Lifesaving Club in Adelaide. Each mentee is selected based on demonstrated leadership abilities and their potential and willingness to develop further in this area and move into leadership positions within SLS.

Zoom saw us catch up for individual meetings and monthly workshops guided by McCarthy Mentoring who assisted us with goal setting, networking, career planning, understanding strengths and weaknesses, conflict resolution and how to build resilience etc - all the essential tools for becoming a great leader. As a former President of our Club, Christine has always placed a great importance on encouraging fellow females to step up to the mark when it comes to taking on the challenges of leadership, and this program is cementing those ideals.

As with anything we do within the movement it is important to spread the message of what this initiative is providing and we are seeking out male champions to further the opportunities for women in leadership roles. We hope anyone reading this will reach out for the young women in their clubs and encourage them to step outside their comfort zone and have a go.

The year-long program has enabled a wonderful group of women to connect individually, and as teams, and hopefully will see us all in the same room at upcoming SLSA events. The success of this year's program has ensured it will be an annual initiative for years to come.





Both events ensured all competitors' endurance levels were tested as all buoys were put out at maximum competition length and with little swell prevailing at either event, fitness played a major part.

At State at an individual level both Chris McGuckin and Ashley Brown flew the flag whilst on the second day our female Masters' team of Julia Jones-Hughes and Aisha Ferris were rewarded with Gold in the Board Rescue event after a fine swim and well synchronised paddle to shore. The male team of Ashley Brown and Grant Salmon attempted to replicate the ladies' effort but were awarded Silver for their efforts.

With COVID-19 playing havoc with travel plans, only a small contingent of competitors headed to Aussies but we did well overall across a number of events at an individual level.

Julie Jones-Hughes started the medal count gaining Silver in the 2km Ocean Swim and Amanda "Gem" Lehman achieved Silver in the 2km Beach Run. In the male events, seasoned competitor Chris McGuckin gained Silver in his Board race and Bronze in the Iron Man. Ashley Brown placed a creditable third in his Surf race and was first out in the team Surf race but unfortunately his team mates were not in close proximity to the leaders to build on Ashley's achievement. In Surfing, (what there was of it) Jean Harper competed admirably in both the Long and Short Board events gaining Bronze in the later. All in all a great season for the Masters given the circumstances.

I thank our Junior Committee Members and Coaches for their many hours, days, years of selfless, behind the scenes dedication to the Club to keep the Nippers program running smoothly – Leena Wood, Kari Browne, Amanda Wolthers, Mike Stanley-Jones, Cam Lane, Gem Lehman and Shannon Fletcher– your hours of service are appreciated by the Avalon Beach community.

With such a large group of Age Managers, all with a great variety of skills, we successfully engaged with over 420 kids. This year we had 16 female Age Managers across the U6-U14 group – up from 12 last year and eight the year before that!! What was also incredible is this year we had a team of three teenagers become Age Managers across various age groups. They were brilliant!!!

For the Age Managers and involved parents of the U14s SRC group (who do not have any younger kids left to take through Nippers), on behalf of the Surf Club and community we say a massive thank you and farewell. You have left Avalon Beach Nippers in a stronger place than you found it. A special mention to Joel Evans and Darren Letts who have coached these kids since the U6 and Dave Roberts for taking the lead training role. It was great to see

2021 COMPETITION REPORT

Our carnival team has gone from strength to strength this season. 

When they sign-up for their Bronze Medallions they will also each get a fob key to the Surf Club which will offer hot showers and the use of paddle boards all year round. This has proven to be very popular.

Our SRC, U14s group had the largest graduating class for the last decade (possibly in the Club's entire history) with 59 kids all successfully learning their Surf Rescue techniques and First Aid and are now being mentored towards being Active Patrolling members for Avalon Beach SLSC. Nice to see some enthusiastic young blood running around. The SRC programme has been an amazing success – over the past decade Avalon Beach has graduated 436 kids - an average of almost 44 a year. ANZA NIPPERS

Nippers Pivoting During Covid

ANZA Singapore Nippers, launched in 2016, is a not-for-profit volunteer group where children from 5-13 years of age participate in fun activities at Palawan Beach, Singapore to learn essential ocean and swimming skills. Our Age Managers are all members of Avalon Beach SLSC and undertake their Bronze Medallion training and Skills Maintenance sessions via online or face-to-face training.

