EDUCATION AWARDS

Richard obtained his Bronze Medallion at Avalon Beach in November 2006 and has patrolled more than 700 hours.

Since obtaining his Bronze Medallion in November 2006, Richard has amassed a total of 66 Education Awards and maintains the following awards:

Bronze Medallion, IRB Crew Certificate, Silver Medallion IRB Driver, Advanced Resuscitation Techniques, First Aid, Silver Medallion Beach Management and Training Officer IRB.

NEW CLUBHOUSE 2009 - 2014

Richard was part of the Building Committee (with Christine and Robert Hopton) that worked with the (then) Pittwater Council and NSW Government to deliver a new surf club. As a recognised architect, Richard developed initial concept designs to explore the possibility for a new Clubhouse. Richard drafted the Development Application lodged with Council in 2011 and prepared three significant grant applications, ultimately securing \$370,000 in grants for the project. Once the project was endorsed by Council, Richard and the Building Committee oversaw the building tender process and approached major suppliers for discounted/at cost products and services. Richard, Robert and Christine also negotiated the new lease with Pittwater Council.

CLUB PRESIDENCY 2015/2016 - 2017/2018

Richard developed the Club's first Strategic Plan, shaping the future direction of the Club. The plan addressed all aspects of the Club, from Lifesaving to Nippers, Administration to Surf Sports, Education to Governance and Finance and outlined goals, strategies and performance indicators to provide a framework for the continuing improvement of the Club.

SLSNSW AND SLSA CLUB OF THE YEAR SUBMISSION 2018/2019

In a Club first, Richard initiated and prepared the Club's submission for SLSNSW's Club of the Year Award.
Following the success of being awarded NSW Club of the Year, came the preparation of the National Club of the Year nomination where Richard led a small committee that undertook an enormous amount of work including a five-page written submission, a 20-minute presentation followed by 30 minutes of Q&A.

It was a proud moment when Avalon Beach was awarded the DHL National Club of the Year Award.



LIFE MEMBER RICHARD MITCHELL





Rick (Richard) Mitchell gained his Bronze Medallion on 16th March 1980 at Avalon Beach and since then has been an active member. Over this time, Rick has patrolled an estimated 1200 hours (30 hours per season) which includes more than 10 years as a Patrol Captain. Rick has also been an active competitor and historically was a regular participant at club championships and Sunday swims. Rick has been a long-term Trainer and has held various positions on the Club's Board of Management.

He has 82 awards including: Bronze Medallion, First Aid, ARTC Trainer and Assessor Certificates and IRB Crew and IRB Driver. At the end of the 2019/2020 season, after 40 years of patrols and many rescues, Rick deservedly stepped back from patrolling. Rick; however, continues to be engaged with the Club through his role in education and has always been a very prominent helper at surf club events including the McGrath Pittwater Carols at the Beach, Lion Island Challenge and Avalon Beach Surf Swim.

Rick has over 30 years of high school teaching experience and has brought his vast wealth of experience and knowledge to the Club; training and mentoring hundreds of past and present members. In March 1983, Rick achieved his Instructor's Certificate and trained surf club members for over 10 years

and was the Club's Chief Training Instructor for three seasons from 1999-2002. After a break, Rick re-engaged with training, completing his Training Officers Certificate in 2016 and his Assessors Certificate two years later. Rick continues to help with the running of Club's annual skills maintenance and Bronze Medallion courses.

There have been many accolades given to Rick over the years including the Club President's Award in 2000 and 2001. He has also been awarded the SLSA 25 Year (2005), 30 Year (2010) and 40 Year (2020) Service Award. In the 2002/2003 season, Rick along with his daughter Heidi were awarded Pittwater Council's 'Courage in Life Saving' Award for the rescue of a rock fisherman at Avalon Beach. Rick has also been the recipient of the Club Steve Parkes Award for Achievement in Lifesaving Education in the 2017/2018 season and was honoured with being awarded the Club Distinguished Service Award just four years ago.

Rick has always been one of the first Club members to put a hand up to help no matter what the task and continues to do so. Rick has been with the Club for over 40 years and has shown dedication and inspiration in whatever he pursues, and he continues to lead the way.

Life Members and Service Honours Awards Commitee

It is with great sadness I advise that one of our Club's most distinguished members and previous Chair of the Committee, Michael Byrnes OAM passed away in March of this year.

His distinguished record keeping and contribution to surf lifesaving was outstanding. To be able to cover this in detail, one would need to write a book, not such a bad idea. The stories, memories and achievements would make great reading.

Michael lost his wife Pam a few months earlier, a very sad time for the family. Our sincere condolences are extended to the family. At the 2022 Club AGM the Committee's recommendations for the elevation of Richard Cole and Richard (Rick) Mitchell to Life Membership was adopted unanimously by the meeting.

Club members eligible for Association Long Service Awards were identified and the process to have the awards issued continues.

The Committee met once face to face and for Zoom to consider nominations received for Club honours.

NATIONAL MEDAL

The National Medal was established by the Commonwealth of Australia in 1975 as one of the original elements of the distinctive Australian system of honours and awards and is Australia's most awarded civilian medal.

The National Medal recognises long and diligent service by members of recognised government and voluntary organisations that risk their lives or safety to protect or assist the community in enforcement of the law or in times of emergency or natural disaster. This includes government organisations such as ambulance, correctional, emergency,

SLSNSW RESCUE OF THE MONTH SLSSNB RESCUE OF THE YEAR JULY 2022

4 July 2022: Proving lifesavers are never truly off duty, Avalon Beach SLSC's Nick Sampson and Jason Dale's quick thinking and sound action in a high-pressure situation has seen the Northern Beaches pair awarded with Surf Life Saving NSW's Rescue of the Month for July 2022.

On their way back to a hotel on 4 July after a full day posted with the SES in response to the heightening flood emergency, Nick and Jason found themselves caught in flash flooding in Liverpool where, for close to three hours, they switched gears back into lifesaving mode to assist nearly 100 stranded vehicles.

Their rescue support varied from extricating people through car windows and carrying them to self-made evacuation points, to escorting and directing people through the waters.

Chief among their outstanding efforts was the rescue of an elderly woman who had been swept off her feet into the moving water as well as a policewoman who had jumped in to assist.

Jason and Nick were able to rescue them both before they were washed into a nearby creek.

Without their involvement, the incident could very easily have been a fatal one to many. The surf lifesavers were commended on scene by all attending agencies, and the following day, pictures from the scene showed the damage that had been incurred – a sage reminder of the important role they played.

GROUP CERTIFICATE OF MERIT

Avalon Beach SLSC, NSW

Avalon Beach faced challenging conditions on Sunday, 2 January 2022 for both the morning and afternoon patrols. With 71 recorded rescues during the course of the day it was very much an 'all hands-on deck' scenario for the members.

Cyclone Seth was driving 1-1.5 meter swells onto the beach pushing water over a bank and into a gutter before meeting the shoreline. The gutter rip on its own was easily pushing people outside of the flags, quickly finding swimmers off guard. Due to the conditions multiple rescues were occurring at any one time, quickly stretching resources.

Rips were running at both north and south ends of the beach on the low tide challenging the Avalon Beach patrols with what was believed to be record numbers on the beach that day. The Club made the call to bring in reinforcements to keep the beach open and safe for the record crowds so they could continue to support the many beach goers.

The Avalon Beach average patrol size is 11. On that January day, the Club pulled in an additional 20+ members with close to 30 members supporting the team throughout the day.

