# DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ROBERT HOPTON

Robert has clocked up more than 20 years of service having gained his Bronze Medallion in March 2001.

Robert has been a Nipper Age Manager, Patrolling Member, IRB Driver, has served on the Building Committee assisting with the development and construction of our current Clubhouse, a starter on the Lion Island Challenge and competed as a Master. Over the past year or so he has also been the Covid Marshall for the Club which has involved attending the bar twice on a weekend and any other events as required and making sure the Club is COVID compliant.

### **PATROLS:**

Robert has fulfilled his patrolling duties every year being a qualified IRB driver as well as Bronze holder. Since he has been on Long Service he has been one of the go to members for Subs. He has also volunteered his time to drive IRBs at various carnivals including the past three NSW Championships. This year he sat in the duck for 6 hours in the pouring rain! In the patrol season of 2005/2006, he was awarded outstanding patrol service

In October 2010 he was one of a number of members to be awarded the Rescue of the Month by Surf Life Saving NSW for actions in assisting a man who had fallen on the southern headland of our beach.

### **BUILDING COMMITTEE:**

Robert still heads up the Building Committee, something he has worked on since before our current Clubhouse was but a pencil drawing on paper. The building committee was formed in the 2005/2006 season and Robert has been on it since then, some 15 years. This has involved all negotiations with Council, builders and any trades who have had to work

on the old and the current building. He was one of two architects for our current Clubhouse and was also heavily involved in applying for grants and negotiating with sponsors which saved the Club and council significant funds in our upgrades.



### **AVALON BEACH SWIM:**

Robert has been a member of the organising committee for the swim for many years, managing and being responsible for the finish line.

Lion Island Challenge: Robert has assisted on this race every year and for a number of years was the race starter.

### AGE MANAGER:

Robert was age manager for several years from 2007/08 season taking the under 12s through to their Cadetship and Bronze Medallion with Ross Bidencope.

In 2007 Robert was awarded the Norman Cook Award for Club Person of the Year. In 2013 and 2021 he was awarded the President's Award.

When the Club helped with the fire support early last year Robert not only was on hand to collect the huge amount of donations given to us, but he also coordinated the shed storage area and drove some of the supplies to the needy on the South Coast.

Robert is one of those members who assists with everything that the Club does, be it a BBQ, an event or just something that needs to be done around the Club.

# LIFE MEMBER NATHAN WELLINGS

Nathan was a Nipper at Avalon Beach SLSC following which he received his Bronze Medallion on 14 January 1995. He received his SLSA 25 Year Long Service Award in 2020. Nathan has Long Service membership status at Avalon Beach.

Nathan has patrolled a remarkable 710.25 hours at Avalon Beach during his 31 years as a senior active member. In 2007 he received a President's Award and in 2014 he won the Max Watt Competitor of the Year Award with the U23 Pink Bits and the Chris "Detho" Dethick - Boatie of the Year Award. Nathan held the position of Club Captain for four years, from the 2007/8 season until 2009/10 and took over the role again after Steve Parkes had his accident, completing another full season. He held a position on the Board of Management in this capacity and has also been on the Life Membership and Building Committees. Nathan is the Licensee for our liquor license and ran the bar through the initial years after the Club was rebuilt. In his capacity as a licenced electrician Nathan has helped with maintenance and various building projects around the Clubhouse. Nathan is a current member of our Emergency Call-Out team.

Nathan has a total of 44 awards including Bronze Medallion, ARTC, Senior First Aid, Silver Medallion IRB Driver, Surf Coach Level 1 and Boat sweep Accreditation.

Nathan is best known in the Club as a competitor. Since he gained his Bronze in 1995 he has represented the Club in surf sports every year he has been a member. He has competed in

beach and rescue events at State and National levels, in IRB racing and most predominantly in Surf Boat racing.

He has won medals at World, National, State, Branch and ASRL levels. Nathan rowed throughout his junior years and after obtaining his Sweep Accreditation in 2008, has swept and coached countless crews since. The huge commitment and dedication of early morning training, gym sessions, maintenance of the boats and gear and coordination of crews and carnivals has been repeated year after year to the benefit of so many members. Nathan has been instrumental in building our enormously successful Surf Boat team at Avalon Beach, which has led to not only high retention rates among our junior members, but a strong spirit that has permeated throughout the Club.

In 2018, with his wife Mel, Nathan founded and organised the first 24-hour row to raise money for local mental health organisations. This has grown exponentially each year since to now be a nation-wide event that raises hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Nathan is a quietly inspirational member who gets on with the job and is unwavering in his dedication. He has been a member of the Club for almost his entire life and has committed countless hours representing the Club and benefitting our members.

Nathan now becomes our youngest Life Member.





# NATIONAL MEDAL

The National Medal was established by the Commonwealth of Australia in 1975 as one of the original elements of the distinctive Australian system of honours and awards and is Australia's most awarded civilian medal.

The National Medal recognises long and diligent service by members of recognised government and voluntary organisations that risk their lives or safety to protect or assist the community in enforcement of the law or in times of emergency or natural disaster. This includes government organisations such as ambulance, correctional, emergency, fire and police forces and, more recently (2019), voluntary organisations such as lifesaving.

The National Medal is awarded for a minimum of 15 years eligible service and clasps are awarded for each additional period of ten years service.

# 2021 WINNERS

### **INNOVATION OF THE YEAR**

24 Hour Row (Mel and Nathan Wellings)

In 2018 Nathan and Mel Wellings started the first 24 Hour Row in response to a number of youth suicides that were occurring on the Northern Beaches of Sydney. Their goal was to raise awareness and financially support local youth and mental health groups OneEighty and Gotcha4Life.

Their first event was run at Avalon Beach and involved 48 rowers from the Club's surf boat team. The format was to keep at least 2 rowing machines running continuously for 24 hours and for rowers to be sponsored for every hour they rowed. By 2020 the 24-Hour Row was supported by 16 clubs with over 600 participants.

Nathan and Mel started something that has grown bigger than they ever could have envisaged. The 24-Hour Row has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for youth mental health and has become a primary way in which the surf lifesaving movement can contribute to and deliver results in the mental health space. As well as this, the event itself promotes fitness and is a wonderful way for surf boat teams and clubs as a whole to come together, support each other, build team spirit

Congratulations Tom on this outstanding achievement which has been deservedly recognised by the Surf Life Saving movement.


# 2022 WINNER

### **RESCUE OF THE YEAR**

It was an epic win for our young IRB Drivers, Todd Barber and Zach Dale, at SLSSNB's 2022 Awards of Excellence taking out the Rescue of the Year Award for their heroic efforts in March

At approximately 2:30pm, Surfcom put a call out for Avalon Beach to support a mayday call of a 35ft motor power cruiser taking on water. With 45km winds and 4-5 metre swell, the IRB was launched.

Swiftly navigating the challenging conditions, Zach and Todd made it through the surf break and began making their way to the boat in need. On arrival the boys found three people clinging to what was remaining above water of the large boat. Within minutes of getting all onboard the IRB, the boat sunk out of sight. Shortly after other support teams arrived including the RWC and Whale Beach IRB and were in communication with Marine Rescue taking all on board for a safe return to calm waters.



# PRESIDENT'S REPORT



We started our season with uncertainty due to Covid restrictions and a complete rework of all our pre-season plans reinforcing that change is "business as usual". We were always guided by NSW health guidelines and recommendations from SLSNSW which seemed to change daily but we showed last season that when

there was a hurdle, we jumped over it and in learning the lessons from the experience we were always confident that we could mirror that success again this season. And yes, we did!

It is a relief and a pleasure to state that we met our core service obligations in the 2021-2022 season with no lives lost on our beach during patrol hours. For the season we were close to 5,000 patrol hours at own beach and another 600 hours at other beaches, recording 701 preventative actions and 122 rescues. In addition to patrolling, Jason Dale, Andrew Crow and Nick Sampson assisted in flood relief efforts in Nowra, Bass Hill and Narrabeen and Terry Barber assisted in Ballina in the Northern Rivers region of NSW that were particularly hard hit.

The New Year long weekend saw our busiest days of the season, if not in the overall history of the Club, with massive crowds breaking free from lockdown, perfect swimming weather and some tricky conditions. Our Club Captains, Nick Sampson and Jason Dale were on patrol on the Sunday and showed strong leadership in reading the conditions and knowing that extra assistance was required to control the situation and had the courage to ask for it. Both stayed for the full day to ensure that all was managed professionally

Thanks to all who were rostered onto the patrol with some members in the morning patrol staying later into the day and the afternoon patrol members coming early, as well as additional members who responded to the message and came down to the beach to assist. It was obvious why you were needed and I'm sure you went home satisfied that you were part of a team that put your skills to the test, either through preventative actions or in undertaking rescues when required, up and down the whole beach. In total we recorded 58 rescues performed on the Sunday and another 6 on the Monday and we are rightly proud of our achievement in keeping the beach protected and sending all our guests safely home to their families. The Club nominated this effort as Rescue for the Month and all patrol members were recognised for their efforts with a certificate of appreciation by Branch and awarded Patrol of the Year at Club level in our annual awards night.

This weekend was not the only time that our capabilities, commitment, and determination were tested and was not the only nomination for Rescue of the Month. Just 2.5 weeks after completing his SRC assessment in January, Will Dawson participated in an after-patrol hours rescue at Kiddies corner at Palm Beach. Zac Dale and Todd Barber were nominated and won Rescue of the Month for an IRB call out to a capsized boat between the Avalon and Whale Beach headland in big surf reaching some relieved fisherman. There was also another rescue in May, after patrol had finished for the season, where the masters training crew came to the assistance of a surfer who sustained a broken patella and lower leg compound fracture and stayed with him until medical assistance arrived.

Whilst these rescues were formally recognised, they in no way diminish our efforts, vigilance, and dedication across all patrols in the season signifying the importance of what we do and our confidence in our skills, training, and experience to know we can manage the beach in all situations. Our patrolling members' rescue readiness reflects their commitment and dedication and the training that is delivered by our education team. At the start of the season, our trainers had to made significant changes to the way proficiency was conducted with all patrolling members requested to either stay late to morning patrol or come early to afternoon patrol to undertake proficiency. This worked so effectively that this year we had proficiency completed much earlier than in previous years and has provided the blueprint for future seasons. Our trainers were also responsible for training two Gold, 24 Bronze and 21 SRC candidates who we hope to see patrolling next season. In addition, 54 members updated their first aid qualifications with a further 26 members completing the updated ART award. Through the delivery of these courses, our trainers were also able to update their own training credentials placing our Club in an excellent position for future training delivery. All this training translates to our confidence on the beach and the Club continues to support and encourage all members to continue to upskill.