COVID-19 and its restrictions are barriers but not game changers. Since last March when Circuit Breaker began, committee members at ANZA Singapore Nippers faced many challenges. Having a hard stance that the game must go on, committee members were forced to pivot and through months of planning and discussions, they finally formulated a plan to return kids back to beach for life saving fun.

Challenge #1 – Beach Bookings

When you think of Nippers, you think of the beach. But what do you do if the beach is no longer easily accessible? This was one major obstacle faced by Nippers in 2021. When Sentosa beach reopened, a booking system was implemented. All weekend attendees must book one week in advance. Coordinating beach bookings across all participants and their family members seemed like a huge task however with precise coordination and thorough communication, Age Managers managed to remind participants to book slots seven days in advance. Being mindful not to overbook and over account for attendances, it was advised to only book for the numbers required for Sunday sessions.

Challenge #2 – Group Size

New Covid regulations restrict group sizes to be five (maximum) only. What this meant for Nippers is that some age groups needed to be reduced and segregated into more than one team. This led to further issues of restrictions where each team also requiring Age Managers to run the classes and Bronze Medallion holders (Bronzies) to oversee the safety of the children entering the water. The solution was to recruit more parents as Age Managers and ensuring that group sizes were kept at 5, with each team operating autonomously to each other.

Nippers was also able to recruit a local Singaporean life saver to volunteer her time weekly to teach water safety and patrol the ocean from afar to ensure the children were safe in the water.

Challenge #3 - Safety Distancing

To keep strict social distancing protocols, teams are spread amongst two zones in Palawan beach and a Nippers Safety

Distance volunteer ensures that parents do not segregate near their children where lessons are held. This means that the drop off and pick up process for participating members are coordinated accordingly so that parents ensure their children reach their team safely (checking in to their assigned Age Manager) and children are checked out officially without the need for parents to hang around and intermingle.

Challenge #4 – Fun and Community

The essence of Nippers continues to be fun with focused on essential water safety, surfboard, and swimming skills however a large part of the essence is team building and community spirit. Age Managers have been provided with a session booklet for games and skillsets markers to be reached by each child. Equipment volunteers (participant's parents) help carry and distribute heavy equipment such as boards and accessories for games such as ladders, flags, balls and hurdles. Keeping the teams small also allow children to form closer bonds with their coach and their peers.

Families are encouraged to raise community spirit through fundraising events such as the new Nippers merchandise range creating a feeling of belonging and togetherness.

COVID-19 and 2021 has certainly posed many challenges on Singapore ANZA Nippers. We successfully participated in sessions from March to mid-May of 2021, however, the introduction of tighter measures from May 16 where group sizes were decreased to two persons per outing, Nippers had to be suspended without warning. We are now eagerly awaiting the second half of the year to be more at ease and allow us all to be back on the beach for more Nippers fun!

FINANCE

On behalf of the Avalon Beach SLSC Board of Management, I present this ye ar's financial accounts for member's consideration and adoption for the year ended 30 April 2021. In keeping with the prior years, these accounts have been prepared to provide our members and other stakeholders with financial information about the Club's operations, the financial position and cash flow activity.

The special purpose financial statements have been prepared to satisfy the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act, the Associations Incorporation Act, the Australian Charities and Not for Profits Act, and the Club's constitution. The accounts have been compiled by Beweiszer Accounting and Tax firm and independently audited by Mr Peter Power in accordance with the applicable Australian Auditing Standards. These accounts cover the period 1 May 2020 to 30 April 2021.

The Statement of Comprehensive Income records a surplus of \$102,240 which was better than budget expectations. Contributing to this surplus was additional Government subsidies and other Grants (due to COVID) received and provided a welcome offset against our other revenue streams affected by COVID. However, towards the end of the financial year and as government restrictions eased, our community hire and Bangalley Bar revenue returned to their pre COVID levels.