Without a doubt, Avalon Beach recalls the day as the biggest multiple rescue event on record for the Club. The events of that day were a testament to the dedication and commitment shown by the Avalon Beach members on what was one of its toughest days.

GROUP CERTIFICATE OF MERIT

Zachary Dale, Todd Barber

On Saturday, 19 March 2022 Avalon Beach received a Surfcom call to support a mayday call from a 35ft boat taking on water North of the Beach, off Careel Point.

With 45km winds and a 4–5-meter swell, Todd and Zachary launched the IRB and made their way to the scene. Challenging conditions met the IRB as it navigated its way to the boat off the Point.

On arrival Todd and Zachary found three people clinging to what was remaining of the submerged boat, just above the waterline.

Within minutes of getting the patients on board the IRB, the boat quickly sunk out of sight. Any later the rescue scenario would have been completely different. Shortly after the IRB was joined by a Rescue Water Craft as well as a second IRB from Whale Beach. All assisted in returning the patients to calmer waters.

The conditions facing Zachary and Todd that day required a high level of knowledge and skill to be able to navigate the high winds and big swells. Their understanding of the capabilities of the IRB ensured a positive outcome for all involved.









PRESIDENT'S REPORT



For the first time in several years, Avalon Beach enjoyed an uninterrupted season. We once again met our core service requirement of keeping our beach safe with over 5,600 hours patrolled, and another 600 hours at other beaches; recording 587 preventative actions and 26 rescues. This was a relatively quiet

year, and we are all happy if patrol is boring, as it means everyone goes home to their families after a day at the beach.

Unfortunately, a Club member Mark Head was involved in a serious pre-season training accident. We are proud and thankful for the assistance provided by other members to affect a rescue and to all members that continue to support his recovery. This incident has left a lasting impression on all our members and emphasised why it is important that we remain proficient, continue to update our skills and create the strongest patrols so that we can be there when needed.

As a result of this incident, the Club is permanently leaving rescue boards on the beach at the Max Lookout North Avalon and at the fence opposite the Nipper canteen so that our response to an incident can be immediate. We have faith in our community understanding the intention being respected and we note that they have been used to assist people outside of patrol hours, which supports why we have done this. We will be working in the off season to reorganise the first aid room to make it easier to access rescue equipment and are currently exploring the installation of signal flags up on the southern headland to help raise attention to an incident.

Last year, our Club Captains, Jason Dale and Nick (Nicholas) Sampson assisted with the flood relief efforts. At the end of their shift, travelling on a flooded road back to their hotel, Jason noticed that a mother was trapped in her car with her two children. He got out of his car and waded through waist high water to evacuate them to safety. The situation further escalated, and several other cars became trapped and both Nick and Jason realised they were on their own, as radio control advised it would take time to send support crews to their location. Jason and Nick evacuated close to 100 vehicles comprising of young, elderly and highly emotional people to safety. Their actions varied from stopping cars from proceeding further, pulling people out of car windows, escorting and directing, or carrying them to an in-situ makeshift evacuation point. They safely guided both an elderly woman and a policewoman who was assisting her to higher ground – both of whom had been swept off their feet and

were carried through the water to a raging creek. Additional resources in the form of police, fire brigade and SES personnel arrived on the scene two hours after recognition of the initial incident. Both Jason and Nick remained on the scene for an additional two hours assisting crews and assessing affected people until the water subsided to a safe level. Jason and Nick have received a meritorious award for their efforts.

Our trainers were particularly busy this season with the conferring of 3 Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescues, 44 Bronze Medallions, 34 First Aid, 27 ART, 6 IRB Crews, 7 IRB Drivers awards and 52 SRC. These awards will boost our patrols in the upcoming seasons. Our trainers have continued their contribution to our Singapore Nippers program and successfully trained members to attain 19 new Bronze Medallions. The touch point for most members with the trainers is at proficiency, which is an immense undertaking, and we are fortunate that in addition to the above, they still managed to find the time to update their own training qualifications to ensure that we can teach most surf lifesaving awards within our own Club environment.

Thanks to the generous sponsorship of Brown Brothers Skip Bins, Avalon Beach took delivery of two new surf boats. The boats were named in honour of Sue Millar and Brent Walker. Sue was instrumental in championing past boat teams as mother hen as well as supporting Rick (Richard) Millar our famed surf boat captain. Brent was part of the successful 1993 boat crew that won gold at Aussies. So far, these boats have travelled further on land than sea as the delivery pick up was in Queensland followed by a big trek across the Nullarbor to compete at Aussies! No doubt there will be a lot of kilometers done at sea over the next few seasons.

Our new IRB was launched on Gala Day. This IRB was purchased with the help of our Club sponsor McGrath Pittwater. It is an 18-month wait for an IRB and we are expecting to receive another IRB (hopefully before the 2024 season start) ensuring that our equipment is of the highest standard.

Avalon Beach performed strongly at State with our small Nippers team coming away with a gold and two bronze medals; our lone open competitor won gold at State and backed it up with silver at Aussies, our U23 Reserve Female boat crew won gold and our masters team came away with a silver and two bronze medals. We also had several masters competitors compete for Newport Beach SLSC and they came home from both State and Aussies with a swag of bling. We are proud of all our competitors; their training and commitment ensure they are always rescue ready.

This season the Club was able to host our community and fundraising events once again. The 24-hour row continued its expansion with 54 clubs across surf lifesaving, rowing and schools participating and these efforts raised over \$309,000 to support mental health initiatives at the grass roots level. The McGrath Pittwater Carols at the Beach returned with over 5,000 people enjoying the music, food trucks, community spirit and fireworks. After a number of years, the Around the Bends Swim was finally able to celebrate 30 years, with 300 swimmers joining us on the day in the blubber infested soup.

The Club also saw the final stage of our 3-year carbon neutral project completed with the installation of four batteries to capture the energy generated from our roof solar panels. This has enabled us to be energy self-sufficient for 20 hours per day and we are working to adopt other energy efficiency methods to increase our supply. This project would not be possible without the vision of Leena Wood and Richard Cole, who sourced Council grants; sponsor support and additional funding available through the Club's Silent Auction fundraising. The next phase of the project is outward looking to investigate "Community Solar Capability" with other local community buildings leveraging from our solar installations.

On a sad note, we lost life member Michael Byrnes OAM this season. Michael joined our Club in 1952 and obtained his

Bronze Medallion the following year. In addition to patrolling at Avalon Beach, Michael held many volunteer positions throughout his 70 years of contribution to our Club including Club Treasurer, Vice-Captain, Chief Instructor, Chief Steward, Assistant Secretary, Registrar, Race Secretary and Publicity Officer. More recently, Michael was the Chair of the Life Members and Service Honours Awards Committee. Michael was awarded Life Membership of our Club in 1986 and was also a Life Member of Surf Life Saving Sydney Northern Beaches Branch, SLS New South Wales and SLS Australia. In 1999 Michael was awarded the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for service to Surf Life Saving and in 2011 he received a 50+ Years of Officiating Service award from Branch. Michael was one of the greats of our movement and a true gentleman. His contribution and service made a significant impact, not only on our Club, but across the surf lifesaving movement. VALE Michael has left his legacy and we aim to leverage from the past and build upon it and improve to create our present and future.

There is a lot to be proud of and this success is a result of the hard work of all our members. It is not done for recognition but to support our community and that effort is not lost on me or your fellow Club members. THANK YOU!