Despite disruption to the competition season with Branch and State being cancelled for some competition categories, our results were outstanding. Nippers did get to compete in the beach events at State with Willow Toll achieving a Bronze in the U11 Female Beach Sprint and Ethan Warner achieving Gold in U10 Male Beach Flags and Bronze in U10 Male Beach Sprint. Sophie Gough was a finalist in the U11 Female Beach Sprint coming in fifth place.

Our senior competition teams have been successful at Branch, State and National level and without diminishing anyone's efforts and results, congratulations to our Pinkies (Reserve Grade Male Surf Boat) and Johnny Harper (50-59 Male Short

Board) for Gold medals and to Aisha Ferris (50-54yrs Female 2km Beach Run) for Silver at the Aussies. Congratulations also to Pat Quinlan, Gem Lehman, Ashley Brown and Darren Warrener for success at Aussies in both individual and team events competing for Newport.

Unfortunately, we were unable to host Lion Island Challenge, Carols at the Beach and our annual Surf Swim event either due to Covid restrictions or poor weather and water quality. These events raise funds for the Club so it is disappointing, but we are hoping that all can take place in the coming year. We did manage to squeeze in a welcome to the season party in December and our Club Awards night this year where we recognised our achievements for the past three years as a catch up to Covid disruptions. Congratulations to all our recipients as your recognition is well deserved.

We have made a profit again this year and this is a testament to the Board being prudent in the way we manage the Club's finances. We want to thank our sponsors McGrath Pittwater, Brown Bros Skip Bins, Johnson Bros Mitre 10 and Voss Store for their continued support. Together with government grants and our own revenue generating activities in the Bangalley Bar and functions and community hire in the Ocean Room, we are in a strong financial position moving forward. We feel very confident that we will be able to fund patrolling and training equipment as needed and are proud to state that we have new IRB and motors on order which should be delivered next season as well as two new surf boats to support our boaties.

Council has recently settled the leasing dispute with Trippas White Group and it is expected that new tenants will be sought for the restaurant and kiosk space. These areas remain outside the control and management of the Club, but we hope to be able to work with new operators for the benefit of both parties and it will be good to have renewed life in those areas.

On an unhappy note, this year saw the passing of Life Member, Peter Akehurst and we recognise that this is a sad time for his family, friends and fellow Club members. Pete held many positions in the Club over the years, including Club Captain and Chief Instructor, but was known for his passion for IRB racing, not only at Avalon Beach but in the wider IRB community. Pete was one of the first people I met at the Club and I know that he left a lasting impression on me as well as all the others he mentored and competed with that he imparted with surf skills, and more importantly, life skills. Pete will be sadly missed. VALE.

We should be rightly proud of our achievements over the past year despite the challenges faced. None of this would have been possible without our Club members who come together for a common purpose and, when asked, will put themselves in service to assist a visitor to our beach. You do so without asking for recognition but with the knowledge that your skills can help save someone in trouble. We come from different backgrounds, careers, genders and ages but together we are one and I thank you.

# FINANCIAL REPORT

On behalf of the Avalon Beach SLSC Board of Management, I present this year's financial accounts for members' consideration and adoption for year ended 30 April 2022. In keeping with the prior years, these accounts have been prepared to provide our members and other stakeholders with financial information about the Club's operations, the financial position and cash flow activity.

The special purpose financial statements have been prepared to satisfy the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act, the Associations Incorporation Act, the Australian Charities and Not for Profits Act, and the Club's constitution. The accounts have been compiled by Beweiszer Accounting and Tax firm and independently audited by Mr Peter Power in accordance with the applicable Australian Auditing Standards. These accounts cover the period 1 May 2021 to 30 April 2022.

The Statement of Comprehensive Income records a surplus of \$79,375 which was better than budget expectations.

Contributing to the surplus was an increase in our function hire income, up 56% on the prior year and sponsorship revenue, up 90% on the prior year. However, the year saw a decline in revenue from Government COVID assistance (-55%), Friday and Sunday bar sales (-44%) and Nipper membership fees (-21%).

The Club was again limited in its ability to generate income due to COVID restrictions. For example, community hire was shut down until November and the Bar closed between July and November resulting in reduced income from both activities.

This year saw the introduction of paid function bar staff as a way of improving our level of service at function events and freeing up Club members to concentrate on providing the Friday and Sunday bar service.

Concerns around hosting a COVID safe Carols at the Beach event resulted in the event being cancelled for the second year running and due to poor water quality, the Around the Bends Swim was also cancelled. No income has been recorded for these events in the accounts. Nipper membership revenue

recorded a 21% decline but continued to represent our largest income category.

Expenditure during the period totalled \$350,518, which is a reduction of \$13,026 or 4% over the prior period.

Settlement of unpaid lease fees for the Ocean Room has now been reached and recorded in these accounts. A reversal of \$22,322 to the Doubtful Debt provision and Bad Debt expense of \$14,690, was incurred for the year.

The Club's cash position improved \$54,972 over the prior year, with net assets increasing to \$536,494, up from \$475,119 in 2021 and as recorded in the statement of financial position.

Capital expenditure totalled \$42,175 and included two new IRBs motors as well as deposits for two Thundercat IRB's. A portion of these expenses were offset by the **Federal Government Beach Safety Equipment Fund (BSEF).** 

New patrol and training equipment included three additional UHF radios, rescue tubes and CPR manikins purchased with the assistance of **NSW Government's Club Life Saving Equipment Grant (CLEG)**.

A deposit payment was also made for a new surfboat at a cost of \$11,000. Additional bar furniture costing \$3,163 was also acquired.

A successful **Federal Government Volunteer Grant** to the value of \$3,300 will be spent prior to the end of the calendar year

The \$2,500 **Club Sun Safety Grant**, funded and facilitated by SLSNSW and Surf Life Saving Services (SLSS) to provide financial assistance to clubs to promote Sun Smart principles was used to purchase broad brimmed hats and sunscreen for patrolling members as well as a sun shelters and a marquee for our roaming patrol stationed at the northern end of the beach.

In conclusion, 2022 saw the Club's activities returning to a level of normality and income sources also returning. Our cash at bank and overall balance sheet improved and this puts us well placed to continue to achieve our strategic objectives.

With a little further realignment, the Club adopted the last-minute changes seeing out the season with great success. To all the IRB drivers that covered shifts when needed a big thank you, you were incredible. Without undertaking the additional shifts to support the roster changes it would have looked very different.

Once again, our Patrol Captains did a fantastic job. They were able to manage navigating through the changes and complete a season with no lives lost between the flags. It was great to see communication levels increase throughout our patrols and the introduction of Swapsea (patrol swap app) assisted in organising patrol swaps. We encourage people to utilise this tool even more in the coming season, get in early, plan out your season and find swaps if you're unavailable.

The trainers did a fantastic job of getting all the proficiencies done. This is a thankless task. Please, please help us out next year by getting it done early, utilising Swapsea to help us plan and schedule. There will be incentives to patrolling members for early completion with more information to come in the coming months. A shout out to the Trainers who were assisting people to get through proficiency on New Year's Eve, a standout effort. As patrolling members, we can improve here so trainers don't give up that holiday time!

Not only do the Trainers manage the proficiency process, but they also run the courses that bring new members and upskill our current patrolling members. The more Award upskills we get every year makes getting subs easier for everyone. It's also a great way to meet more people within the Club and expose yourself to something new. We are throwing down the challenge for every single patrol member to upskill with one new award this season. We will be looking at ways we can deliver courses more flexibly to suit your time commitments. We will also be looking to incentivise people that gain a new Award next season. If you were ever wondering about what was next, get in touch as there is an Award out there for every member. No-one has them all!!!

The Emergency Call Out Team continue to be invaluable providing after hours support. This year the team also travelled up and down the coast working closely with Emergency Services (SES) on larger scale natural disaster assistance. Thank you for working with your employers and stretching yourselves to give up this valuable time when needed.

We nominate many great rescues we hear and see through the course of the year to the 'Rescue of the Month awards with Sydney Northern Beaches Branch. Each month's winners roll into an automatic nomination for 'Rescue of the Year'. Excitingly this year it has been won by Avalon Beach, brilliant news! It is a belief that more great rescues, in and out of the water, happen with no recognition. Please share your experiences with Patrol Captains. In turn we can ensure great stories like these are shared, showing the skill and capability in the Club while also sharing the learnings along the way.

Signing off for the last time this season. Bring on a summer of new challenges and be on the lookout for communications from us in the very near future about patrol groups for next season.

# **EMERGENCY CALL-OUT TEAM**

Overall, all it was quieter this year than the last couple for the Emergency Call Out Team, for which we are all grateful. Conditions were generally not favourable with cold, raining, high winds or high sea and sometimes a combination of all of these.

Again, and again our team responded to the calls for assistance from the Surf Lifesaving tasking system. With a closer involvement with Emergency Services, we have seen our team offer their support even greater distances from Avalon Beach Surf Club. Further upskilling has supported increased capability of our team to support the increased needs of SLS in our local community and build a stronger synergy with Emergency Services.

We had a team that responded all the way to Nowra. This team did some moving around different SES bases through Western Sydney on their return to Sydney. Terry Barber, who whilst living up in Ballina over summer, was in the thick of the action at Lismore during the floods and was the Surf Lifesaving Liaison at the emergency response centre, maintaining this role every day for nearly three weeks. Through his skills and knowledge of surf life saving he managed to co-ordinate and save hundreds of lives and bring people to safety whilst homes were being destroyed. He did all of this whilst the water level was slowly rising on his own property. Thankfully the top back step was as deep as it got.

Our team continue to gain recognition from the Surf Live Saving Northern Beaches Branch for our efforts seeing our very own Zachary Dale and Todd Barber win the Rescue of the Year. An awesome outcome and well done gents!! While the boys were on patrol for the rescue on this day, we see time and time again at all hours of the day the speed and effectiveness of our Club for out of hour rescues. Avalon Beach is often called out before Clubs that may be closer to the incident at the time.

Again, the whole team are to be thanked and commended by us all for their professionalism and courage that they continue to show when answering a range of callouts representing Avalon Beach Surf Life Saving Club and the broader SLS movement as a leading emergency service team. We are hoping to further develop skills in this area with courses in conjunction with other emergency services this coming summer.