One of our major fundraising events – Carols at the Beach was cancelled and on short notice Club members Lija Wilson, Caroline Walsh, Anna Lohe, Rebecca Stevens, Niccii Kugler,

Leanne Austin and Emma Belcher put together a very successful silent auction fundraiser which contributed over \$30,000 in revenue. Due to bad weather, the Around the Bends Swim was cancelled and no income has been recorded for this event in the accounts. This year it was decided to discount our membership fees to retain members and the shortfall was covered by a grant from SLSNSW. Nipper membership revenue has continued to grow over the past three years and now represents our largest income category.

Expenditure during the period totalled \$363,545 and was limited to essential items and services only.

The Club's cash position improved \$134,000 over the prior year. With net assets increasing to \$457,119, up from \$354,879 in 2020 and, as recorded, the statement of financial position.

Capital expenditure was reduced by \$29,000 compared with 2020. Capital purchased during the period included a 33kw PV Solar system, IRB motors and fuel storage, Bennett Nipper and Rescue Boards and Bangalley Bar furniture. Administration equipment and a meeting room table was purchased with the proceeds of an Australian Government Volunteer Grant.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Management for their support. Especially my predecessor – Bernadette McKay for setting up excellent systems and processes which have greatly assisted me in this role.





Notes to the Financial Statements

AVALON BEACH SURF LIFE SAVING CLUB INC For the year ended 30 April 2021

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and the club's constitution. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows

AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 1031 Materiality

AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards

AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income *Tax* Assessment Act 1997.

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial Assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost orfair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets at amortised cost.

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Association changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Amortised cost

Assets measured at amortised cost are financial assets where:

- the business model is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

The Association's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Subsequent to initial recognition, these assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method less provision for impairment.

Interest income, and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for financial assets measured at amortised cost.

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Association considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Association's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Association uses the presumption that an asset which is more than 30 days past due has seen a significant increase in credit risk.

The Association uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when:

- the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Association in full, without recourse to the Association to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or
- the financial asset is more than 90 days past due.

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Association in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

Trade receivables

Impairment of trade receivables has been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses. The Association has determined the probability of non-payment of the receivable and multiplied this by the amount of the expected loss arising from default.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Association renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

Other financial assets measured at amortised cost

Impairment of other financial assets measured at amortised cost is determined using the expected credit loss model in AASB 9. On initial recognition of the asset, an estimate of the expected credit losses for the next 12 months is recognised. Where the asset has experienced significant increase in credit risk then the lifetime losses are estimated and recognised.

Financial Liabilities

The Association measures all financial liabilities initially at fair value less transaction costs; subsequently financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

The financial liabilities of the Association is comprised of trade payables.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Leases

The Association applies AASB 16: Leases which applies a single lessee accounting model that eliminates the requirement for lease to be classified as operating or finance leases.

The Association also applies AASB 2018-8Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Right-of-Use Assets of Not-for-Profit Entities. This standard allows that where the lessee is a not-for-profit entity, the lessee may elect to measure right-of-use assets on a class-by-class basis at initial recognition at fair value.

In addition, where a lessee is a not-for-profit entity and elects to measure a class or classes of right-of-use assets at initial recognition at cost for leases that have significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives, the lessee shall disclose additional qualitative and quantitative information about those leases.

The disclosures so provided by a not-for-profit entity shall be provided individually for each material lease that has significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives or in aggregate for leases involving right-of-use assets of a similar nature.

At the date of this report the Association as lessee had entered into a lease on significantly below-market terms with Northern Beaches Council. As a not-for-profit entity the Association elects to measure Land and Buildings right-of-use assets at cost to enable the Association to further its objectives of the provision of life saving services at Avalon Beach.

The nature and terms of this lease are:

- The lease payments are \$1 per annum payable in arrears on demand
- The lease term is for 21 years from 1 January2015 to 31 December 2035
- The asset the subject of the lease is the building at 558A Barrenjoey Road, Avalon Beach NSW less certain sections of that building let to other tenants
- The lease provides that the Association shall be entitled to use the leased premises only as a surf life saving club and other
 uses incidental including permitted rooms hire and functions.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Inventories

Inventories comprises goods for resale and goods for distribution at no or nominal consideration as part of the Association's charitable activities. Inventories may be purchased or received by way of donation.