FINANCIAL REPORT

On behalf of the Avalon Beach SLSC Board of Management, I present this year's financial accounts for members consideration and adoption for year ended 30 April 2023. In keeping with the prior years, these accounts have been prepared to provide our members and other stakeholders with financial information about the Club's operations, the financial position, and cash flow activity.

The special purpose financial statements have been prepared to satisfy the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act, the Associations Incorporation Act, the Australian Charities and Not for Profits Act, and the Club's constitution. The accounts have been compiled by Beweiszer Accounting and Tax firm and independently audited by Mr Peter Power in accordance with the applicable Australian Auditing Standards. These accounts cover the period 1 May 2022 to 30 April 2023.

The Statement of Comprehensive Income records a surplus of \$97,265 which was better than budget expectations.

This year saw the end of all COVID-19 assistance grants from government and a reduction in our beach funding grant from SLS Australia. Our government and other grants received was \$32,018, down from \$81,062 in the prior year.

Donations were also down significantly due to receiving a generous donation from the Avalon Chamber of Commerce in the prior year. Donations totalled \$7,7891 this year.

However, our function and bar trade made significant contributions to this year's surplus and now represents 45% of our revenue and \$142,744 of profit after accounting for direct expenses. Leanne Austin has done a great job with the bookings and managing the functions, including paid staff who have improved the level of service at the events.

McGrath Pittwater Carols at the Beach event returned this year as did the Around the Bends Swim. Carols was an expensive

event to host, costing \$2,570 after the generous sponsorship from McGrath Pittwater, Northern Beaches Council and Johnson Bros Mitre 10. The Club conducted a silent auction from goods and services provided by the local business which raised over \$16,000. Income from the Around the Bends Swim includes entry fees from two prior years when the event was not held. Net income for this event is reported as \$14,958.

Both Nipper and Senior membership revenue increased from the prior year, revenue recorded an 18% increase from the year before. Other revenue sources for the Club included community hire and gym hire, both recording increases on the prior year and accounting for \$56,000 in revenue.

Expenditure during the period totalled \$461,357, which is an increase of \$110,838 or 31% over the prior period. Spending increases were in bar and function costs and was expected due to the increase in bar sales and functions events. This accounted for \$63,000 of the increase in costs over last year.

The Club's cash position improved by \$107,262 over the prior year. With net assets increasing to \$633,759, up from \$536,494 in 2023. With the increase in interest rates, \$200,000 has been invested in a bank term deposit for 12 months at 4.2% p.a.

Capital expenditure for the period totalled \$128,149 and included 20 new nipper boards, Solar batteries for the carbon neutral project, a new IRB and 2 new surfboats. New patrol and training equipment included additional UHF radios, rescue tubes and CPR manikins. Additional bar furniture and office equipment was also acquired.

In conclusion, 2023 saw the Club's activity continue to return to a level of normality and income sources also returning. Our cash at bank and overall balance sheet has improved which puts us well placed to continue to achieve our strategic objectives.

EDUCATION REPORT

It was yet another busy season for the Education Team with (possibly) a Club record of 213 awards attained by our Club members. The awards included 44 Bronze Medallion, 22 Cadet Bronze Medallions, 52 Surf Rescue Certificates (SRC), 34 First Aid Certificates and 27 Advanced Resuscitation Certificate (ART), awards. The IRB Team were also busy training 7 new IRB Drivers and 6 IRB crew.

The season started off on a sombre note with Mark Head's accident at Avalon Beach in September. Mark has been an integral part of the training team for over five years. He became an Assessor last season and was an important part of our leadership group. Mark's attitude and determination throughout his recovery journey has been a source of inspiration to the training team this season.


Preseason training began in earnest with a First Aid course in August followed by an ART course in September run by Steve (Stephen) Early. This was the beginning of a two season 'push' to upgrade all members to the new Advanced Resuscitation Technique Certificate by June 2024 – to date, eight candidates in this group have successfully attained their new qualifications.

This season we facilitated six Bronze Medallion courses with the first held in October. The course was led by Charlotte Broderick with Helen Tan, Rosemary Morgan-Smith and Sophie Valentine. The First Aid Certificate was also integrated into the course. Five candidates attended the assessment in November to successfully gain their award. While the Bronze Medallion course did not have the usual quantity of candidates, the quality of the training was exceptional.

In parallel to this, Mike (Michael) Stanley-Jones and Dave (David) Roberts (who said he was having a year off training) took on the daunting task in November to start training 52 SRC candidates. They were assisted by Steve (Stephen) Broderick and Michael King along with some parent helpers including Lachlan Arnold, Anton van Der Vegt and Giles Stoddard. While Sunday afternoons may have looked like chaos in the Club and on the beach, Mike always had the participants well organized. Their plan to run the SRC over the season proved successful with all candidates completing the course in mid-March.

Along with the Bronze Medallion and SRC courses, Steve (Stephen) Broderick, with help from Rick (Richard) Mitchell, was also busy arranging and running the Bronze Medallion proficiencies for the season - a thankless but necessary task. Most Club members were proficient by the end of the year. Thank you to all the Club trainers who gave up their time to ensure the Club could operate surf patrols on the beach.

Singapore Nippers (see report) arose from its COVID-19 slumber, keen to increase their water safety numbers for their Nipper program. Four trainers, Steve Broderick, Charlotte Broderick, Helen Tan, and Lauren Petersen all travelled to the 'Far North Avalon Club' and successfully trained 11 candidates for their Bronze Medallion award. Singapore Nippers has since requested our Club to facilitate two courses per season to help continue grow their Bronze Medallion water safety contingent.





The Sunday mornings in the second half of the season was destined to be busy with three separate Bronze Medallion squads and a SRC squad. During this period, a second group of trainers squeezed in both a First Aid and ART course before they travelled to facilitate a second Singapore Nipper Program.

In mid-January, Mike (Michael) Stanley-Jones, as if he didn't have enough to do with the SRC squad, oversaw and trained a Bronze Medallion squad (11 candidates). Mike would have this group train on a Sunday from 8am for most of the day.

In early February, a Bronze Medallion squad was facilitated by Charlotte Broderick, Steve (Stephen) Broderick, and Michael King with assistance from Rick (Richard) Mitchell and Rosemary Morgan-Smith. Once again, the First Aid Certificate was integrated into this course and for the first time an ART course was also run. All 11 candidates completed the three qualifications in February and March.

A feature of this Bronze Medallion group, and a highlight of the season, was the attendance of five Argentinian backpackers. An article written by former Club member Steve Meacham about the group appeared in 'Pittwater Life' in April. While some of the Argentinian's struggled with their English, both Charlotte Broderick and Rosemary Morgan-Smith put in the work and translated a lot of the course content to Spanish. They were also assisted by their fellow candidates to ensure all would successfully complete their qualifications.

The Cadet Bronze Medallion squad also began to train in early February making for a very busy Sunday at the Club. Charlotte Broderick, Steve (Stephen) Broderick and Michael King along with Rosemary Morgan-Smith and Helen Tan helped to train the candidates, many of whom had completed there SRC two years prior. Thanks goes to Gem (Amanda) Lehman for organizing this group and Pete (Peter) Carter for his help with training. All 22 candidates were successful in their April assessments.

March, saw trainers venture back to Singapore, this time led by Steve (Stephen) Broderick with Rick (Richard) Mitchell, Steve (Stephen) Early and Shannon Murray accompanying Steve up North. Of the proposed 12 candidates scheduled to attend, 8 candidates were assessed and successfully gained their Bronze Medallion award.