Preventions are key to this limited exposure for many of our members and acknowledgement to you all for such a successful year in doing this.

Below we have shared three of the nominations put forward this year. While all have been acknowledged by Surf Life Saving Northern Beaches Branch, the Rescue of the Year gained the greatest celebration. Credit to the Club on nurturing the skills and capability of all our members to have this level of success, recognition and calibre of people willing to put themselves at risk to help another person in need of assistance. The ultimate reward is the thanks from the individual/s helped when in need.

### **2 JANUARY 2022**

On this extremely busy day just after New Year's Eve, Avalon Beach had 1-to-1.5-meter swells driven by cyclone (Seth) which pushed water over the bank into a gutter before the shoreline. The gutter rip on its own, drifting outside the flags, had a strong pull catching swimmers off guard. North Avalon on low tide had people being pushed off the small bank into a quick moving rip. With a similar story on the southern rip near the pool, and with the North Easterly swell, it looked mostly unappealing to those not familiar with the surf. With what was believed to be the largest attendance on the beach in years, a call out for more support was made via the Surfguard SMS system. This resulted in the arrival of several additional supporting patrolling members that allowed us to keep the beach open with the belief we could continue to support anyone in need. Avalon Beach's average patrol size is 11, which swelled to close to 30 patrolling members through a combination

of people staying on from the morning patrol and 10-15 members that responded to the call out. Some rescues throughout the day were at the northern end of the beach in the rip running with the rocks, with the vast majority of rescues in the middle of the beach due to the fast moving inshore gutter sweep from north to south. All rescues took place over about five hours as the tide dropped. In total, 71 rescues were completed during the course of the day with three during the morning patrol and 68 in the afternoon.

### **3 JANUARY 2022**

Nomination - William Dawson

A rip was running along the rocks adjacent to the ocean pool at South Palm Beach with a stiff wind of about 10-15 knots. The lifeguards had finished for the day. A father and daughter were both caught in the unusually strong rip at Kiddie's Corner, had drifted some distance and were still being taken out. Will and another surfer helped to bring the girl in by taking turns padding her back whilst she held on to their board, and the other surfers brought the man back in. They were not local and seemed totally unaware of the danger they were in. It was scary to watch how quickly it all unfolded but thankfully had a happy outcome. I was very proud watching Will put all his new knowledge to the test and staying cool and calm at the same time.

### 19 MARCH 2022

Nomination - Todd Barber and Zac Dale

Sydney Northern Beaches Branch Rescue of the Month winner – March

Sydney Northern Beaches Branch Rescue of the Year – 2021-2022

Surfcom put call out for Avalon Beach to support a mayday call from a 35ft motor power cruiser taking on water. With 45km winds and 4–5-metre swell, Todd and Zac launched the IRB in support of the call. With swift navigation in challenging conditions, they made their way through the surf break and began the tricky navigation to the boat in need. Upon arriving at the scene Todd and Zac found three people clinging to what was remaining above water of their large boat. They quickly managed to get all three patients on board the IRB. Within minutes of getting all onboard, the boat sunk out of sight. Shortly after other support teams including the SNB RWC and Whale Beach SLSC IRB arrived. The Avalon IRB communicated with Surfcom to arrange a transfer onto a Marine Rescue vessel who took all the patients on board for a safe return to calm waters.

# FLOOD DISASTER SUPPORT

The environment continues to test the resilience of our emergency call out teams with the most recent flooding in Western Sydney requiring emergency services support on 3 July. Approximately 14 IRBs and crews responded to SLSNSW's call for support across NSW with Avalon Beach SLSC's Jason Dale and Nick Sampson putting their hand up to assist.

The following day, Nick and Jason were posted to Liverpool SES base. It was clear from the onset SES wanted to work with SLS and utilise the additional SLS assets available. Being assigned to a particular SES team, both emergency services teams shadowed each other to multiple taskings throughout the day. One of those tasking was dropping food supplies to an isolated gentleman. Nothing prepared Nick and Jason for what was to happen next.

After being stood down for the day and on their way to a hotel they found themselves caught in flash flooding themselves and for close to three hours switched gears back into life saving mode. Below is a raw detailed timeline of the night by Nick and Jason.

In summary, Jason and Nick evacuated close to 100 vehicles comprising young, elderly and highly emotional people to safety. Their rescue support varied from pulling people out of car windows and carrying to high water to simply escorting and directing people to evacuation assembly points. Their standout moment was rescuing an elderly woman from moving water who was swept off her feet along with a policewoman who had jumped in to assist. Jason and Nick, working together, were able to gather them before being swept into a raging creek. Support continued with the SES evacuating a childcare centre as one of the last efforts of the night.

The following day the boys retuned to Liverpool SES and were quickly tasked again to Londonderry along the Nepean River. Working with the SES, the boys found themselves rescuing sheep and goats. Due to the filthy conditions of the water, they had to be decontaminated by the Fire Brigade. A new experience for both!

On the third day Jason and Nick were tasked to Gosford SES. With an early tasking to Wollombi many hours were spent attempting to get to 11 people seeking evacuation. Unfortunately, the risks were too high resulting in being stood down after 5 hours. It was understood extraction by air was being considered. On returning to the SES base a late tasking found our boys with two other crews doing an SLS independent evacuation only 10 minutes from their location resulting in three adults and three pets evacuated just before dark.

The three days were exhausting, unfortunate and rewarding at the same time. This experience has provided an opportunity to give feedback to SLS in how to work with Emergency Services units, SES in particular, as well as giving our Club Captains valuable insight that will be brought back into our Club and community.



### Summary

An incredibly intense situation with over 100 cars worth of people evacuated. Without the involvement of SLS operators this could have very easily been a fatal incident. 50 cars were cleared by SLS during extreme conditions. The whole event took less than four hours. The scene the next day was still a war like zone with 25-30 cars unable to move due to flood damage. SLS operators were commended on scene by all the attending agencies for their skill and work ethic.

### **Recommendations to SLS**

Create a flood response team with a higher skill level and adequate training. Appropriate SLS branded PPE including branded steamers, wet weather jackets that keep people dry, similar to duty officer jackets. Patrol jackets were completely inadequate. Branded vehicles to use on shift and transporting to staging locations. The incident we were involved in was 1km from staging area and people should not have to have personal vehicles in any dangerous situation. Increased access to GRN radios.

SLS ran a professional operation and put a few other agencies to shame. SLS response could be a vastly improved operation with clearer instructions from other agencies. Commendation to all the support staff in the office who did an incredible job supporting the teams on the ground.

5:35pm:	Drove car to highest point in road exited car as noticed a car stuck and POI trapped inside. Got PPE on and waded into about waist high water. Evacuated POI and got to high ground.		
5:45pm:	Assessed situation as six more cars required assistance. Most POI were accompanied as they walked from their car. One POI carried.		
6:00pm:	Started an assembly point on the road for all the POI. A further seven cars drove into flood water attempting to stop with no success.		
6:15pm:	Advised Liaison Officer – Metro ICC (Kieran Menzies) of current situation via phone as no GRN radio in the personal vehicle. A further eight cars were evacuated and approx. 75 cars stuck surrounded by rapidly rising flood waters. Only assets on scene were Off-Duty SLS operators, Jason and Nick.		
6:15pm:	Nick and Jason went to separate ends of the immediate area in an attempt to support other POI's in need and to prevent further vehicles entering and becoming inoperable from water.		
6:20pm:	Fire rescue on scene to help with an initial POI Nick and Jason had supported earlier. With matter dealt with they moved on and left scene. Jason directed traffic to prevent further cars from entering location.		
6:30pm:	Jason supported approx. ten car occupants to a nearby bus stop at higher ground as vehicles were either bogged in median strip or inoperable from the flooding.		
6:30pm:	Assessments completed approx. 500m each direction of initial scene. Located Highway Patrol Police and Nick updated the situation to date. Police advised there was a car 200m up the road with people trapped. Nick attended. Water about 0.7m-1.4m. Located 2 POI both non-swimmers. Car door jammed shut. POI wound down window. 1 POI at a time was removed from the car and transported to higher ground via 1 person carry. Whilst carrying 2nd POI, Nick unsuccessfully attempted to stop a small car from entering the flood water. After completing the original rescue, Nick moved to the new car and was able to get door open. 1 male and 3 toddlers were carried over three trips (toddlers first) to an evacuation high point.		
6:50pm:	Updated SLS SOC via Hanna Clare, JD and NS reconnect and continue together.		
7:00pm:	Metro police arrive on scene, conducted an incident update, and made the decision to evacuate remaining 50-70 cars of all occupants. SLS operator worked with NSW police to complete task. Some cars in depths of 0.8-1m deep at this stage with the majority of occupants non-swimmers.		
7:30pm:	Police rescue and SES arrive on scene to add more personnel. Working in teams as all agencies collaborated to complete the evacuations of mostly elderly and young children from cars. Water was moving at a pace which required a 2-man team to move most POI. Almost all POI non-swimmers.		
7:45pm:	Elderly female slipped attempting to move through flood water 0.8 deep, washed by the flow of water. NSW Police dived and grabbed and kept afloat with both now racing towards the deep-water section. Jason, Nick and police rescue operator who were in the deep section created a barrier and scooped up both the POI ir the water. Both POI collected and moved to the evacuation point and transferred to NSW ambulance for shock.		
8:00pm:	SES Unimog requested assistance to evacuate a kindergarton approx. 100m up a side street. 10 POI varying ages. Police Rescue, SES and SLS rode on Unimog to scene through high flood water vehicle at max height. 7 toddlers, 2 teachers, 1 parent and 1 baby all OK physically, however, anxious and scared. Able to walk all POI to Unimog and transport to evacuation point to return to families and waiting parents.		
8:30pm:	Updated SLS Incident controller (Andrew Cribb) and waited on scene for water to subside enough to drive car out.		
9:15pm:	Water at a level to safely leave incident.		

# **EDUCATION REPORT**

Congratulations again to our education team on another successful season despite all the obstacles thrown at them. Not only was there Covid to deal with but also a tsunami warning, shark alarms, thunderstorms and torrential rain events resulting in poor water quality, debris and dangerous surf conditions.

Despite this, our Club's Trainers and Assessors were able to work through the season with a creditable 138 new awards for Avalon Beach SLSC members.

At the start of each season the Trainers' primary aim is focused on the Bronze proficiencies. It's a huge task ensuring patrolling members have completed these by the end of December, so a huge thanks goes to Steve Broderick who took on the role of Skills Maintenance Co-Ordinator. With help from Rick Mitchell and other trainers, the proficiencies were completed.