Goods for resale

Inventories of goods for resale are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

Goods held for distribution

Donated goods and goods purchased for nominal consideration held for distribution are initially recognised at their current replacement cost at date of acquisition. Inventories of goods purchased and held for distribution are initially recognised at cost. The cost of bringing each product to its present location and condition is determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

7. Subsequent Events

The World Health Organisation (WHO) declared the COVID-19 virus a global health emergency on 30 January 2020. Global trade and markets have been significantly disrupted, and many businesses have had to, or will have to, limit or suspend their operations. All global share markets have suffered significant falls since 30 January 2020. The Committee has assessed the impact of the pandemic on the Financial Statements of the Association. There is no effect of the pandemic on the asset values as at 30 April 2021.

8. Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, which assumes the Association will be able to continue its trading activities.

The Association made a trading profit of \$102,240 for the year ended 30 April 2021, with a positive equity position of \$457,119.

The Association's ability to meet its obligations as and when they fall due and continue as a going concern is dependent on a number of factors. These include the ability of the Association to perform in line with budgets and cash flow projections, in addition to achieving sustainable levels of trading and membership in the future.

The Association will continue to comply with government regulation and SLSA pronouncements, including proposals for staged relaxation of lock down and other restrictions.

The timing and extent of these measures, and the ongoing effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on the Association's operations are not presently known.

The Association is currently reviewing its operations to determine any possible cost efficiencies and alternative trading operations. The Committee has determined that the going concern assumption is appropriate for the preparation of the financial statements.



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JIM DEMOS

Jim joined the Club in the mid-1960s and although he took to the boats, he really only rowed socially; "training was too much like hard work".

This lovable scallywag loved his food almost as much as he loved his beer and my sister Diana, with whom he kept company for two years.

Although he was known to most as "Fatty" he had nowhere near the proportions of "Kegs" (Doug Wells). It was also before Paul Vautin (also called "Fatty") came on the footy scene with the Sea Eagles.

In 1968 the Club won the grand final of the Junior Beach Football competition and most opposition Hookers feared the thought of packing down opposite Fatty, let alone trying to stop the rampaging sandstorm bearing down on them once he'd got a full head of steam up after breaking from a ruck. To Dennis Casali "Fatty" was "Luigi" and only "Luigi" was allowed to call Dennis "The Wop" - a special privilege between two European ancestral gentlemen! Although Dennis played reserve grade for the Balmain Tigers, Jim chose to play Rugby Union with St Ives for a few years along with several other Club members: Barry Frost, "Friendly", Tommy Schwietzer and "Snap" (Geoff Harris).

Jim originally worked for Simms (scrap metal dealers) at Mascot when he lived at Summerhill. After some years was offered a better job in Launceston, Tasmania, as manager of Nonferral Scrap Metal. Here he met and married the love of his life, Sallie. In later years they made frequent visits to Bali with Club members, including the Feehelys and the "Friendlys". They have two boys, Con and Nick. Sadly Jim passed away on 14 January 2021.

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DON IMISON, Life Member

Don Imison ("Imo") was born at Drummoyne on 5 November 1927.

After Primary School at Drummoyne came Ultimo Technical College where he earned his engineering degree. Like several early members he joined Nestlé at Abbotsford.

In 1950 he was transferred to Smithtown near Kempsey where the engineering department needed some leadership. The Tool Manager there recommended he join the local Surf Club. He was awarded his Bronze Medallion at Kempsey and joined South West Rocks SLSC.

After a short stint at Kempsey he returned to Nestlé, living with Mum and Dad at Cremorne. For several years his parents, Len and Celia, rented the house next-door to the Searl's in Avalon Parade and it was there I met Don (I was 8 and Don was 27) around 1954.

Don got to know the guys in the Surf Club and would travel down to Avalon Beach to help out with patrols, staying overnight in the Clubhouse. Don met Beryl at her sister's (Margorie) engagement party to Reg Wood.