The IRB Team of Alan Moran, Terry Barber, Richard Cole, Giles Stoddard, and Steve (Stephen) Broderick worked solidly throughout the season with 7 IRB Drivers and 6 IRB Crew members achieving their awards. There is a constant pressure on the IRB Trainers to maintain Club members training to meet our patrol commitments. Well done to all the trainers.

Apart from training, Louise Lindop, Rosemary Morgan-Smith, Steve (Stephen) Early, Rick (Richard) Mitchell, Steve (Stephen) Broderick and Michael King all did a fair share of assessing along the Northern Beaches. The Club can't present the number of candidates we're presenting in a season without putting our hands up to attend assessments.

Our Club's Education Team continued to expand this season with Sophie Valentine recently becoming an Endorsed Trainer and Steve Broderick and Rosemary Morgan-Smith both qualifying as a Bronze Assessor. Other qualifications gained by our trainers included Charlotte Broderick, Steve (Stephen) Broderick and Michael King becoming ART Trainers and Terry Barber completing his Certificate IV Training and Assessment. Steve (Stephen) Early and Michael King also became TAF Mentors during the season. Congratulations to Charlotte Broderick, Rosemary Morgan-Smith, and Helen Tan on being presented ABSLSC Education and Training award.

The Education Team would also like to thank those Club members who assisted with training throughout the season including Andrew Clark, Remo Adoncello and Larry Paice. Also, thanks to Pepita Martins who organized the post assessment celebration BBQ's. We continue to encourage any Club member who is interested in joining the team to contact one of the trainers.

Thank once again to the Club President, Bernadette McKay, Club Administrator Leanne Austin, and the Board of Management for continued and ongoing support of the Education Team. It is always a pleasure to work with such a great group of professionals.

SINGAPORE

PUBLIC OFFICER AND GOVERNANCE PANEL REPORTS

The Public Officer is ultimately responsible for the Club's dealings with government. These include but are not limited to the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not for Profits Commission, the Australian Taxation Office, the NSW Office of Fair Trading in relation to matters under the NSW Associations Incorporation Act, and the NSW Office of Gaming and Racing in relation to fundraising activities.

The Governance Panel is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Club's activities and operations. Acting independently of but reporting to the Board of Management and ultimately to members, the Panel seeks to ensure good corporate governance, and to ascertain and to implement best practice including advice and education to members as required.

In the past year both roles were not onerous, as our Club has great depth of talent across all its management functions and matters just quietly get done. Legal requirements taken on by members involve working with children matters, safe storage of fuel, education to government and SLSA standards, financial reporting, member protection, OH & S matters, building compliance and safety, water safety and gear, events management, and many others.

The Public Officer's role involved some changes in emphasis on matters coming from the federal Charities and Not-forprofits Commission, and some sabre rattling by the NSW Office of Gaming and Racing in its administration of the Charitable Fundraising Act. Inevitably some technical issues were addressed in relation to presentation of financial statements in accordance with existing and changing Australian Accounting Standards, and to solvency and going concern matters following the subsidence to a degree of the COVID-19 pandemic. Once again, the Surf Life Saving NSW financial committee reviewed the published financial statements of many clubs for the prior financial year. As has happened for many years your Public Officer met with accountants and auditors of our Club and other neighbouring clubs to consider and to address these matters on a uniform basis for the presentation of financial statements for subsequent financial years.

During the year in overlap with other responsibilities, your Governance Panel Chairman was occupied on committees for strategies in conjunction with Council for the contents of proposed renewal of lease and licence of the Club's restaurant and café and Council eventually calling for tenders. At the time of writing, ongoing consideration of proposed contents of a licence for part time office operations for third parties in the Clubhouse. Hopefully these matters will be resolved in the early part of the coming patrol season.



HERITAGE COMMITTEE REPORT

CATALOGUING THE CLUB'S HERITAGE ITEMS

Over the last couple of years, a considerable amount of work has been undertaken by the Heritage Committee to catalogue the Club's heritage items. Bob (Robert) Head, assisted by Mark Head, has been instrumental on this project; however, for many reasons the cataloging came to a hiatus. In the meanwhile, a rough list of all items from the old Clubhouse, (originally compiled by Richard McEvoy) was updated by Warren, Geoff and me.

The recent repainting of the Club's internal walls provided an ideal opportunity to speed up the process as all items had to be removed from the walls. Leanne Austin arranged an intensive weekend session; together with available Heritage Committee members (Richard Cole, Bernadette McKay, Warren Young OAM, Geoff Searl OAM and me) and caretaker Johnny Harper, we made a concerted effort to "complete" the task – in the sense that it covers pretty much all items currently held by the Club.

As time passes and with more notable events and successes, it is to be expected that more items of significance will be added.

Thanks to all the Club volunteers involved in helping to achieve this important goal for the Club.

DISPLAY OF ITEMS

Investigations are currently underway into a better method to display heritage items, balancing the need for aesthetics with items of different shapes, sizes and colour. Richard Cole is examining track systems as used in galleries to support more flexibility, as well as less damage to walls. Geoff Searl is examining framing option. These will be subject to further consideration.

It is hoped that some items might be back on the Club walls in time for the AGM. With that said, rather than rush the process, the Heritage Committee agrees with Johnny Harper's remark to channel Pete Akehurst's attitude to "do it once, do it right". The Heritage Committee members have examined various displays in several other clubs with the view to have a truly "Avalon Beach" display of the Club's heritage items that we can all be proud of ready for the Club's 100th anniversary in 2025.

OTHER ACTIVITIES OF THE HERITAGE COMMITTEE

Geoff, Warren and I had fun hosting a history excursion to the Club from Maria Regina Primary School (Year 1 and Year 2). Geoff did a Show and Tell slideshow. Warren showed them rescue equipment, and I explained the Patrol Room gear. We were all pleasantly surprised to learn how many and how much these children knew about surf safety, rips, flags etc. – most of the children are in ABSLSC Nippers. The kids were inquisitive and asked lots of questions: about how to get out of a rip, what to do if you're not a strong swimmer, are there female lifesavers, and what if there's a shark right next to you!

Geoff is following up one question: Who was the first person rescued at Avalon Beach and who did the rescue?

They learnt things, and we learnt things too.

THE IMPORTANCE OF MAINTAINING THE CLUB'S HISTORY

Club memorabilia plays an important role, not just for the benefit of present members, but for former members, their families, for future members and the general public.

Recently the Club was approached by external parties about Club historical items such as:

- A lady asked if the Award to Steve Davey for his 1965 rescue of her brother is on display. She wished to see it when she visits Australia from England where she now lives later this year;
- A young non-Club member said he happily spent time at his father's 70th function, examining Club photos on the walls and was pleasantly surprised to recognise Brian Friend and myself. This demonstrates how such items/displays help improved understanding of surf clubs – good PR;
- Another visitor for a community meeting at the Club was pleasantly surprised to unexpectedly identify a photo of Al Crosky as his Best Man from his wedding 40 years ago;
- A lady in her 70s who used to live in Avalon Beach said she would have liked to have had a look at old Club photos on walls, while at the Club for a function, to see who she recognised;
- Maria Regina School Year 1 and Year 2 would normally have been shown significant photos such as the first IRB and Warren Mitchell OAM, but as noted above they are currently in storage.

These examples are not unusual. Significant and apparently ordinary Club photographs and awards can inspire others, recall happy times, create community goodwill, add to a sense of belonging, help recruit new members, and support the Club's Mission "to save lives, create great Australians and build a better community." Their care and display need to be given due attention and respect.