While the Bronze Medallion courses did not have the usual quantity of candidates, the quality of the training was exceptional. Newly endorsed trainers, Rosemary Morgan-Smith and Charlotte Broderick led the way, running two successful Bronze Medallion courses while also mentoring probationary trainers Helen Tan, Sophie Valentine and Mia Clendinning. Of course, they'd acknowledge the assistance of Steve Broderick, Steve Early, Mark Head and Rick Mitchell when required.

Once again Dave Roberts took the reins of the SRC and Cadet Bronze Medallion courses with the assistance from many parent helpers. Altogether Dave trained 31 candidates to successfully complete their course this season. After 10 years of training close to 500 candidates, Dave will be having a well-deserved break from training next season. A huge effort! Thanks again, Dave.

Some other season highlights included 26 Advanced Resuscitation Technique awards, most being trained by Louise Lindop, and 54 First Aid Certificates, with Mike Stanley-Jones and Andrew Clark completing the Silver Medallion Aquatic Rescue award towards the end of the season.

Congratulations also to Jack Roberts and Harrison Schaut for completing the Gold Medallion, while Steve Broderick, Rosemary Morgan-Smith, Nicholas Parker and Jack Roberts earned Silver Medallion Beach Management awards.

Due to Covid, no Club members could travel to our sister club in Singapore. It was proposed to run a Zoom Bronze Medallion course however, most of the Singapore Nippers season was cancelled with many of the candidates returning to their native countries. ABSLSC Trainers are looking to a possible return to Singapore next season.

The IRB team, led by Alan Moran, ran an efficient skills maintenance program and had several candidates training for IRB Driver and Crew awards. Due to Covid and surf conditions, no new IRB awards were gained by Club members, but the team already have assessments booked in for next season. The IRB team is always looking for new drivers and crew, so let Alan or Terry Barber know if you're keen.

Congratulations to Helen Tan on recently becoming an Endorsed Trainer. We're eager to build our Education Team. Please let us know if you're interested.

This season we also welcomed two new Bronze Assessors

– Steve Early and Mark Head. This role is not highly visible,
except on assessment day, but is essential for the continued
running of courses across the branch.

The Education team also thanks Club President Bernadette McKay, Club Administrator Leanne Austin and the Board of Management for continued support during a difficult season.

# PUBLIC OFFICER AND GOVERNANCE PANEL REPORTS

The Club at every turn actively aspires to excellence, innovation and best practice. To our knowledge we continue to be one of the very few clubs to have appointed a dedicated Public Officer and an independent Governance Panel.

The Public Officer is ultimately responsible for the Club's dealings with government. These include but are not limited to the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not for Profits Commission, the Australian Taxation Office, the NSW Office of Fair Trading in relation to matters under the NSW Associations Incorporation Act, and the NSW Office of Gaming and Racing in relation to fundraising activities.

In the past year the Public Officer's role continued early on with monitoring and advice in relation to COVID-19 lockdown and other restrictions, and as those restrictions eased, with multiple short term federal and state government assistance programs. Consideration was also given to effects on the Club of the withdrawal over time of those assistance packages. Inevitably some technical issues were addressed in relation to presentation of financial statements in accordance with existing and changing Australian Accounting Standards, and to solvency and going concern matters during the pandemic. Surf Life Saving NSW formed a financial committee and reviewed the published financial statements of many clubs for the prior financial year. Your Public Officer met with accountants and auditors of our Club and other neighbouring clubs to consider and to address these matters on a

uniform basis for the presentation of financial statements for subsequent financial years.

The Governance Panel acts independently of but reports to the Board of Management and ultimately to members. It is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Club's activities and operations. The Panel seeks to ensure good corporate governance, and to ascertain and to implement best practice including advice and education to members as required.

During the year further matters were addressed in relation to workers compensation insurance matters, and particularly in relation to ensuring coverage for members and deemed workers engaged in duties other than those covered as designated life saving duties. In overlap with other responsibilities your Chairman was also occupied on committees for revision of the Club's constitution, strategies in conjunction with Council for the proposed withdrawal from lease and licence of the former restaurant and café operator and collection of outstanding money, consideration of structure of lease and licence and calling for tenders for a new operator or operators of the restaurant and café, and at the time of writing, consideration of proposed contents of a licence for part time office operations for third parties in the clubhouse.

# ADMINISTRATION REPORT

Our 2021 AGM took place in a wholly virtual environment (a Club first!) as the extension of the Greater Sydney Covid lock down was announced. At short notice, members Sally Macintosh, Donna Wishart and Terry Barber set up and managed the technical side of running a virtual AGM enabling those involved in more formal duties such as presenting or, in my case, minute-taking, to perform our roles with confidence.

Membership renewals would usually open immediately after the AGM, however, with the uncertainty of how long the lockdown would extend, the introduction by SLSNSW of a vaccine mandate for all front-line volunteer members, a Clubhouse in lockdown, the suspension of training and access to Club equipment and a total ban on community sport, it is fair to say it was an unexpected start to the season.

Covid safe plans and refund policies were busily rewritten, the Club Captains determinedly assembled, reassembled and juggled patrol team formation and Nipper membership renewal was suspended in response to the ever-changing Covid landscape.

Membership renewals were lower this season, down 15.5% from last year's record year. Who can tell if it was the extended lockdown, the vaccination mandate, or the dire weather we had in the lead up to, and throughout the season. Even our welcome back/welcome to the season BBQ, organised by our new Social Coordinator, Pep Martins, was bumped from September to December, eventually taking place on a freezing and wet summer's day. The La Niña cocktail on offer was aptly named!

If it wasn't Covid, it was freakish weather events and flooding playing havoc with the season and causing the Ocean Swim/ Around the Bends swim to be cancelled due to poor water quality. It was a trying time for our patrol teams with bad weather seeing many wet weather patrols huddling under the patrol tent.

Patrol Audits are aimed at promoting best practice patrol methods and throughout the season assessors take to the beaches to spot check our volunteer beach patrols to ensure compliance across a range of disciplines including beach management and set-up, uniforms, gear and equipment and practical assessment. It was a proud moment when our Club was jointly awarded the Patrol Audit Award at SLSSNB's Awards of Excellence with a whopping 98% score. This Award reflects the efforts of every one of our patrolling members – a fantastic achievement.

Our patrol teams were supplied with a new patrol shirt this season thanks to new national sponsors. The rollout was seamless, however, the question was asked by Club Trainer, Steve Early, who has a professional background in supply chain consulting across apparel and circular economy (post-



consumer waste) recycling, "What happens

to all the old patrol shirts?"

As an emergency services uniform, a patrol shirt can't be donated in Australia. Rather it must be disposed. There is currently no national strategy in place to collect and recycle redundant patrol uniforms. Rather, each Club is left to undertake their own initiative in this space. SLSNSW offered their head office as a drop-off centre and have implemented various strategies in the past; donate to SE Asian countries that provide lifeguard services, made into tote bags, or incineration.

As a movement we can do so much better than this!

Steve is off to a SLS Leadership Conference in a couple of weeks and will ensure that this topic gets a good hearing. I hope that future annual reports will have exciting new strategies and the adoption of fabric recycling firmly in place for the recycling of all future uniforms.

Our suburb celebrated its centenary this season and our members got on board to acknowledge this milestone with a group "100" photo. Thanks to all who came down to participate and Tim Hixson who always happily obliges when asked if he can photograph a Club event. We will be celebrating our own centenary in 2025 and invite anyone interested in joining the organising committee to make themselves known.

We were fortunate to host two life-changing events for our members and community this season; Communication with Kindness workshop and Tomorrow Woman's Gather event. These programs are part of the suite of services offered by mental health charity Gotcha4Life and Man Anchor and are made possible through the revenue raised by fundraisers such as the 24-hr Row, initiated and locally co-ordinated by members Mel and Nathan Wellings. It was powerful to see our community engage and benefit from these sessions.

The onsite restaurant closed in June 2021 for a winter hibernation, failed to reopen after lockdown and eventually announced their permanent closure and withdrawal from their lease. The handful of functions bookings in the Ocean Room were serviced by their mobile catering team. We eagerly await news of a new restaurant and cafe operator who can invigorate what would have to be the most enviable dining location in Avalon Beach.

Motivated by the loss in revenue of the Ocean Room event space, we began to look at other opportunities to maximise the hire of our Clubhouse and a fortuitously timed approach

by a coworking group wanting to expand their services will likely see the Bangalley Bar converted to a coworking space every Monday – Wednesday.

Opening our Clubhouse in this way aligns with our strategic vision to be a place for our community, was well supported by our membership poll, and will see a currently underutilised asset (daytime hire of the Bangalley Bar) benefiting members and the local community. After two years of lockdowns and disruption, a change in corporate attitude towards working from home, it is exciting to think that our Clubhouse will be a hive of a different kind of activity during the week.

Venue hire was impacted by the lockdown (more on this in a separate report) and during this downtime, Bangalley Bar managers, Nick Sampson and Jason Dale, introduced new technologies to replace laborious bar admin tasks such as staff and volunteer rostering, product pricing and stock control and revolutionising bar administration. These platforms have now linked into the Club's accounting platform, Xero, providing almost seamless timesheet and payroll processing. Winning!

The Bangalley Bar also received a small refresh with some new greenery and festoon lighting. It is yet to see how well the plants will stand up to the harsh conditions but so far so good with many hirers complimenting the new look.

The Club rolled over to Microsoft Outlook this season with new email addresses for the management team and memberfacing Officeholder roles. Whilst primarily used as an email service, we are exploring how we can incorporate this technology to make volunteer admin load easier.

A small committee reviewed the Club's Constitution this season as a new template was rolled out by SLSNSW incorporating the (not so) new SLSA membership categories and various other recommended changes. The Constitution is 38 pages long and I owe an enormous debt of gratitude to Kevin Veale and Bernadette McKay, who joined me on an 11-month journey as we examined and debated each and every single word. And there are 12,564 words! Thank you also to Life Member, Bruce Muston, Richard Cole and Phil Ayers, SLSNSW for reviewing the final versions.

Assembling the Annual Report with Deputy President Richard Cole and Emma Long, Penguin Creative, is a labour of love. It's an opportunity to reflect on the season that was and the stories within and this year is especially poignant for me as I am standing down after seven years as Director of Administration.