Beryl also worked at the Nestlé factory. It was through Reg (who was already a Club member) that Don was formally introduced to the Club.

Don joined the "ball and chain gang" (as it was called in those days) when he married Beryl in 1956.

Initially they lived in a vacant unit above the Ambulance Station at Drummoyne where his Dad was a voluntary ambulance driver.

Around 1960 they bought a block of land and built a house in Patrick Street.

Don was present at the 1956 Open Carnival in November on Avalon Beach when the visiting Hawaiians and Americans "hotdogged" their way to the beach on shorter boards – the first "mals".

Don served as the Club Secretary for five seasons from 1956/57.

He was very appropriately awarded Life Membership for services to the Club in 1972 and witnessed all three stages of the built Clubhouse.

In 2006 Don was one of an elite group of members who were awarded the first 60 year Service Award. He was also awarded the Distinguished Service Award from SLS Sydney Northern Beaches.

The Imisons joined with a large group of Club members who used to spend three weeks of their Christmas holidays at Sussex Inlet. Beryl has commented that they were wonderful times.

Don passed away on Australia Day this year, leaving behind Beryl and two children, Vicki and Jeff.

REGINALD (REG) WOOD Life Member

Life Member, Avalon Beach SLSC, Sussex Inlet SLSC, South Coast Branch SLS and Surf Life Saving NSW.

21/04/1926 - 9/3/2021 (aged 94) Club legend and Life Member, Reg

"Mongrel", "Clem" Wood, "retired" in 2014 after 70 years of continuous active service to the Surf Life Saving Clubs of Avalon Beach and Sussex Inlet.

Reg first joined Avalon Beach Surf Life Saving Club in 1944 after responding to a call for assistance through the Police Boys Club (where Reg was training and competing in wrestling) as the Surf Club was suffering from too few members due to member enlistment in WW2.

Reg, along with Police Boys Club members from Woolloomooloo and Leichhardt Clubs, made the long trip up the coast to Avalon Beach first via bus and, in later years, in an old Packard, and camped out over the weekend in a rat infested Clubhouse with cold showers.

Reg obtained his Surf Life Saving Bronze Medallion on 21 January, 1945. Over the ensuing decades Reg held various committee positions including Club Captain (1955/56), Vice Club Captain, Board Captain, Social Secretary and was a member of the Judiciary and Life Membership committees.

As a competitor he was 1st at Bilgola in the Double Ski (1954/55) and 1st again at Bilgola (1956/57) as well as 1st at Double Ski at Newport in the same season, 1st in the Ski Race at Avalon Beach (1949/50), 1st at Palm Beach in Ski (1951/52) and 1st in the Marathon Race (1946/47).

In 1965 Reg's extraordinary service to Avalon Beach was rewarded with Life Membership.

Upon retirement from work in 1989, Reg and his wife Margorie (sister of Life Member Don Imison's wife Beryl), headed south to Sussex Inlet where his affiliation with Surf Life Saving and the bounty of knowledge and skill he possessed transferred to the small local club. During his membership with Sussex Inlet Reg obtained over 45 Surf Life Saving Awards. In 1996 Reg Wood joined the South Coast Branch Board of Examiners and later the Board of Lifesaving as an Assessor and Trainer.

In 2014, after retiring from active duty, Reg was interviewed by Pittwater Life and asked "What is your'motto for life' or a favourite phrase you try to live by?" "I guess mine would be if there's something to do, do it', don't wait for somebody else to do it'... I think that would be about it lass".

True to his word, and now with more time on his hands, Reg started sharing his memories of his patrol years at Avalon Beach and over the past six years sent volumes of stories, anecdotes and history all hand typed and delivered in his undeniably cheeky and fun manner.

I never had the privilege of meeting Reg but through our regular exchange of letters and phone calls I know he was a gentleman, a family man, a music lover and had the cheekiest sense of humour. Reg often ended his correspondence with a reminder that whilst he now lived in Sussex Inlet, Avalon Beach was always where his heart was. Vale my friend.