The Club has a wealth of historic items such as photographs of the first IRB, Warren Mitchell's OAM and Innovation Awards, Australian SLS Titles Gold Medals, vintage toothpick surfboard and ski, surf reels, trophies, awards and so on. The Club adds to these items all the time, for example new awards like the State and National Club of the Year Awards - a result of members' innovative ideas and the Club's involvement in the community.

THE HERITAGE COMMITTEE'S BACKGROUND

Past President Richard Cole initiated the setting up of a small committee to bring a more structured approach to the caring for and display of Club memorabilia and historical material. This was established so no one individual in the Club should have the responsibility of deciding what items of Club history should be retained, discarded, repaired or put on display. The Committee's aim is to ensure that Club history is not lost, damaged items are repaired, and heritage items are maintained in proper condition on an ongoing basis.

The Committee consists of four Life Members (Pete (Peter) Carter, Warren Young OAM, Bob Head, and me as Chair); Club Historian and President Avalon Beach Historical Society (Geoff Searl OAM); Building Committee liaison (Deputy President Richard Cole), President (Bernadette McKay) and Nick Sampson.

BUILDING REPORT

The purpose of this building report is to provide an overview of the Avalon Beach Surf Life Saving Club's building infrastructure, its maintenance activities, and any notable changes or improvements undertaken during the year 2023. This report aims to highlight the Club's commitment to ensuring a safe, functional, aesthetically pleasing and sustainable facility for its members and the community.

Regular maintenance throughout the year included:

- · Cleaning throughout the facility
- Window cleaning
- Graffiti removal
- Minor repairs and maintenance
- Fire safety and compliance

Notable improvements to the Clubhouse this year included:

• Installation of battery system:

A 40.4kw/h battery system was installed by Shinehub into the IRB / Nipper Board store. This system complements our solar system and provides power to the Clubhouse independent of the grid during nighttime. It also provides a backup system to vital circuits during a blackout. The battery system is part of the Nett Zero Surf Club Project instigated by Leena Wood and Richard Cole. It will not only save significant electricity costs over time, but ensure the Club leads the way in terms of sustainability. This project was supported by a Northern Beaches Council Environmental Grant as well as the proceeds of the McGrath Pittwater Carols at the Beach Silent Auction.

• Internal Painting:

After nine years the Clubhouse needed a freshen up and this year almost the entire building was repainted internally. Thank you to Robert Hopton who organised the project. This project was supported by SLSA's national sponsor, Dulux, who provided the paint free of charge. The project included removing all the hung photos and memorabilia as well as minor repairs to the ceilings, skirting boards and walls.

• Security Camera System:

A security camera system was installed with access by our caretakers and key personnel. The cameras record and store live footage from various positions around the Club and have already proved invaluable. They provide a terrific security and safety system for our members and staff.

A number of improvements are planned in the coming months. These include:

• Replacement of the Ocean Room cupboard doors

(Northern Beaches Council)

- Repair of Hall of Champions doors to verandah (Northern Beaches Council)
- Repainting of structural steelwork (Northern Beaches Council)
- Honour Board update this has been a major project by Nick Sampson and Robert Hopton
- Access fob controls to ground floor member's change rooms
- New ceiling to ground floor corridor to provide wiring access to change room doors
- Replacement of rusted steel door frames to ground floor doors with hardwood frames
- Shelving to southern wall of First Aid room for Defib / First Aid Kit / Oxy.
- Additional lighting to First Aid Room
- Additional lighting to exterior of entry

After cataloguing the extensive collection of Club memorabilia and historical photographs, (163 items at last count!) the Heritage Committee will soon project manage the display of the Club's photos and memorabilia in a manner that reflects the Club's values, history and aspirations. It is proposed to use a robust hanging system that allows flexibility over time.

The restaurant and café have been vacant for three years. Bernadette McKay and Richard Cole were part of the Northern Beaches Council assessment committee to determine the outcome of the tender for these spaces, which was finally completed in January this year. It is hoped that a successful operator will be up and running for this summer.

Thank you to all those who have contributed to the upkeep, maintenance and improvement of the Clubhouse over the past year including:

- Robert Hopton, our Building Manager who spends an inordinate amount of time meeting contractors, getting quotes, supervising work and negotiating with Council
- Our dedicated Caretakers Johnny and Xanthe, who clean, maintain and secure the building with zeal
- Leanne Austin, our administrator and venue manager extraordinaire
- Bruce Oscroft, our new carpenter / builder
- Brian Wetherall, who cleans our 1st floor function spaces and keeps the building looking fabulous
- Col Campbell, our go to maintenance man who is hanging up his boots after keeping the Club in great shape for many years
- Nick Sampson, Nathan Wellings, Jason Dale, Peter Carter,

Matthew Mayall, Ashley Cardiff, and Zach Dale our Bangalley Bar team

- Alan Moran, who is always keeping the IRB and patrol sheds spotless and organised
- And many others!

The Avalon Beach SLSC Clubhouse has been well-maintained throughout 2023, ensuring a safe and functional facility for its members and the wider community. The new batteries and paintwork are notable improvements that have enhanced the overall experience and performance of the Club. Avalon Beach SLSC remains dedicated to providing a welcoming and secure environment for all its stakeholders.

A very special mention must be made of Robert Hopton who has been our Building Manager since at least 2008 when he instigated plans for the rebuilding of the Clubhouse. Robert has been exceptional in his role, which is often thankless and unrecognized. His dedication to providing an outstanding facility for our members has been unwavering. We have all benefitted from his efforts. Robert has recently experienced significant health issues, but I have no doubt he will continue to be involved in the Club as much as possible. Trespassers continue to be an issue and typically becomes more problematic over winter as the ocean gets colder. Most incursions are from surfing kids who want to use the Club's hot water showers. Lockable doors for the downstairs shower areas should assist with controlling this issue.

With the support of the Club Board of Management security cameras were installed They make our Club and the public area around the Club a much safer place to be for both members and the general public. The cameras have already proved invaluable, with some of the footage being handed over to police. Kudos to Richard Cole and Nick Sampson who had plenty to do with their acquisition. What a great asset they have been.

GENERAL

Avalon Beach SLSC is not about just about its Clubhouse. It's about the members, their families, and the relationships it fosters. It's also a functional place to keep the beach safe. As Caretakers our job is to look after the building that accommodates all those things. We take pride in that job and hope to be doing it for a while yet.

NET ZERO SURF CLUB 2023

NET ZERO FOR THE FUTURE

After Avalon Beach SLSC received the SLSA Australian Surf Club of the Year in 2018, we started to examine sustainability within the Club and how some areas could be addressed and improved.

In recent years, the Nippers Team have undertaken a number of initiatives to minimise the impact of over 400 nippers and their parents on the beach environment. These initiatives included:

Our momentum has been strong through our vision of "Net Zero 2023" for Avalon Beach SLSC. Nippers parents and many others have worked incredibly hard over the program, raising money and awareness in the community.

The plan had key objectives with a planned approach across 3 years.



REUSE

- In conjunction with Clean Oceans Australia to provide every single Nipper with their own metal reusable water bottle, and providing access to refill their bottles with clean drinking water
- Coffee and other hot beverages were only sold if Nipper families brought a reusable coffee cup.*
 Rainwater collection and usage for a number of years rainwater has been used to wash down all surf equipment after Nippers and for use after all club activities.