In 2014, the Club was re-establishing itself after the disrupted years of rebuilding the new Clubhouse. It was a time of renewal and change and I am proud to have played a part, along with the management team, who have accomplished a great deal over those years; the automation of manual processes and the move to online applications for electronic banking, cloud document sharing/storage and membership renewals and a new website. It was an era of documentation; Constitution rewrites in 2016 and 2022, development of the strategic plan, by-laws, policies and procedures.

Annual governance and compliance within volunteer organisations present ongoing administrative obligations. Preparation of insurance renewals, Australian Charities and NFP information statements, maintaining appropriate licensing requirements and ensuring the Club is aligned with Branch, State and National surf lifesaving policies is an unheroic, but essential, responsibility of this role. Public Officer, Kevin Veale, has provided invaluable counsel during the preparation of these essential compliance responsibilities.

There are many who deserve recognition in this Club and to every age manager who has gently encouraged their Nippers to be confident in the water, every trainer and coach who has imparted their knowledge, every member that has stepped up and lent a hand often quietly and unseen, and each patrolling member who has supervised our beach, cared for our community, prevented an injury or saved a life, thank you.

After 70 x Board of Management meetings agenda preparation and minute-taking, give or take a meeting, and soon to be seven AGM coordination and minute-taking, I have also had the pleasure of organising four Life Member and Service Award luncheons recognising the achievements and tenure of some of the most remarkable members of the Club, along with the Club of the Year "gold" celebration.

There have been many highlights, but my proudest moments were seeing the 'One Club' culture, born in 2015, recognised with the Club of the Year Award in 2018, collaborating with the Northern Beaches club admins, "admin mafia", to share ideas

on how to administer our Clubs more effectively, seeing the core values of Surf Life Saving - to save lives, create great Australians and build better communities – roll out in an unexpected way through the 2020 Bushfire Appeal under the leadership of Louise Lindop and, lastly, just how impactful seven amazing Nipper mums can be at fundraising, along with the support of a generous community, that was the Carols Silent Auction whirlwind.

It has been a privilege to have held a leadership role in this wonderful Surf Club family and work with so many dedicated individuals and I encourage all members to put your hand up and get more involved at an operational level. The Board of Management are an exceptional team who are all passionate about this Club, the members within and keeping our community safe on the beach.

Thank you to the four Presidents I have served alongside; Christine Hopton, Richard Cole, Ashley Cardiff and, especially, Bernadette McKay who have each guided the Club in their own way through its many triumphs and challenges. Thank you to each Board of Management member, present and past for your wise counsel, forward thinking approach, robust debate when required and most importantly, your sense of humour. You are the engine room of this great Club.

# THE LONG TAIL OF COVID

As last season's Annual Report was shipped off to the printers, a new strain of Coronavirus, "Delta", was beginning to circulate in Sydney after an infected flight crew member passed the strain to a local limousine driver.

The snap lockdown of two weeks, intended to minimise the increasing transmission, mostly throughout the eastern suburbs of Sydney, quickly extended by a fortnight and would eventually lead to a lock down of Greater Sydney lasting 107 days. Viewers tuned in to the 11:00am TV broadcast as then Premier, Gladys Berejiklian, together with Dr Kerry Chant, NSW Chief Health Officer and Brad Hazzard, Minister for Health, would outline daily case numbers: how many cases were linked to a known source, or unknown source, how many Covid deaths, hospitalisations and vaccinations had occurred in the preceding 24 hours. It was grim viewing as the infection, hospitalisation and death rates escalated daily. At the time of writing this report, 10,322 Australians have now died from, or with, Covid (depending on your perspective). Just under 8.5 million Australians have now been infected, though it is suspected that infection rates are considerably higher as those reported are linked to confirmed PCR (Polymerase Chain Reaction) test results. By comparison to many countries around the world, Australia has fared exceptionally well.

Our community underwent colossal changes to lifestyle including the introduction of stay-at-home orders and curfews (9:00pm – 5:00am except for authorised workers, emergency or medical care workers), mandatory QR code check-ins were introduced, outdoor exercise limited to one hour per day, retail moved to click and collect, restaurants/cafés to take-away sales only and schools moved back to online learning. Even the unstoppable construction industry was forced to close completely for a two-week period as escalating cases in the Fairfield, Canterbury-Bankstown and Liverpool, local government areas (LGAs), with a high concentration of construction industry workers, saw infection rates spike dramatically in those areas.

Authorised workers who needed to travel outside of their LGA were required to carry a permit and special powers were given to police including the ability to lockdown entire apartment blocks whilst health authorities assessed Covid risk, or order residents found outside their LGA or curfew back to their homes. Over 51,000 fines relating to a breach of the public health orders were issued since March 2020, and more than 25,000 during the height of the outbreak in August last year. Interstate borders were slammed shut with some remaining closed until only recently – welcome back citizens of West Australia!

Vaccines had been available since February 2021 but with lagging vaccination rates, a vaccine incentive was rolled out across NSW as various freedoms were promised only to those who were double vaccinated, medically exempt or under the age of 16 once vaccination targets of 70%, 80% and 95% had been reached.

In line with Emergency Services protocols, the Surf Life Saving movement announced a vaccination requirement for all members aged 13 years and above, unless medically exempt, for anyone participating in a Frontline Volunteer Activity that required the member to be the holder of a SLS Lifesaving, Emergency Care or Powercraft Award; Bronze Medallion, SRC, ARTC, IRB Driver, IRB Crew, RWC Operator, radio operator and UAV Operator). This policy also applied to:

- Members enrolled in a training course or assessment for any SLS Award (excluding Junior Nipper Awards)
- Support Operations Personnel
- Surf Sports Officials
- Trainers, Assessors or Facilitators
- Age Managers
- Surf Sports Coaches

With the surf life saving season due to start in September and our Junior Activities program scheduled for October, our Board of Management and Covid committee met by Zoom frequently to discuss how we could safely provide the volunteer services for which our movement is renowned.

These were challenging times and thankfully, our patrol season opened on time due to the extraordinary efforts of our Club Captains, Jason Dale and Nick Sampson who hastily restructured patrol teams to ensure compliance with SLSNSW's covid-safe practices.

During lockdown, the Club received ten function cancellations and a further seven functions were deferred to a later date with most resulting in later cancellations. All venue hire deposits were repaid in full. On a positive note, the closed Clubhouse enabled Building Manager, Rob Hopton, to coordinate some necessary refurbishment of the Ocean Room and Bangalley Bar floors.

11 October was declared "Freedom Day" by our new Premier, with stay-at-home orders removed, mask wearing abolished in outdoor settings and non-essential businesses (retailers, hairdressers, hospitality) were allowed to open to those who could prove their vaccination status. Covid Safe check in and proof of vaccination was required with stores requiring their queue forming, mask-wearing customers to display their green tick of approval on their smart phone to show they were double vaccinated, before being permitted entry.

As vaccination rates continued to climb, Greater Sydney achieved 80% double vaccination on 16 October and on Monday 18 October, again for the double vaccinated only, restrictions on numbers attending gatherings were eased, community sport resumed, visitor limits to households were increased, there were no rules for outdoor gatherings with fewer than a 1000 people, and indoor square metre capacities were increased.

NSW Health Orders seemed to change from week to week, but over the following weeks, restrictions were relaxed ahead of schedule as indoor swimming pools and nightclubs reopened and dancing and vertical drinking, (drinking whilst standing) was permitted both indoors and outdoors. The 14-day quarantine requirement for Australians returning home from aboard was abolished but it would take until 21 February 2022 until Australia's international borders were reopened to vaccinated travellers.

Those who had chosen to remain unvaccinated were finally given their basic freedoms on 15 December as all indoor density limits were lifted and QR code check-in and mask wearing abolished in all but high-risk areas such as hospitals, public transport and airports where they still remain.

Following NSW Government advice, our Clubhouse opened its doors to vaccinated members on 11 October 2021 adopting an honesty entrance policy. Community hire was also welcomed back with restrictions on class sizes and permitted activities offered only to double vaccinated participants. Some of our community hirers elected to wait until there were no barriers to participation and it took until the following February for the return to (almost) pre lockdown volume.

Nipper membership renewal, which had been delayed until community sport was allowed to resume, opened on 11 October and the Club's brand new Nipper Registrar, Fiona Nguyen, did a super-human job processing the membership renewals of our Nipper families, as well as guiding our new members through the registration maze over a three week period. The Nippers program kicked off on Sunday 31 October, after only a two week delay to the planned start.

The Bangalley Bar reopened in November 2021 and our first function was the long-awaited memorial service for two of our Club's greats, Don Imison and Reg Wood on Saturday 12 February 2022. This was followed by a raft of Covid catch-up functions and unprecedented venue hire enquiry as delayed weddings and celebrations wanted to all get underway.

For many of us whose lives have now returned to a new "normal", the memory of last year is almost surreal. For some, the scars of this time will likely be felt for years to come, especially by those who lost loved ones they could not farewell

or who died alone, those who became unwell without support of family or friends, singles and the elderly enduring unbearable loneliness, loss of employment and financial stability, those forced to remain in abusive and violent environments, first time parents raising newborns without family support, and children who have now had three years of interrupted education.

For others, lockdown was an opportunity to slow down, embrace a simpler life, spend more time with immediate family, catch up on unread books, enjoy the myriad of online courses available, or simply enjoy a peaceful lunch in the garden on a weekday!

As we go to print in 2022, Covid fatigue has set in and news of Covid cases had mostly disappeared from the headlines, surpassed by Russia's war on Ukraine, tension in the Indo-Pacific, global sanctions, supply chain issues, inflation, interest rate rises and extreme weather events causing flooding to many parts of NSW.

As new Covid variants circulate around the globe; Gamma, Omicron, BA2.75, BA4 BA 5 Covid is once again starting to hit the headlines with 137,260 active cases in NSW, and more than 70,000 new infections reported nationally over the weekend. There is a reluctance to reintroduce mandates and masks and the message coming from Canberra is "take responsibility, make your own choice".

Community is precious, even more so in turbulent times. We are all fortunate to live and volunteer within a community and for a community that looks out for each other when and however we can, creates connection, either virtual or socially distant when needed the most, and shows respect, trust and tolerance for people's choices during these extraordinary times.

The second boat is probably going to be a year after that. Whenever they do arrive it will be good to retire our older IRBs. Though one of them, Phil, has done yeoman's service. For many years our main race boat and for the last few seasons the first choice on patrol.

This year we lost Pete Akehurst. As long as I've been at the Club he was the IRB Race Captain and before then Pete held many other roles as well. Not giving too much away he managed to save us from ourselves many times without acting like a task master. An elegant and seemingly effortless leader. I say seemingly because I'm sure we made him sweat! He seamlessly made my job easier, both at the Club and professionally and I'm sure that easy ongoing assistance crossed into all aspects of his life.

Based on a program developed by Surf Life Saving Tasmania, it's also a great opportunity to observe innovation in the education space. No doubt, we'll return with notes on the latest, cutting-edge ideas around scenarios and training.

With Surf Life Saving NSW putting so many resources towards the development of our youth members, rest assured that the future of the organisation is in good hands!





# FIRST AID REPORT

In first aid news this season, we now have two defibs in waterproof/dustproof cases so we can leave one in the tent and one in the ATV. We also have extra first aid kits, oxys and spinal boards too so we can have both the tent and ATV fully equipped and ready to instantly respond to an emergency. It's important that the ATV has one of everything because, in an emergency, time is vital and it's too easy to leave something behind in the rush.

Our oxy bags have been upgraded and the new blue oxy bags have plenty of space inside so the oxy can be set up ready for use in the bag saving precious seconds. The other big change in first aid is the addition of haemostatic bandages in the major trauma kit. The idea is they'll staunch the blood flow in wounds that can't be treated with normal dressing or a tourniquet. They must be kept dry prior to application and, upon contact with the wound, form a gel that contains clotting factors. They should be applied to the surface for stomach or chest wounds and held in place. For other wounds such as a fin chop to the buttocks stuff the wound with the dressings to staunch the flow of blood. Haemostatic bandages are very expensive so make sure you only use them for major traumas. Do no use them for superficial cuts or grazes!


## GEAR STEWARD REPORT

### **ONGOING WORK PLAN**

The Committee meets as required. It met once this year (via Zoom due to Covid), as much of the Committee's non-physical work can be conducted by email and phone calls. Its physical work was partially disrupted again due to Covid impacts on members, suppliers etc.



### THE HERITAGE COMMITTEE'S BACKGROUND

Past President Richard Cole initiated the setting up of a small committee to bring a more structured approach to the caring for and display of Club memorabilia and historical material, on the basis that no individual in the Club should have the responsibility of deciding what items of Club history should be retained, discarded, repaired or put on display.

The Club has a wealth of historic items such as photos of the first IRB, Warren Mitchell's OAM and Innovation Awards, Australian SLS Titles Gold Medals, vintage toothpick surfboard and surf ski, surf reels, trophies, awards and so on. The Club adds to these items all the time as for example new awards like the State and National Club of the Year Awards are achieved, and as a result of members' innovative ideas and the Club's involvement in the community.

Such items of memorabilia play an important role. Club memorabilia is not just for the benefit of present members, but for former members, their families, and for future members and the general public. In telling the Club's story they can inspire others, add to a sense of belonging, help recruit new members, and they support the Club's Mission "to save lives, create great Australians and build a better community."

The committee consists of four Life Members (Pete Carter, Warren Young OAM, Bob Head, and me as Chair), Club Historian and President Avalon Beach Historical Society (Geoff Searl OAM), Building Committee liaison and Deputy President (Richard Cole), Club President (Bernie MacKay) and Director of Lifesaving (Nick Sampson). The Committee's aim is to ensure that Club history is not lost, damaged items are repaired where possible, and heritage items are maintained in proper condition on an ongoing basis.

# **BUILDING REPORT**

Year 8 AR (After Renovations) has again been a difficult year, with our clubhouse being locked down in some form or other for some five months because of the Covid-19 pandemic.

The following dates show the timeline in 2021-2022 and how this impacted the use of the building:

- 26 June 2021 The Building was locked down through to 24 January 2022. We were able to provide Patrols at the beginning of the 2022 season with all members being separated by 1.5m and wearing masks for most of the season.
- The Change Rooms were closed for a substantial part of this period, opening around the first week of December.
- We were able to have the 24-Hour Row on the 31st October after being postponed from August.
- Our community hiring and the Bangalley Bar were closed for most of this time impacting on the Club's income.
- Nippers, competitions and competitive sports were cancelled, all of which recommenced in late January 2022.

Covid Safety Plans for all activities were required, with everyone under strict guidelines that were to be followed.

Our Trainers undertook the necessary training with only a few people at a time. This placed much pressure on them to ensure that all members were provided the opportunity to achieve their goals.

However, acknowledgement and thanks must be made to the following:

- Covid Committee Robert Hopton(chair), Leanne Austin, Richard Cole, Bernadette McKay, Nick Sampson, and Johnny Harper
- The Bar reopened early November 2021, thanks to the Bar Staff - Nick Sampson, Jason Dale plus lots who have worked hard to generate customers.
- Our amazing early morning swimmers Geoff Marles, Warren Burgess and Ross Cornwell who volunteered to clean and disinfect the Club's Change Rooms daily for some 3 months.
- Leanne Austin who has shown great focus and aptitude in getting the community and function hires back to pre-Covid levels once the restrictions were completely lifted in December 2021.

Again, as in the previous year, all usage of the Club was guided by the restrictions placed on us by NSW Health. Without the acceptance of these by our members and the public we would not have been able to operate, so a big thank you to all for your understanding and commitment to ensure that we could operate in a safe environment.

This year, all major activities to be held at the Club from June 2021 through to January 2022, were cancelled. The building looked and felt quite deserted, and it was with great excitement that we managed to again host the 24 Hour Row in late October.

Unfortunately for the second year running, the Club's big three events, Carols at the Beach, The Lion Island Challenge and the Surf Swim were cancelled. We hope that the Club will be hosting these events in 2022-2023.

As for the past years, the response from members in keeping the Club rooms and sheds clean and organised has been fantastic – our caretakers Johnny and Xanthe, Alan Moran and the Boaties in ensuring that the interiors and the sheds have been kept cleaned and ready to go, Col Campbell for his maintenance work around the building - to all, thank you for continuing to make our clubhouse such a resounding success.

The following are my comments on the main areas in the Club and how they are functioning.

- The Bangalley Bar has accommodated all the events outlined in this report and in other sections of the Annual Report. Outdoor heating through portable gas heaters is now available, with festoon lighting and potted plants installed on the balcony. The boaties have continued to outperform.
- The Ocean Room floor was sanded, the first time that this floor has had any treatment to it since the opening of the building in 2014.
- · Ceilings cracks have been repaired.
- The office has provided our highly capable Director of Administration, Leanne Austin, a great environment to ensure that the Club's business is managed and that the necessary reports for branch and NSW are all completed in a timely manner.
- The Hall of Champions honour boards and photos will be updated once the IRB competition results come in the later part of 2022, with new lighting proposed.
- · The Member change rooms are working well.
- The Nippers canteen continues to work well.
- The IRB/board shed, the boat shed and the patrol shed have all stood the test of time.
- The garbage shed is now under the Club's control as the restaurant has closed. New locks have been attached, hopefully keeping random drop offs into the bins.
- The Gym has had issues with Covid-19, with Brent working very hard to keep his business thriving. All Club members should remember that it is open and that it's there to be used.

The restaurant operator and Council have come to a commercial arrangement for the termination of the lease, which will see the space declared vacant and tenders for a new operator published in due course. We hope that this part of the building will come alive for the opening of the season.

Members would also be aware that there is a proposal for the Bangalley Bar to be hired out for a shared workspace operator, Monday through to Wednesday. More information on this can be found in the Administration report. This will help give more life to the building, as well as raising funds for our surf life saving equipment.

The building is accommodating all the functions for which it was designed. It is fantastic to see it being used, enjoyed and treated with respect. Thank you all for your contributions throughout the year.

I sincerely hope that 2022 and onwards there will be no lockdowns and that we will have access to the Club 365 days every year.

At Avalon Beach, we are proud to have raised over \$50K over the past four years and \$10,334 this year, enough to fund five mental fitness workshops. We have seen these funds come back into our community through two programs so far, Communication with Care and Tomorrow Woman Gather.

In 2021 the event focused on raising money for mental fitness organisation Gotcha4Life. The organisation powers programs and workshops that engage, educate and empower communities with the vision of zero suicides. For those who have attended programs at Avalon Beach you will know how impactful they are, and those who are yet to attend make sure you get involved in the next one.

We're so proud of all the Club members, family and friends who continue to support this event. To keep more than two ergos going for a 24-hour period requires everyone to do their bit from signing up, to fundraising and showing up to row.

We were stoked to see a big group turn out for the start and the final hours on Sunday morning to support the final rowers. It's the little Avalon Beach initiative that now helps thousands of people each year.

Through the installation of high quality solar panels and battery storage, Avalon Beach SLSC aims to be the first club in NSW to eliminate their carbon footprint, creating a Net Zero Surf Club by 2023.

- Reduce the power bills for Avalon Beach SLSC
- Provide leadership in carbon reduction and energy efficiency in the SLSA community
- Knowledge sharing across other clubs in NSW and Australia

### **PROGRESS TO DATE**

Following the completion of Stage 1 of our Net Zero Surf Club Project, with the installation of our 33.3 kW system in March 2021, we are now moving to Stage 2. Stage 1 was completed with the very generous support of McGrath Pittwater, Northern Beaches Council Environmental Grants and the money raised from the 2020 Silent Auction, organised by Junior Activities volunteers.

### **PERFORMANCE**

While COVID 19 has meant that the use of the Club, and associated energy usage, is anything but typical we are pleased to report that the solar system is performing exceptionally well, with 47.74 MWh of energy generated at the time of this report. The system has a convenient web-based app that allows us to monitor performance. The good news is that the system is producing far more energy than we use. In 2021 we produced 30.56 MWh with 26% self-consumed and 74% exported. These figures are reflected in dramatically reduced power bills. In terms of consumption, we still imported 56% of our energy, primarily due to night-time usage. The battery system will address this imbalance by storing the excess energy produced during the day for use during the night.

# NBC ENVIRONMENTAL GRANTS PROGRAM 2021/22

ABSLSC were successful in our application for the above grant, with \$4,500 + GST being provided by Northern Beaches Council for stage two of our "Net Zero Surf Club 2023" for the purposes of supplying and installing batteries.

### **NET ZERO SURF CLUB PROJECT - STAGE 2**

Stage 2 was approved by the ABSLSC Board of Management in principle in December 2021. We are currently exploring battery options including an option for possible Virtual Power Plant connectivity. A Virtual Power Plant (VPP) is a network of energy storage systems that are centrally managed by software to provide energy to the grid during times of peak demand. Virtual Power Plants allow renewable energy to be harnessed quickly and locally, keeping the network stable and reducing reliance on fossil fuels. VPP systems generally have larger rebates for excess energy production, leading to overall cost savings.