RECYCLE

- Envirobank Recycling collections, in association with the NSW Governments' Container Deposit Scheme (CDS) to provide surf clubs with a sustainable fundraising channel
- All items that could be recycled were collected and recycled, such as eggshells, paper packaging, milk cartons and any other soft plastics.



REDUCE

- Zero Food Waste from Canteen Selling out of food every week so there is no waste to landfill
 Planning using technology to ask families to register their food choices for special events, avoiding the guesswork of supply and subsequent waste
- Shop local supporting local businesses that supply food at cost, increasing fundraising capabilities as
 well as reducing the carbon footprint of transportation. Additionally, collections were 'waste free' where
 food safety compliant containers were filled with supplies rather than wrapped in plastic
- Energy Soft drinks were removed from the canteen and the fridge disconnected, saving energy as well as encouraging the best options for rehydration after exercise.

Through the installation of high quality solar panels and battery storage, Avalon Beach SLSC aims to be the first club in NSW to eliminate their carbon footprint, creating a Net Zero Surf Club by 2023.

VIRTUAL POWER PLANTS

In order to future-proof our systems for the Avalon Beach SLSC, we selected batteries that have the capability to operate as a Virtual Power Plant (VPP). This technology allows Avalon Beach SLSC to supply excess energy to other buildings or households on the same network, with the potential of creating revenue streams as well as supplying the community with sustainably sourced power.

With guidance from not-for-profit advisory group Zero Emissions Sydney North, part of Beyond Zero Emissions, we were able to select a partner that would work with us to ensure the technology in both the hardware and software would meet our objectives.

After careful consideration and assessment we chose to partner up with ShineHub, an Australian owned and operated organisation that helps communities and councils to find affordable solar and battery solutions which are then integrated into the ShineHub VPP ecosystem across Australia.

For the rest of 2023, we will be monitoring usage of power and looking where we can optimise further. We will also be looking at funding offsets for our gas usage. In 2024, we will work with other organisations to share our learnings and create blueprints for other clubs to follow.

VENUE HIRE REPORT

CLUBHOUSE | A PLACE FOR OUR COMMUNITY

A surf lifesaving clubhouse is a valuable asset that brings numerous benefits to our members and community.

With dedicated spaces for equipment storage and first aid supplies, our Clubhouse serves as a crucial hub for our patrolling members and lifeguards to provide rapid and effective responses to incidents on the beach during patrol season.

It provides a platform for the exchange of knowledge and skills and becomes a space where individuals come to share their expertise and learn from one another. Whether it's the seasoned veterans who impart their hard-earned wisdom to eager local school children, or our trainers who share their skills and expertise teaching essential first-aid skills, CPR techniques and surf awareness, our Clubhouse fosters a culture of mentorship and growth.

During the warmer months, when the Nippers program springs into action, our Clubhouse kiosk serves as a meeting place for families to gather and connect with like-minded people who share a passion for the beach, the ocean and a sanga sandwich! This sense of belonging and camaraderie strengthens community bonds and promotes a healthier and more active lifestyle.

Our Clubhouse plays a pivotal role in fostering community engagement and social connectedness benefiting the wider community beyond just beachgoers. It provides a space for locals and members to come together to enjoy the Bangalley Bar, attend an evening workshop, a function, host a fundraiser, or participate in a community outreach initiative or educational program.

Over the years, we have supported our community with complimentary, or substantially discounted, use of the venue enabling the sample of community activities below:

- One Eighty Avalon's Open-up sessions
- Community led birthing kit assembly
- Cancer Council biggest morning tea fundraiser
- Avalon Soccer Club fundraisers
- Avalon Primary parent socials
- Barrenjoey High teacher off sites
- Gotcha4Life Tomorrow Man and Tomorrow Woman mental health programs

This Spring we are partnering with KoWorks and opening the Clubhouse as a co-working site three days per week, introducing a new work-from home community to the delights of working from our home by the beach. We cannot wait to welcome you.

VENUE HIRE | A BRIEF HISTORY

Since reopening its doors to members and the community in August 2014, our Clubhouse Bangalley Bar quickly became an in demand venue for private functions, generating an income source for the ongoing operation and development of the Club.


Venue hire was boosted by the opening of "Beach House Avalon" the onsite restaurant and kiosk operated by Trippas White Group who had exclusive weekend function rights to the Ocean Room and employed a full-time functions/event coordinator. This upward trajectory in venue hire continued throughout 2018 and 2019.

Y/E 30 April 2020 was a tumultuous year; the closure of the Bangalley Bar for renovation works (4 weeks), blackout dates for potential renovation overrun and the unprecedented and immediate closure of our Clubhouse and cancellation of all immediate bookings due to the unanticipated Coronavirus pandemic, saw our first collective downturn in venue hire.


This trend continued into Y/E 30 April 2021, our worst year of venue hire to date. Government lockdowns, or severely curtailed fun-factors (guest size limits, inability to dance or mingle) saw skittish hirers cancel a total of 33 events (5 of these booked by Beach House Avalon and 28 booked by the Club). Due to the uncertainty of lockdown rules, border closures and fear of catching the virus, forward bookings plunged. The restaurant closed its doors (permanently) in June 2020; however, they honoured the five long range wedding function bookings scheduled for early 2021.

The Lease and License Agreement established in 2014 between the restaurant, Club and Northern Beaches Council was eventually extinguished by Council and the Club has regained weekend access to the Ocean Room. In time we hope to increase our whole venue hire bookings as our Clubhouse offers a unique (and large) event space with postcard views of the beach.

Below is a snapshot of revenue producing functions secured by the Surf Club and the restaurant (excludes Meeting Room hire.)



The Bangalley Bar serves as a space for our community to come together and is the backdrop to celebrate the most joyful of occasions and the saddest. The graph below highlights the diversity of events and bookings.




*Club social events and, in earlier years, Nipper sleepovers and social events, comprise the Surf Club functions (excludes training and Club meetings).

Celebrations include engagements, milestone birthdays, anniversaries and reunions.

Ad hoc community hire includes yoga workshops, fundraisers, art exhibitions and similar.

Corporate hire is mostly comprised of meeting room bookings, corporate off-sites and photo shoots/film crews

PITTWATER OCEAN SWIM SERIES

The 2023 Pittwater Ocean Swim Series included five swims, starting on the 08 January at Newport Beach with three course distances ranging from 2km (211 swimmers), 800m (104) and 400m (33). The next swim series event took place on 15 January at Bilgola Beach with two course distances, 1.5km (286 swimmers) and 500m (134). Followed by the Mona Vale Beach swim held on the 22 January with distances of 2.25km (188 swimmers) and 1km (88). The penultimate event was held at Palm Beach on the 29 January with two course distances, 2.8km (92 swimmers) and 1km (170). The final swim event was at our beach, held on 12 March with two swim distances, the

point-to-point Around the Bends 2.5km (249 swimmers) and the Avalon Beach swim1.2km (112).

Surf clubs are continually innovating to make these events more attractive for ocean swimmers. Most clubs are considering introducing a fins and skins category which would expand the swimmer numbers by enabling swimmers to wear wetsuits and swim fins. Funds raised by the Pittwater Ocean Swim Series are used to purchase essential lifesaving equipment as well contribute towards club maintenance costs. AVALON BEACH SURF SWIM AND AROUND THE BENDS SWIM

Both swims were held on the 12 March 2023, with over 360 participants and raised over \$7000 for the Club. The event was organised by Volker Klemm (Event Manager- Ocean Swim) with the assistance of Terry Barber, Safety Officer; Andrew Clark, Water Safety; Alan Moran and Giles Stoddard, IRB Coordination; Kevin Veale, Communications and Club members.

The Avalon Beach Surf Swim hits 30! This swim event was spawned one Friday night among members socialising at the Club's Bangalley Bar. The organising committee was led by Steve (Stephan) Jacek and Race Advisor Michael Rodgerson. Other original committee members included, Roger Sayers OAM, Bill (William) Wall and Warren Young OAM. The inaugural event was held on Sunday 17 January 1993, with 511 swim participants and has since attracted more than 26,879 swimmers over the years. Former Olympian Maxwell Metzker remarked that it was one of the most professionally organised beach swim events of its time, with the most accurate course distance. This ocean challenge has been taken on by Olympic swimmers, visually impaired swimmers, politicians - including

former Prime Minister Tony Abbott, swimmers from near and as far as the United States of America, Hong Kong, Malaysia and the United Kingdom. Over the last 30 years the swim has only been cancelled once due to unsafe conditions and was unable to be held during the past three years due to COVID-19.

The Northern Beaches Branch Masters carnival was held at Collaroy in early February. Events for the Masters were held in the afternoon, after the Open events in the morning. Conditions were hot, windy and choppy with a small swell. The competitors from the Club combined with Newport Surf Club collected several good results.

Gem (Amanda) Lehman excelled gaining Gold in her three disciplines - surf swim, board race, and 2km run. Gem also gained Silver in the board relay which included Felicity Peters, and Silver in the swim team which included Louise Purnell.

Felicity won the individual board race at her age group.



I express my gratitude to our Junior Committee Members and Coaches who invest countless hours in our youth, shaping them into the future lifesavers.

Cameron Lane and Gem (Amanda) Lehman have continued to build success and engagement in the carnival teams with some outstanding results and excellent participation. Thanks goes out to Fiona Nguyen, Anna Trybocka and Maria Pellet for their continued roles as Registrar, Canteen Manager and Nippers Communications Manager respectively. However, part of this thanks is bittersweet as Fiona and Anna move on from Nippers as their families age out of Nippers next season.

Our devoted and diverse group of Age Managers, each possessing a unique set of skills, remained actively engaged with 380 Nippers. This team of enthusiastic Age Managers, including many new recruits proudly wearing the red shirts for the first time, showed up faithfully every week, prioritizing the needs of our Nippers above their own comfort. Their commitment served as a powerful demonstration to the youngsters of Avalon Beach, revealing how a community is built upon parents, grandparents, and community members who selflessly make small sacrifices for the greater good. It is truly inspiring to witness the growing diversity among our Age Managers, as a wide range of community members step outside their comfort zones.

The new Under 6 Nippers were capably and enthusiastically led by Evan Stilwell and Maree Williams, with some fantastic parent involvement in getting kids comfortable in and around the water. Old standards such as Flags, relays and Tug of War and buckets kept the competitive spirit alive, while fresh initiatives like Three for the Sea highlighted our commitment to protecting the local environment by minimizing litter.





MICHAEL BYRNES OAM

Life Member Michael Byrnes passed away on 22 March 2023.

He was also a Life Member of each of the associations SLSSNB, SLSNSW and Surf Life Saving Australia, a remarkable achievement and commitment from a single individual. Michael was awarded his Bronze Medallion during the 1952/1953 season and followed it up with his Instructor's Certificate in the 1956/1957 season. During the 1978/1979 season he became an Advanced Resuscitation Instructor. He held many positions within our Club including Vice Captain, Chief Instructor, Gear Steward, Publicity Officer, Registrar and Treasurer for two terms totaling seven seasons viz. from 1981 - 1983 and again from 1990 - 1995. He was also a member of the General Committee and the Judiciary Committee and in 2013 was the recipient of a 60 year long service award. He was awarded Life Membership of our Club in 1986 and was head of the Life Membership and Long Service Awards Committee when he passed away.

Besides the many years of service to our Club he also served as Assessor, Examiner and Official for the Branch. The roles he held during those years at Branch level are worth listing:

Between 1972 and 1977 he was Deputy Superintendent of the Branch.

He was also Secretary of the Board of Examiners, Branch Team

Manager, State Centre Management Delegate, Registrar for the Board of Examiners, Assistant Treasurer, Liaison Officer to Metropolitan.

He also served on the Selection Committee, Constitution Committee,

Judiciary Committee, Finance Committee, Boat Committee, Life Saving Committee, Gear Improvement Committee, Gear Inspection Committee and Boat Rowers' Committee.

In 2011 he received 50 years of Officiating Service Award from

At State level in 1981/1982, Michael was elected Deputy President of SLSNSW from 1982 to 1984 and was then elected President from 1984 to 1989.

He also served as Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer and Trustee and was a member of the Constitution Committee, Finance Committee, Herald Gear Fund and Selection Committee.

In 1999 Michael was appropriately awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for Service to Surf Life Saving.

His devoted wife, Pam, had predeceased him in early February 2023.

KEN BAXTER

Ken Baxter AM (23 October 1943 - 23 December 2022) joined the Club as a Nippers parent, was an Age Manager, an Assistant Trainer, and a Patrolling Member from 1987/1988 to 1992/1993, along with his son Alistair (who later represented Australia in Rugby Union as a Wallaby). Ken was Secretary of the Club in 1988/1989. He left the Club when he and the family moved interstate for Ken's career.

He was Director General of the peak State Government agency, the Premier's Department, and served the public in this role in both NSW and Victoria, the only person since Federation to have done so.

Ken was intelligent, energetic, and reliable at both the Club and at work. A professional bureaucrat of integrity and common

sense at a time in the not so distant past when providing impartial and fearless advice to Ministers was the norm, Ken was my boss at work and I was his boss at the Club. There were never any conflicts.

He was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia for significant service to public administration and agricultural reform on Australia Day 2022.

He is survived by wife Annabel, their children and partners Sarah and Edward, Alastair and Jenny, Nick and Miranda, and grandchildren Will, Jimmy, Juliet, Lucy, Finn, Ed, Henry, Sandy, Rosie, and Frankie.



Keith Feehely grew up in Narrabeen with mum, dad and elder brother Barry. They lived in a tent on one of the permanent camp sites at Narrabeen Lakeside Camping Area before moving to Avalon Beach in 1959. The family moved into a house on Edmund Hock Lane behind the shopping centre.

Barry was awarded his Bronze Medallion in the 1955/1956 season and then Keith joined him a few seasons later. He jumped out of the blocks, taking out the Junior Belt, Junior Surf, and the Junior Beach Sprint. Consequently, he became the Junior Club Champion in 1961/1962 with his name on the Mignon War Memorial Shield.

Not a bad feat after losing his dad (a vice-president) in a motor vehicle accident on Old Barrenjoey Road earlier that season.

'Friendly', (Brian Friend), travelled from Narrabeen to surf with Keith and remembers him being called 'Phloss' – an abbreviated form of philosopher. Keith never answered a question basically but would embellish it with all the 'whats, whys, and wherefores' he could summon up. Keith also helped as a committee member during the 1962/1963 season as the delegate to the SLSA and as a member of the judiciary committee.

Brother Barry was Vice-Captain of the beach football team in

1963/1964 when Keith joined in. 'Friendly' reckoned he 'scorched sand' scoring the leading number of tries that season.

In 1964/1965 he took on the job of Registrar and in 1966/1967 became a Patrol Captain.