We are currently crunching the numbers to determine the best system for the Club. We plan to install the system as soon as possible, hopefully in the next few months. The location of the batteries will depend on the chosen system.

Thank you again to McGrath Pittwater, Northern Beaches Council and all the local businesses who donated to the 2020 Christmas Silent Auction for helping to make our Club Net Zero on emissions. Thanks also to all the volunteers who have put time and effort into fundraising for this project.

# MASTERS CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The 2021-2022 Avalon Masters' season proved to be challenging for both training and competition due to very unusual weather conditions, as well as Covid-19 public health orders and restrictions. Persistent wet weather, with historical levels of rainfall, resulted in floods and beach closures due to pollution. Nevertheless, our Masters' competitors kept up with their training sessions as much as possible by selecting training days and choosing locations less affected by pollution and debris.

Our Masters' competitors only had the opportunity to compete at two carnivals, the Northern Beaches Branch carnival and the Aussies. Several events were postponed then cancelled, including the NSW State Championships that were to be held locally at Queenscliff.

The location and dates for the Branch carnival was postponed and in doubt until it suddenly materialised at North Curl-Curl and Collaroy in late January, with reduced overall participation. A small number of committed Masters' paddler/swimmers and runners took the opportunity and did very well bringing home our best collection of results for the season.

The water events for the Masters' Branch carnival were held the same day as the Open events resulting in a reduced number of races. The Masters competed in the afternoon after the Opens facing more challenging conditions (a moderate northeaster weather running, dropping tide and strong sweep).

Building on last year's experiences, our female Masters' paddler/swimmer trio (Louise Purnell, Aisha Ferris and Julia Jones-Hughes) stuck together against the difficulties of interrupted training and were again rewarded with Gold Board race for Aisha, Silver Surf Race for Julia, Silver for the

trio's Swim Team, and Bronze for the trio's Board Relay. Ashley Brown, the Masters' solo male to participate in the event was rewarded with Gold for the Surf Race.

The Masters' beach team (Leanne Valentine, Louise Purnell, Pepita Martins, Xanthe Friend, Jean Harper, Ross Bloore and Michael King) did really well with the most medals, three Gold, seven Silver (including Silver for the Open Beach Sprint Relay for the girl team Leanne, Louise, Pepita, Xanthe) and five

The small number of Master competitors that attended Aussies this season enjoyed magnificent weather and surf conditions for the Masters' events. The competitors at Aussies were the girl's trio Louise, Aisha and Julia, and Ashley Brown, Pat Quinlan, and Gem Lehman (competing for Newport in order to form teams) and for beach events the duo Jean and Xanthe.

The standard of competition at Aussies is high as usual and there was also a 15% increase in competitor numbers from the year before. The girls made the finals in the individual board and swim races and placed 6th for the 130 years board relay. Aisha got Silver in the 2km Beach Run. Jean made finals placing 5th Beach Sprint and 6th Beach Flags. Ash gained Bronze in the Swim race and a second over the line for Iron. Gem got Silver for Board Rescue and Bronze in the 2km Beach Run. Pat Quinlan managed to gain Bronze in the Ski Relay and Ash Brown Bronze for 130 years Taplin. In surfing, Jean Harper achieved Gold in the short board riding.

Considering adversities imposed by unusual weather conditions and ongoing Covid-19 restrictions this was a memorable season for the Masters.

There is something to be said for teamwork which transcends the world of sporting endeavours. This is never more so than in the sport of surf boat rowing. It is a sport where you spend so much time with each other training, competing, travelling and just hanging out, that you just have to be best mates.

The Pinkies (originally the 'Pink Bits') have been together on and off for over a decade now and season 2021-22 has seen the culmination of that friendship morph into incredible results.

The crew is made up of Tom Curnow, Nick Sampson, Matthew Mayall and Andrew Bright with sweep, Nathan Wellings, in control at the back.

It all started under the watchful eye of Club legend and former sweep Rick Millar who took the boys as juniors and taught them the craft and discipline required to be a great crew. There was training hard on the water, road runs up Plateau Rd and plenty of laughs and adventures in between. With not too much success in those early years, the groundwork was being laid for later results. They rowed and competed throughout the Northern Beaches, and carnivals far and wide, winning the SNB surfboat points premiership across numerous divisions.

The first of their major successes was when they were selected to represent Australia, no less, as the U23 development crew, winning the 2016 World Championships, a major accomplishment for Avalon Beach.

After this early honour the boys had a couple of years to navigate different age groups as Tom and Andy competed with success in the Reserve Men's division whilst Nick and Matt still qualified for the Under 23's. During this period the boys took on mentoring roles to new and upcoming boys and girls crews at the Club. Matt took on the role of Boat Captain, whilst at this stage Nick was Director of Surf Sports and then Club Captain. Andy took on a career change as an electrician and Tom was excelling in the construction industry. Nath was a constant during this time, sweeping and coaching numerous crews.

The couple of years that followed were a bit of a mixed bag and competing in the Open Men's division proved challenging. There were some injuries and their results were inconsistent. Matt started on sweeping and took his Master's Women's crew to a Gold medal at the Aussies on the Gold Coast.

As the world emerged from the challenges of Covid-19 over the last few years, the crew decided to reunite and row in the Reserve Men's division. They trained well and had some good results and were consistently making finals appearances in most of the carnivals they entered.

Alongside their surf boat commitments, the boys got engaged, had children, continued to encourage and train with the junior crews and Nick was appointed president of the ASRL (Australian Surf Rowers League).

Their big rowing achievement early in this season was their success at the ASRL Open carnival held at Elouera in February, with a dominant display by the boys, including a win in the final. This was the second time in four years Avalon Beach had success in this division at the ASRL Open and was a sign of bigger things to come.

The NSW State Championships didn't go ahead due to the adverse weather conditions in March this year, but the crew got some good racing experience filling in at Ocean Thunder as well as training hard in the gym and on the water.

The combination of mates rowing and training together was beginning to pay off as the season drew to a climax at the Aussie Titles on the Gold Coast. The early rounds are always a challenge and it is sometimes a matter of just surviving through to the elimination rounds. The large and unruly surf also added another element to the mix, but the Pinkies have always been more than comfortable in bigger conditions. It actually suits their rowing style, while Nathan is more than confident in bigger surf. To have multiple crews competing for Avalon Beach on finals day is a fantastic achievement for the Club and having earlier crews compete in finals perhaps took some of the pressure of the boys when they went to the starting line.

History will show they won the Reserve Grade championship of Australia, however, it won't be able to show the dominance of their performance in that final as they crossed the line with daylight in second place. The emotion and excitement combined with a sense of relief and accomplishment was on display that Sunday and has given another achievement for our younger rowers to aspire too. This achievement and the Gold medal that goes along with it, is something that will bond the five members of the crew together for a lifetime.

I am sure Rick was looking over the boys that day with immense pride and joy, but also plotting what's next for the Pinkies.

# JUNIOR ACTIVITIES REPORT (NIPPERS)

The Avalon Beach Nippers had a phenomenal season despite significant challenges and changes which had an impact week-to-week. Our season had a delayed start time of two weeks, but once the ball got rolling there was no stopping the enthusiasm and fun for our Nippers and Age Managers, even when dealing with less-than-ideal conditions for a significant portion of the season.

Whilst there were significant changes in the Junior Activities Committee (JAC), the focus remained on developing water skills and confidence. The Avalon Beach Nippers philosophy is to build this through fun and engaging activities in the water as much as conditions would allow. Whilst the sand may have been dampened by consistent storms and rough seas, the excitement was not for our Nippers with sessions being run for fresh-faced Nippers whenever it was safe to do so. Our Nippers were exposed to a variety of activities including surfing at Palmy, jump rock, our signature obstacle courses, board races, flags and sand sprints. All of these are complimented by teachable moments to help educate the Nippers on beach safety and awareness as well as a respect for our natural environment.

Nippers continues to thrive through the efforts of volunteers, willing to put their hand up to help pitch in when needed, including canteen duty, age managing, water safety and

logistical support in getting boards and equipment where needed. I thank our Junior Committee Members and Coaches for the countless hours investing in our young people to make the lifesavers of tomorrow. Without the time and devotion put in by Fiona Nguyen, Mike Stanley-Jones, Tom Waters, Anna Trybocka, Maria Pellet, Cam Lane and Gem Lehman, Avalon Beach Nippers would not be able to run. Particular thanks go out to Fiona, Anna and Maria, who stepped into their respective roles as Registrar, Canteen Manager and Nippers Communications Manager in a year where the only constant was change.

Our dedicated group of diverse Age Managers, all with a great variety of skills, continued to engage with over 360 kids. The team of enthusiastic Age Managers, many of them new recruits donning the red shirts for the first time, turned up each week putting the needs out our Nippers ahead of their own comfort to demonstrate to the kids of Avalon Beach that a community is made of parents, grandparents and community members committing small acts of sacrifice for the benefit of others. It is great to see diversity growing amongst Age Managers as a wide range of community members put themselves outside of their comfort zone – whether that meant herding 50 kids down the beach or gaining their Bronze Medallion to enable them to Age Manage more confidently.

















For the new Nippers starting U6s, the wild and wet weather that took over the 2021-2022 season did nothing to dampen their spirits. Their water consciousness, willingness to give anything a go, and energetic attitude brought pride and a bit of extra sunshine to their newly minted Age Managers. They tackled the pool and the boards like the little champions they are, with waves bigger in the pool than many of them had come across on the beach. It was truly amazing watching how great they are in the water. Old favourites like Tug-of-War and buckets brought out their competitive spirit, but new initiatives, like Three for the Sea, showed our responsibility to our local environment in reducing litter.

Whilst we do aim to have Avalon Beach as the centre of Nipper activities, we also experienced some fantastic results in competitions, including Bronze and Gold Medals at State. Whilst we may not always have a large contingent at carnivals, we have a group of well-trained competitive individuals trained, coached and organised by Gem Lehman and Cam Lane. Whilst there are so many of our kids who deserve a special mention, Ethan Warner won a Gold for Flags and a Bronze Medal for Beach Sprints at the State Carnival in his first year of competing. Ethan was presented with this season's Avalon Beach Nipper "Norman Cook Best Carnival Competitor Award". Well done Ethan!

In consultation with Palm Beach SLSC, we continued hosting some Nippers groups at Palm Beach each weekend. The purpose of this programme is to:

## **PETER AKEHURST**

Life Member Peter Akehurst passed away peacefully on 18 May 2022.

Having three daughters like the Akehursts, our family regularly benefited from helpful parenting advice - passed on by his wife Judy at the tennis courts.:)



He competed in IRBs and trained many IRB Drivers (including me) and crews for surf rescues and racing, passing on skills and knowledge with good humour.

He was always experimenting with some new idea to do with the propellers, the motor, or whatever, to increase the speed of the boat, so our Club could come away from an event with more medals than the other clubs.

His enthusiasm was infectious to anyone else hooked on IRBs and he devoted a lot of his time to training and improving the performance of competitors through constant practice.

In the process he developed better surf lifesavers and better people. There are many, many young adults who benefitted from Pete's willingness to devote his time to them earlier on. Pete fulfilled the Club's objectives – to save lives, create great Australians and build a better community – in spades! It didn't matter if the medal results eluded the teams



Pete was well known and well respected throughout the Australian surf lifesaving Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB) community.

He organised and ran ABSLSC's premier annual Warren Mitchell IRB Carnival, which attracted competitors from all over Australia for many years because of Avalon Beach's - the Home of the IRB - reputation for always turning on a big surf for the event.

The NSW IRB fraternity said farewell to Pete, with Judy and other family members in attendance, at the second round of State IRB racing at Bulli Beach on the south coast on 28 May 2022.

Digger Akehurst was well known in IRB racing. Before racing commenced, Avalon Beach SLSC's IRB "Digger", named in his honour, did a drive by tribute, in front of all clubs' competitors lined up on the sand. This was followed by a minute's silence.

Pete was a good Club member and a good bloke. He will be missed.

## **BRIAN SPROULE**

Brian Sproule joined Avalon Beach SLSC in the early 1950s at the instigation of his mate Reg Woods through the Police Boys Club.

He gained his Bronze Medallion in the 1952/53 season and became an instant member of the patrol which won the coveted Busch Trophy (for winning the inter-patrol R&R competition). Brian also wasted no time joining the boat crew, becoming a member of the crew which launched the new 'J.Cooper' that same season.

Even though he was awarded his Instructor's Certificate only two years later (in 1954/55), it seemed Brian was destined to become a 'boatie'. A further two years later and Brian became Boat Vice Captain to good mate Brian Sheehan and in 1957/58 was promoted to Boat Captain, the first of a 5-year stint.

Just to show his versatility, during that time he managed the Junior Beach Football Team (1964/65) and swept the boat crew to semi-finals in the Branch Championships.

As Club Captain during the 1966/67 season, he couldn't resist the 'pull' of the boats and swept the junior crew to victory in every restricted carnival throughout out season. The Club was desperately in need of a new boat so in 1969 Brian Sproule and Ron Searl went guarantors and the 'Norman Cook Ill' was born. In that same year (and probably for the first time in the Club's history) he also 'secretly' swept a keen all-girl crew at North Avalon, knowing the hierarchy would frown at such an activity. My sister Diana was one of the rowers.

Due to a harmless prank which backfired and an over-zealous President at the time, Brian left our Club and joined Newport SLSC. He was welcomed with open arms and became their Power Boat Captain in 1971.

Brian was only ever known as 'Splasha', a nickname he earned from the rather unique swimming style he employed whilst pulling a belt for training through Redleaf Pool at Coogee in the

Brian and Robyn married in 1965 and after 33 years in Newport moved to Sussex Inlet in 1998.

Severe dementia later stole both his mind and life and he passed away on 29 April aged 85 years. He left behind two daughters, Heather and Tannis with six grandchildren and one great granddaughter.

# **Notes to the Financial Statements**

# AVALON BEACH SURF LIFE SAVING CLUB INC For the year ended 30 April 2022

## 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements cover Avalon Beach SLSC as an individual entity. Avalon Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a not-for-profit association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW).

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and the club's constitution. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows

AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 1031 Materiality

AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards

AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

## Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

#### Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

#### Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

## **Employee Provisions**

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

#### Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

#### **Financial Instruments**

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

#### Financial Assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost orfair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

#### Classification

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets at amortised cost.

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition unless the Association changes its business model for managing financial assets.

#### Amartised cost

Assets measured at amortised cost are financial assets where:

- the business model is to hold assets to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms give rise on specified dates to cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest on the
  principal amount outstanding.

The Association's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position.

Subsequent to initial recognition, these assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method less provision for impairment.

Interest income, and impairment are recognised in profit or loss. Gain or loss on derecognition is recognised in profit or loss.

#### Impairment of financial assets

Impairment of financial assets is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis for financial assets measured at amortised cost.

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition and when estimating ECL, the Association considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on the Association's historical experience and informed credit assessment and including forward looking information.

The Association uses the presumption that an asset which is more than 30 days past due has seen a significant increase in credit risk.

The Association uses the presumption that a financial asset is in default when:

- the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Association in full, without recourse to the Association to actions such as realising security (if any is held); or
- the financial asset is more than 90 days past due.

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the Association in accordance with the contract and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

#### Trade receivable

Impairment of trade receivables has been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses. The Association has determined the probability of non-payment of the receivable and multiplied this by the amount of the expected loss arising from default.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Association renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

Other financial assets measured at amortised cost

Impairment of other financial assets measured at amortised cost is determined using the expected credit loss model in AASB 9.

On initial recognition of the asset, an estimate of the expected credit losses for the next 12 months is recognised. Where the asset has experienced significant increase in credit risk then the lifetime losses are estimated and recognised.

### **Financial Liabilities**

The Association measures all financial liabilities initially at fair value less transaction costs; subsequently financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

The financial liabilities of the Association is comprised of trade payables.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

#### Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

### Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

#### Leases

The Association applies AASB 16: Leases which applies a single lessee accounting model that eliminates the requirement for lease to be classified as operating or finance leases.

The Association also applies AASB 2018-8 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Right-of-Use Assets of Not-for-Profit Entities. This standard allows that where the lessee is a not-for-profit entity, the lessee may elect to measure right-of-use assets on a class-by-class basis at initial recognition at fair value.

In addition, where a lessee is a not-for-profit entity and elects to measure a class or classes of right-of-use assets at initial recognition at cost for leases that have significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives, the lessee shall disclose additional qualitative and quantitative information about those leases.

The disclosures so provided by a not-for-profit entity shall be provided individually for each material lease that has significantly below-market terms and conditions principally to enable the entity to further its objectives or in aggregate for leases involving right-of-use assets of a similar nature.

At the date of this report the Association as lessee had entered into a lease on significantly below-market terms with Northern Beaches Council. As a not-for-profit entity the Association elects to measure Land and Buildings right-of-use assets at cost to enable the Association to further its objectives of the provision of life saving services at Avalon Beach.

The nature and terms of this lease are:

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- The lease payments are \$1 per annum payable in arrears on demand
- The lease term is for 21 years from 1 January2015 to 31 December 2035
- The asset the subject of the lease is the building at 558A Barrenjoey Road, Avalon Beach NSW less certain sections of that building let to other tenants
- The lease provides that the Association shall be entitled to use the leased premises only as a surf life saving club and other
  uses incidental including permitted rooms hire and functions.

#### Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

#### Inventories

Inventories comprises goods for resale and goods for distribution at no or nominal consideration as part of the Association's charitable activities. Inventories may be purchased or received by way of donation.

#### Goods for resale

Inventories of goods for resale are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

#### Goods held for distribution

Donated goods and goods purchased for nominal consideration held for distribution are initially recognised at their current replacement cost at date of acquisition. Inventories of goods purchased and held for distribution are initially recognised at cost. The cost of bringing each product to its present location and condition is determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

#### Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

#### Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Estimation uncertainty

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cash-generating units, based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.

## Useful lives of depreciable assets

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain software and IT equipment.

Inventories

Management estimates the net realisable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date. The future realisation of these inventories may be affected by future technology or other market-driven changes that may reduce future selling prices.

Long service leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

### Related Party Transactions

The Association's related parties include its key management personnel and related entities as described below.

Unless otherwise stated, none of the transactions incorporate special terms and conditions and no guarantees were given or received. Outstanding balances are usually settled in cash.

Transactions with related entities

The Association sourced goods and services from members at market rate during the financial year. All related party services and contracts are approved by the Committee.

Transactions with key management personnel

All key management personnel and volunteers are not compensated for holding office positions.

#### 8. Subsequent Events

The World Health Organisation (WHO) declared the COVID-19 virus a global health emergency on 30 January 2020. Global trade and markets have been significantly disrupted, and many businesses have had to, or will have to, limit or suspend their operations. All global share markets have suffered significant falls since 30 January 2020. The Committee has assessed the impact of the pandemic on the Financial Statements of the Association. There is no effect of the pandemic on the asset values as at 30 April 2022.

## 9. Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, which assumes the Association will be able to continue its trading activities.

The Association made a trading profit of \$79,375 for the year ended 30 April 2022, with a positive equity position of \$536,494.

The Association's ability to meet its obligations as and when they fall due and continue as a going concern is dependent on a number of factors. These include the ability of the Association to perform in line with budgets and cash flow projections, in addition to achieving sustainable levels of trading and membership in the future.

The Association will continue to comply with government regulation and SLSA pronouncements, including proposals for staged relaxation of lock down and other restrictions.

The timing and extent of these measures, and the ongoing effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on the Association's operations are not presently known.

The Association is currently reviewing its operations to determine any possible cost efficiencies and alternative trading operations. The Committee has determined that the going concern assumption is appropriate for the preparation of the financial statements.

The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the Association's financial reporting responsibilities under the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth), the charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), the Associates Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW) and the Club's constitution. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.

I draw attention to Note 6 in the financial report, which describes events during the year and subsequent to year-end and specifically the possible effects of the future implications of COVID-19 on the Association's future financial position and performance. In our view, this issue is fundamental to users' understanding of the financial report.

My opinion is not modified in respect of these matters

#### Responsibility of the Committee's for the Financial Report

The committee of the Association is responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and has determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth), the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the needs of members. The responsible entities' responsibility also includes such internal control as the responsible entities determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue and auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial report. As part of an audit in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- •Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omission, misrepresentation or the override of internal control.
- •Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.
- •Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the Committee.
- •Conclude on the appropriateness of the Committee's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial report or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Associate to cease to continue as a going concern.
- •Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a matter that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with the Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in the internal control that I identify during my audit.