Barry and Keith both contributed to the running of 'The Stomp' when it began at Avalon Beach in the early 1960s. Unfortunately, they were forced to take it to North Narrabeen when the timber joists of the new Clubhouse began bending while carrying the load.

In March 1967 he married the love of his life, Kathleen Walcott. They moved to Western Australia where their daughter Jennifer was born in 1970 but returned soon after when their son Jason was born in 1972.

Keith brushed up on his Bronze Medallion requirements and joined the 'Old Farts' patrol for a time.

Sadly, Jason died in 2021, one year before Keith passed away on 13 November 2022. He is survived by his wife and three grandchildren.

JACK WATT

Jack Watt joined the Avalon Beach SLSC in 1949 and obtained his Qualifying Certificate in the 1952/1953 season – no doubt influenced by the great times his elder brother and Club member Max was having.

During the 1953/1954 season he was awarded his Bronze Medallion and was slotted into Patrol number 3 with Reg Wood as his Patrol Captain.

In 1958/1959 Jack became a Patrol Captain and according to historical Annual Reports, he joined the 'Benedict's Club' (married) in that year.

He married Nola Byrne, and they had 3 daughters - Jackie, Karen and Kerry.

During the 1950s he played beach football for the Club.

In the mid-1960s he partnered his brother Max in the double ski and together they won several branch titles as 'veteran' double ski paddlers; that was until Max (paddling up front) caught Jack playing at being a sea-anchor as they slid off the back of a huge wave which could have won them another title (had Jack not been dragging both legs!).

The handsome Jack was never far from admirers as captured by this great photograph taken at a Bondi carnival. The photograph shows Jack having donned a belt with line in tow, keenly surrounded by three dancers from the touring Russian Ballet.



In 1986 he was awarded Life Membership for service to the Club.

Like his brother, Jack was a great fisherman who's favourite saying was "you can fish in the rain but not in the wind".

He later married Robyn Forster and a Facebook entry in 2013 shows a picture of them both with the caption "in Nova Scotia with my darling Robyn".

Jack passed away on 17 February 2023.

He is survived by his three daughters who have booked the Surf Club for next year when his ashes will be scattered along with a celebration of his life.

Notes to the Financial Statements

AVALON BEACH SURF LIFE SAVING CLUB INC For the year ended 30 April 2023

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements cover Avalon Beach SLSC as an individual entity. Avalon Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a not-for-profit association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW).

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and the club's constitution. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows

AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 1031 Materiality

AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards

AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income *Tax* Assessment Act 1997.

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial Assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost orfair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets at amortised cost.

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Association changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Amortised cost

Assets measured at amortised cost are financial assets where:

- the business model is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

The Association's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Subsequent to initial recognition, these assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method less provision for impairment.

Interest income, and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for financial assets measured at amortised cost.

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Association considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Association's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Association uses the presumption that an asset which is more than 30 days past due has seen a significant increase in credit risk.

The Association uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when:

- the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Association in full, without recourse to the Association to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or
- the financial asset is more than 90 days past due.

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Association in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

Trade receivables

Impairment of trade receivables has been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses. The Association has determined the probability of non-payment of the receivable and multiplied this by the amount of the expected loss arising from default.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Association renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

Other financial assets measured at amortised cost

Impairment of other financial assets measured at amortised cost is determined using the expected credit loss model in AASB 9. On initial recognition of the asset, an estimate of the expected credit losses for the next 12 months is recognised. Where the asset has experienced significant increase in credit risk then the lifetime losses are estimated and recognised.

Financial Liabilities

The Association measures all financial liabilities initially at fair value less transaction costs; subsequently financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

The financial liabilities of the Association is comprised of trade payables.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

Leases

The Association applies AASB 16: Leases which applies a single lessee accounting model that eliminates the requirement for lease to be classified as operating or finance leases.

The Association also applies AASB 2018-8 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Right-of-Use Assets of Not-for-Profit Entities. This standard allows that where the lessee is a not-for-profit entity, the lessee may elect to measure right-of-use assets on a class-by-class basis at initial recognition at fair value.

In addition, where a lessee is a not-for-profit entity and elects to measure a class or classes of right-of-use assets at initial recognition at cost for leases that have significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives, the lessee shall disclose additional qualitative and quantitative information about those leases.

The disclosures so provided by a not-for-profit entity shall be provided individually for each material lease that has significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives or in aggregate for leases involving right-of-use assets of a similar nature.

At the date of this report the Association as lessee had entered into a lease on significantly below-market terms with Northern Beaches Council. As a not-for-profit entity the Association elects to measure Land and Buildings right-of-use assets at cost to enable the Association to further its objectives of the provision of life saving services at Avalon Beach.

The nature and terms of this lease are:

- The lease payments are \$1 per annum payable in arrears on demand
- The lease term is for 21 years from 1 January 2015 to 31 December 2035
- The asset the subject of the lease is the building at 558A Barrenjoey Road, Avalon Beach NSW less certain sections of that building let to other tenants
- The lease provides that the Association shall be entitled to use the leased premises only as a surf life saving club and other uses incidental including permitted rooms hire and functions.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Inventories

Inventories comprises goods for resale and goods for distribution at no or nominal consideration as part of the Association's charitable activities. Inventories may be purchased or received by way of donation.

Goods for resale

Inventories of goods for resale are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

Goods held for distribution

Donated goods and goods purchased for nominal consideration held for distribution are initially recognised at their current replacement cost at date of acquisition. Inventories of goods purchased and held for distribution are initially recognised at cost. The cost of bringing each product to its present location and condition is determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

Estimation uncertainty

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

Impairment

In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cash-generating units, based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.

Useful lives of depreciable assets

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain software and IT equipment.

Inventories

10

Management estimates the net realisable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date. The future realisation of these inventories may be affected by future technology or other market-driven changes that may reduce future selling prices.

Long service leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

Related Party Transactions

The Association's related parties include its key management personnel and related entities as described below. Unless otherwise stated, none of the transactions incorporate special terms and conditions and no guarantees were given or received. Outstanding balances are usually settled in cash.

Transactions with related entities

The Association sourced goods and services from members at market rate during the financial year. All related party services and contracts are approved by the Committee.

Transactions with key management personnel

All key management personnel and volunteers are not compensated for holding office positions.

8. Subsequent Events

These include the ability of the Association to perform in line with budgets and cash flow projections, in addition to achieving sustainable levels of trading and membership in the future.

The Association will continue to comply with government regulation and SLSA pronouncements, including proposals for staged relaxation of lock down and other restrictions.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting and Subsequent Event: The Impact of the Uncertainty of COVID-19

I draw attention to Note 1, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Association's financial reporting responsibilities under the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth), the charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), the Associates Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW) and the Club's constitution. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.

I draw attention to Note 6 in the financial report, which describes events during the year and subsequent to year-end and specifically the possible effects of the future implications of COVID-19 on the Association's future financial position and performance. In our view, this issue is fundamental to users' understanding of the financial report.

My opinion is not modified in respect of these matters

Responsibility of the Committee's for the Financial Report

The committee of the Association is responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and has determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth), the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the needs of members. The responsible entities' responsibility also includes such internal control as the responsible entities determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue and auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial report. As part of an audit in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- •Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omission, misrepresentation or the override of internal control.
- •Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the Committee.
- •Conclude on the appropriateness of the Committee's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial report or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Associate to cease to continue as a going concern.
- •Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a matter that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with the Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in the internal control that I identify during my audit.
